

Sanitary Bureau.

The following is a record of the work performed in the Sanitary Bureau for the week ending March 6, 1875. The number of inspections made by the Inspectors was 1,300, as follows:

3 public buildings, 641 tenement houses, 121 private dwellings, 60 other dwellings, 16 manufactories and workshops, 9 stores and warehouses, 33 stables, 59 slaughter-houses, 2 fat-rendering establishments, 1 quarry, 13 sunken and vacant lots, 30 yards, courts, and areas, 29 cellars and basements, 74 waste-pipes and drains, 87 privies and water-closets, 5 streets, gutters and sidewalks, 8 dangerous stairways, 10 other nuisances, together with 99 visits to cases of contagious diseases.

The number of reports thereon received from the Sanitary Inspectors was 400.

During the past week 42 complaints were received from citizens, and referred to the Inspectors for investigation and report.

38 permits were issued to the consignees of vessels to discharge cargoes on vouchers from the Health Officer of the Port.

6 permits were granted scavengers to empty, clean, and disinfect privy-sinks.

The Disinfecting Corps have visited 78 dwellings where contagious diseases were found, and have disinfected and fumigated 74 premises, 74 privy-sinks, together with clothing, bedding, etc.

34 persons sick with small-pox were removed to the hospital, and 1 dead body to the Morgue, by the Ambulance Corps.

The following number of cases of contagious diseases were reported during the week ending March 6, 1875:

HEALTH DEPARTMENT OF THE CITY OF NEW YORK, BUREAU OF VITAL STATISTICS, March 9, 1875.

To the Secretary of the Board of Health:

In the week that ended on Saturday the 6th inst., there were 650 deaths reported in this City; 605 deaths were reported in the previous week, but only 582 occurred in that week. The increase of mortality last week, as in other excessively cold weeks, occurred in numerous diseases sively cold weeks, occurred in numerous diseases. Chronic and inflammatory phthisis was charged with 101 deaths, against 80 in the previous week, and 103 in the week ending February 20. Bronchitis and pneumonia were charged with 115, against 100 in the previous week, and 106 in the week ending February 20. Diphtheria caused 57, 53, and 50 deaths in the same weeks respectively. There were 115 deaths in the public tively. There were 115 deaths in the public institutions last week, against 203 in the previous

The mean temperature last week, as reported by the Director of the Observatory at the Central Park, was 25.1 degrees Fahr., which is slightly above the mean of the first seven weeks in the year. The warm period during the last week in February, when the successive days, the mean temperature was above 46 degrees, was marked by some decrease in the mortality for the week, but the warm days had the average num-

fortnight.

The death-rate, which, in the last week of February, was equal to 29.10 in the 1,000 annually, rose last week to 32.50 per 1,000. The average rate reported in twenty-one cities of Great Britain, the second week of February, was 29 per 1,000; London reported its rate at 26 per 1,000; Edinburgh, 29; Glasgow, 36; and Liverpool 37 per 1,000, and, in the previous week, Amsterdam reported its rate at 33.5; Rotterdam at 40.8; Berlin at 30.8; Vienna at 26; Munich at 48.8; and Alexandria, in Egypt, at 49.5 per 1,000. In the United States no rates have equalled those of the two cities last named.
