Hon. WILLIAM LAIMBEER,

President of the Department of Public Charities and Correction: SIR—Your letter of the 8th instant encloses a SIR—Your letter of the 8th instant encloses a printed advertisement of proposals for the erection of two pavilions on Blackwell's Island, and one pavilion on Randall's Island, and I yesterday received the proposal of Bartholomew Walther, for erecting the same. You state that by the advertisement it is declared that the pavilions are to be similar in all respects to the pavilion of the same dimensions on Blackwell's Island. You also state that Mr. Walther objects to purform earlier work. that Mr. Walther objects to perform certain work, such as ventilators which are in the pattern building on Blackwell's Island, referred to, upon the grounds that his estimate was according to the specifications, in which ventilators are not mensioned and you request my enjoying as to the course

specifications, in which ventilators are not mentioned, and you request my opinion as to the course to be pursued by the Board in determining the case and awarding the contract.

In my opinion, this matter is to be determined by the specifications on file in the Department, and not by the advertisement in the "CITY RECORD."

The advertisement, it is true, is for the erection of pavilions similiar to the one of the same dimensions on Blackwell's Island, but the advertisement also states that all information can be obtained by parties desiring to bid, on application at the office of the Commissioners. I presume from your letter that Mr. Walther applied at the office of the Commissioners, and was furnished with a printed copy of the specifications attached to his proposal. He certainly had a right to rely upon the correctness of the specifications thus furnished to him by the Department and was not bound to examine the

of the specifications thus furnished to him by the Department and was not bound to examine the pavilion already erected on Blackwell's Island, for the purpose of ascertaining what sort of strucures he would be expected to erect.

There is nothing in the specification attached to Mr. Walthers' proposal, and transmitted to me, referring to the matter of the ventilators. I observe, however, that the heading of the specification is as follows: Specification for building pavilions on Blackwell's and Randall's Islands, subject to plans and specifications. What plans pavilions on Blackwell's and Randall's Islands, subject to plans and specifications. What plans and specifications that plans and specifications, other than the printed specification attached to the contract, there may have been, I have no means of knowing. If there were plans and specifications other than the one transmitted to me, and those plans and specifications provided for ventilators and other work to the doing of which Mr. Walthers objected, his proposal would, of course, be made subject to all the provisions of such plans and specifications, and he would be bound to do all the work therein provided for. If, however, there were no plans or specifications other than the one transmitted to me, or if such other plans and specifications, if me, or if such other plans and specifications, if any, contained no different provisions from that contained in the specification attached to the contract, then, of course, the specification attached to the contract is conclusive in the matter. I herewith inclose Mr. Walthers' proposal.
