DEPARTMENT OF DOCKS, 346 & 348 BROADWAY.

At a meeting of the Board of Docks, held March 13, 1875—present, Commissioners Westervelt and Wales; absent, Commissioner Budd—the following action was had:

Repairs Ordered, etc.

Engineer-in-Chief directed to make such repairs to the south side of Pier No. 12, East river, as will render same safe and fit for use, provided the expense thereof shall not exceed \$1,000.

Engineer-in-Chief directed to cause the bulkhead, between Gansevoort and Little West Twelfth streets, to be raised to the height of Thirteenth avenue.

Dredging Ordered, etc.

Engineer-in-Chief directed to make an examination of slips used by "White Star Line," and report what amount of dredging is necessary to be done in said slip.

Miscellaneous.

A fine of \$25 imposed upon John Gallagher, captain schooner "Ella Cooper," for discharging sand on the bulkhead and Piers No. 52 and 53, East river, in violation of orders of the Superintendent of Docks for the District.

Commissioner Wales requested to take such steps as he may deem advisable for a hearing before the Committee on Commerce and Navigation of the Assembly, in relation to the bill recently introduced in the Legislature in reference to owners of wharf property being compensated by the city for private property taken for the improvement of the water-front.

Commissioners of the Sinking Fund informed that this Department will surrender to them on the 1st of May next, portion of the ground, with buildings thereon, situate between Little West Twelfth, Bloomfield, Gansevoort, and Bogart streets, used by this Department for several years past in the manufacture of Beton blocks, storage, etc., and a tracing of the premises showing portion to be surrendered, transmitted to said Commissioners.

Secretary directed to make arrangements with William Kennelly for the sale of leases of certain piers and bulkheads on the North river, for the term from May 1, 1875.

Four communications were received and read and placed on file, no further action thereon being deemed necessary.

March 18.—A. & W. Lowerre informed that their communication relative to sale of bulkhead property to the city would receive the consideration of the Board.

March 18.—Engineer-in-Chief directed to report what repairs are necessary to be made to Pier foot of Twenty-fourth street, North river.

March 18.—Treasurer directed to issue a requisition for about ten tons of spikes, and ten tons of spike bolts, for current use of Department, as recommended by the Engineer-in-Chief; and Engineer-in-Chief directed to report the quantities of this material used in any particular work, so that an accurate account can be kept of the cost of the different works undertaken by the Department.
