

Resolved, That the Police Commissioners of the City of New York be and they hereby are requested to furnish to this Board, as soon as the same can be done—

quested to turnsh to this board, as soon as the same can be done—

First—The number of habitually truant children in each ward of the City of New York.

Second—The number of children in each ward

of said city between the ages of eight and fourteen who may be found wandering about the streets and public places during school hours having no lawful occupation or business, and growing up in ignorance.

lawful occupation or business, and growing up in ignorance.

Third—The number of children under the age of fourteen who shall be employed, kept, controlled, or had in charge by any parent, guardian, or other person or persons to labor in any business, and without labor in any business, during school hours of any school day of the school term of the Public School in the ward where the children respectively are, who have not attended some of the Public School in the ward where the children respectively are, who have not attended some public or private day school where instruction was given by a teacher qualified to instruct in spelling, reading, writing, geography, English grammar, and arithmetic; and shall not have been regularly instructed at home in said branches by some person qualified to instruct in the same, at least four-teen (14) weeks of the fifty-two weeks next preceding any and every year in which such child shall have been employed, kept, controlled, or had in charge, and shall be without the certificate of any teacher or trustee of having been so interested for said for the controlled.

of any teacher or trustee of having been so instructed for said fourteen (14) weeks.

Fourth—The places where, and the names of the persons by whom, such children shall be so employed, kept, controlled, or had in charge, without being so instructed, and whether each child is employed to labor, or is kept, controlled, or had in charge without labor, and how, and by whom, and in what manner each child is employed lasts controlled or had in charge and ployed, kept, controlled, or had in charge, and what are the relations (child, ward, or employee) of each child to the person employing, keeping, controlling, or having in charge that child.

#### LAW DEPARTMENT.

The official canvass of votes at elections in the City of New York must be published in the CITY RECORD, under chapter 335 of the Laws of 1873, and also in two daily newspapers, to be designated by the Board of Police, in pursuance of chapter 823 of the Laws of that year.

The Charter of 1873 provides that publications of matter relating to the City government must be made only in the official paper called the "CITY RECORD," and that a publication therein shall be a sufficient compliance with any law requiring any publication what-ever. Held, that a statute, subsequently enacted, requiring similar matter to be published in certain papers to be designated, must be obeyed, notwithstanding the provision of the former act confining such publications to the official paper.

LAW DEPARTMENT, OFFICE OF THE COUNSEL TO THE CORPORATION,

New York, September 2, 1874. To the Honorable, the Commissioners of the Police Department .

GENTLEMEN-The Board requests my opinion upon a case which I will state as follows: The act known as the Charter of 1873, provides that all advertising required to be done for the city, and all notices required by law or ordinances to be published in the Corporation papers, shall be inserted at the public expense only in the CITY RECORD, and publication therein shall be sufficient compliance with any law or ordinance requiring the publication of such matters or notices. The act further provides that the detailed canvass of votes at every election shall be published at the expense of the city only in the CITY RECORD. (Chapter 335 of the Laws of 1873, Section 111.)

The act of the Legislature subsequently passed, and relating among other things to the official canvassing of votes in the City of New York, directs that all advertising provided for therein shall be done in two daily newspapers only, published in the City of New York, to be designated by the Board of Police. (Chapter 823 of the Laws of 1873, Section 4.) The Commissioners ask my judgment as to whether the Board will be justified in disregarding the latter provision, by which an expense of several thousands of dollars is made chargeable to the City Treasury; and I am asked as to the duty of the Board under the circumstances.

It is a well-settled principle that acts in pari materi must, if possible, be construed together. It is plain to my mind that the two several enactments above cited may both stand and be regarded as in full force and effect. If they can be so construed we have no right to assume that the latter repeals the former.

It is true that if the advertising called for by one of the acts be dispensed with, a saving of expense may be effected; but it is of more consequence in all matters relating to elections the laws be fully and unquestionably carried out. It certainly would be inadmissible to act upon the intimation contained in your communication, and disregard the later provision. Of two laws the one last en acted is if anything of the greater and more binding force.

The language of the earlier act, to the effect that publication in the CITY RECORD shall be sufficient compliance with any law or ordinance requiring the publication of any matter whateve relating to the city, is strong and explicit; but must be held to refer to any law or ordinance is force at the time that statute was enacted. I cannot be applied to publications required by sub sequent acts of the Legislature. It is to be re gretted that the Election Law, passed at a time subsequent to the enactment of the Charter, should not have left the matter as the Charter arranged | por

it, so that a publication of the official canvass in the CITY RECORD would have sufficed. But the provision in the Election Law is too clear to be disregarded. It commands that the publication of such canvass shall be in two daily newspapers to be selected by your Board. I must construe the law as I find it.

I think the true construction of these statutes is, that the canvass must be published in the CITY RECORD, in accordance with the provisions of what is called the Charter of 1873, and that such publication must also be made, under Chapter 823 of the laws of that year, in two daily newspapers to be designated by the Board.

#### REVISION AND CORRECTION OF ASSESSMENTS.
