

Abstract of the proceedings of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund at the meeting held October 11, 1873.

Present-Hon. William F. Havemeyer, Mayor, (Chairman), Hon. Andrew H. Green, Comptroller, George W. Lane, Esq., Chamberlain, and Jenkins Van Schaick, Esq., Chairman Finance Committee, Board of Aldermen.

The application of "The Butchers' Hide and Melting Association," for water grant on the East river, between 44th and 45th streets; and of "The Orphan Asylum," for water grant on the North river, between 73d and 75th streets, were received and laid over for consideration.

The Committee (George W. Lane, Chamberlain,) appointed September 5, 1873, to examine the securities held by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, submitted the following report, which was accepted and ordered printed, viz.:

To the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund:

The undersigned having been appointed at a meeting of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, held September 5, 1873, a committee to examine the securities held by said Commissioners, and having given careful attention to the duty imposed on him, now respectfully

that the investments of the Sinking Fund in the Bonds and Stocks of the City and County of New York, amounting on the 30th day of August, 1873, to the sum of \$23,660,146.80, (of which amount, \$87,000 were represented by the customary receipts of the Chamberlain, pending the printing and execution of the Bonds,) were, by personal inspection found to be correct.

That at the same date there was in the Depository Banks, to the credit of "The Sinking Fund" for the redemption of the City Debt, the further sum of \$208,040.13 in cash.

And that at the same date there were Bonds and Mortgages for the further sum of \$772,776.67 to which may be added two mortgages for \$7,500 and \$390 respectively, sent some years since to the office of the Corporation Counsel, and for which the present Counsel to the Corporation has caused search to be instituted, making an aggregate amount of \$780,666.67, the net proceeds of which when collected, are paid to the Sinking Fund for the redemption of the City Debt.
