LAW DEPARTMENT.

OPINION OF THE COUNSEL TO THE CORPORATION.

The jurisdiction of the Dock Department is not confined to wharf property, situated within the limits of the City of New York, but extends to all wharf property belonging to the Corporation

Such jurisdiction is exclusive.

Hence, the Commissioners of Public Charities and Correction have no power to make repairs to docks belonging to the Corporation of New York, wherever situated

> LAW DEPARTMENT—OFFICE OF THE Counsel to the Corporation, New York, November 12, 1874.

Hon. JAMES BOWEN, President of the Department of Public Charities and Correction:

SIR-Your letter to me of the 31st ultimo states that the docks at Hart's Island, Westchester County, which are owned by the City of New York, and under the charge of your Department for the use of the Industrial School, Convalscent Hospital, and City Seminary, require to be repaired. You also say that "it is stated that the Commissioners of the Dock Department are of opinion that they have not the authority to repair docks situated beyond the boundaries of the City." You ask my opinion whether the Commissioners of Public Charities and Correction have the legal authority to make the necessary repairs for the protection of the docks.

Subdivision 2 of section 6 of chapter 574, of the Laws of 1871, provides that the Department of Docks shall have exclusive charge and control of all wharf property belonging to the City, and that said Department shall have exclusive charge and control of the repairing, rebuilding, maintaining, altering, and strengthening of such property; including all wharves, piers, bulkheads, and structures thereon. Under these provisions of the statute, the jurisdictiou of the Dock Department is not in my opinion confined to wharf property situated within the limits of the City of New York, but extends to all wharf property belonging to the Corporation, and as the law expressly declares, that the Department of Docks shall have exclusive charge and control, I do not think that the Commissioners of Public Charities and Correction have any authority or power to make any repairs to the docks in question.
