Resolved, That the action of the Clerk of the Board of Supervisors, in causing a sufficient number of ballots to be printed and distributed, in pursuance of chapter 330, Laws of 1874, entitled "An act to provide for submitting amendments to the Constitution to the electors of the State," be and is hereby ratified, and that the bill of Martin B. Brown for printing and distributing the same, amounting to the sum of twenty-eight hundred (\$2,800) dollars, be approved, and referred to the Chairman of the Board for certification and requisition upon the Comptroller for payment, to be paid for out of the appropriation for "Printing, Stationery," etc.

The Chairman put the question whether the Board would agree with such resolution. Which was decided in the affirmative by the following vote:

Affirmative—The Mayor, Counsel to the Corporation, and Commissioner of Public Works.

DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC PARKS.

Abstract of the Proceedings of the Commissioners of the Department of Public Parks for the two weeks ending December 26, 1874.

Proposals for lighting, etc., lamps on the public parks, squares, etc., under the control of this Department for the four months commencing January 1, 1875, were publicly opened in the presence of the Comptroller with the following results:

Repairs to Third avenue bridge, not to cost over \$500, were ordered.

The proposal of the Metropolitan Gas-light Company (No. 1) was declared the lowest bid for lighting with gas, etc., for four months, commencing January 1, 1875, all the public lamps under the control of this Department in the following public parks, etc., namely, Reservoir Park, Park Avenue Parks, Plaza at Fifty-eighth and Fifty-ninth streets and Fifth avenue, entrance to Central Park at Fifth avenue and Fifty-ninth street, Circle at Fifty-ninth street and Broadway, and Transverse Road Number One; and the contract therefor awarded to the said Metropolitan Gas-light Company.

The proposal of the Manhattan Gas-light Company (No. 5) was declared the lowest bid, and the contract awarded to that company accordingly, for lighting with gas, etc., all the public lamps under the control of this Department, except those on the ornamental lamp-posts at the north end of Union Square, for the four months commencing January 1, 1875, within that portion of the City of New York bounded, as follows: On the north by the centre line of Thirty-fourth street, on the south by a line running from the East river through the centre line of Grand street to the centre line of Sullivan street; thence through the centre line of Sullivan street to the centre line of Canal street; and thence through the centre line of Canal street to the Hudson river; on the east by the East river, and on the west by the Hudson river.

The proposal of the New York Gas-light Company (No. 4) was declared the lowest bid, and the contract awarded to that company accordingly, for lighting with gas, etc., all the public lamps under the control of this Department, for the four months commencing January 1, 1875, within that portion of the City of New York south of a line commencing at the intersection of the centre line of Grand street with the East river; running thence through the centre of Grand street to Sullivan street; thence through the centre of Sullivan street to Canal street; and thence through centre of Canal street to the Hudson river.

The proposal of the Harlem Gas-light Company (No. 2) be declared the lowest bid, and that the contract be awarded to that company accordingly, for lighting with gas, etc., all the public lamps under the control of this Department for the

four months commencing January 1, 1875, within that portion of the City of New York bounded as follows, namely: By a line commencing at the intersection of the centre line of Seventy-ninth street and the East river; running thence along the centre of said Seventy-ninth street and the southerly line of Transverse Road Number Two, to the Hudson river; thence along said Hudson river to Spuyten Duyvil Creek; thence along said creek to the Harlem river; thence along said Harlem river and through the draws in the Central and Third avenue bridges to the East river; and thence along the East river to the centre line of Seventy-ninth street, the place of beginning.

It was directed that five hundred tons of coal be advertised for immediately after January 1, 1875.

Mr. George Kemp notified the Department that the bronze statue of "The Falconer," heretofore presented by him, was now ready for delivery; whereupon, the Landscape Architect was directed to designate a suitable location for the same, south of the lake in Central Park.

Sanitary Company to assist the officers of the Board of Health in the search of concealed cases of small-pox.

That the Attorney be directed to commence an action against D. Berghaus, of 49 West Twenty-fourth street, for violation of section 131 of the Sanitary Code.

That the President and the Chairman of the Sanitary Committee be authorized and empowered to arrange with the Commissioners of Charities and Correction all the details in respect to the transfer of the small-pox hospital to the care of this Board; also, as to the transportation to hospital and maintenance of persons sick with small-pox, and the selection and employment of nurses and other necessary attendants at said hospital.

That the Sanitary Superintendent be directed to communicate with the Board of Education, and to make arrangements for vaccination in the public schools.

That the Sanitary Superintendent be directed to cause a thorough search to be made for concealed cases of small-pox.

That the services of Assistant Sanitary Inspectors temporarily appointed during the present month be continued until otherwise ordered by this Board.

That the Attorney and Counsel be requested to prepare and report to this Board for its consideration, an additional ordinance requiring that all institutions receiving and caring for children, shall cause them to be vaccinated upon admission to such institutions.

That the sum of sixty dollars (\$60) be set apart for special services of Mr. Bodfish, at \$15 per week, in completion of abstracts of causes of death necessary to the scientific and public uses of the records of the Bureau of Vital Statistics.

That the Attorney be directed to commence an action against Charles De Moor, of No. 225 Chrystie street, for violation of the Sanitary Code.

The following is a record of the work performed in the Sanitary Bureau for the week ending December 26, 1874. The number of inspections made by the Inspectors was 1,623, as follows, viz.:

1 public building, 869 tenement houses, 157 private dwellings, 156 other dwellings, 6 manufactories and workshops, 16 stores and warehouses, 38 stables, 40 slaughter-houses, 3 manure dumps, 9 fat-rendering establishments, 1 brewery, 3 dumping grounds, 4 gut-cleaning establishments, 21 sunken and vacant lots, 33 yards, courts and areas, 41 cellars and basements, 44 waste-pipes and drains, 60 privies and water-closets, 4 streets, gutters and sidewalks, 3 dangerous stairways, 12 other nuisances, together with 102 visits of the Inspectors to cases of contagious diseases.

The number of reports thereon received from Inspectors was 441.

During the past week 28 complaints were received from citizens, and referred to the Inspectors for investigation and report.

The Disinfecting Corps have visited 114 premises where contagious diseases were found, and have disinfected and fumigated 104 houses, 104 privy sinks, together with clothing, bedding, etc.

46 cases of small-pox were removed to the hospital and 6 dead bodies to the Morgue by the Ambulance Corps.

28 permits were granted to the consignees of vessels to discharge cargoes on vouchers from the Health Officer of this port.

41 permits were granted to scavengers to empty, clean, and disinfect privy sinks.

The following number of cases of contagious disease was reported during the week ending December 26, 1874, viz.: Typhoid fever, 9; scarlet fever, 51; measles, 1; diphtheria, 138; small-pox, 92; and cerebro-spinal meningitis, 7.

114 loads of night-soil were removed by the Night Scavengers from the privy-vaults of the City.

The following amount of meat was condemned by the officers as being unfit for human food: Calves, 15 carcasses; sheep, 2 carcasses, and hogs, 2 carcasses.

Bureau of Vital Statistics.

During the week ending December 26, 1874, there were issued from this Bureau 565 burial permits for city deaths, 30 for bodies in transitu, and 37 for the interment of still-born infants. There were recorded 565 deaths, 125 marriages, 473 births, 37 still-births, 30 applications for transit permits, and 56 returns from the Coroners. There were 18 searches of the registers of births, marriages, and deaths; and 2 transcripts of the birth record, 4 of marriage, and 10 of death were issued from this Bureau. 2 cases of death were referred to the Coroner.

HEALTH DEPARTMENT OF THE CITY OF NEW YORK, BUREAU OF VITAL STATISTICS, December 29, 1874.

To the Secretary of the Board of Health:

SIR—The total number of deaths in the week ending on the 19th of December was 571, and the number reported last week was 565. The increase of mortality during the two weeks shows that the chief part of it is charged to pulmonary diseases and the causes incident to enfeebled vitality. In the week ending on the 19th instant, there were 100 deaths from phthisis, against 63 from that disease in the corresponding week last year; and there were 87 from pneumonia and bronchitis, against 72 in corresponding week last year; 32 from small-pox, against 1 last year; and 55 from diphtheria, against 34 last year; and 177

deaths from the zymotic class of causes altogether, against 123 in corresponding period last year. The crowded tenements and the poor classes throughout the city gave the increased mortality witnessed in the past two weeks.

The mean temperature last week was at 31.9 degrees Fahr., and in the previous week it was 30.6 degrees. The needy poor require charities which both teach and help to live healthfully now when the season is inclement and the demand for labor so depressed that vast numbers must live scantily and in crowded tenements.

The death-rate is now fluctuating between 27 and 28 per 1,000 of the population. The death-rate for the past 52 weeks, and for the year 1874, is 27.5 per 1,000 of the total estimated population of 1,040,000 souls. This rate shows a favorable decrease from the steadily rates of the previous 18 months.
