#### Fire Steamer "William F. Havemeyer."

This important addition to the Department was placed in service May 12, and is designed to extinguish fires on shipboard, and along or in the immediate vicinity of the water-front of the city. It was built at Camden, N. J., by Wood, Dialogue & Co., under contract, and is furnished with two large pumps, each with a discharge capacity of one thousand gallons per minute, which were manufactured by the Amoskeag Company, and is fitted to supply eight streams of water. It is known as Engine Co. No. 43, and is stationed at Pier 1, North river, at which location a gong station has been established.

Your attention is invited to the subjoined quarterly statements of receipts and disbursements of the Relief Fund and the Life Insurance Fund.

The sum of \$980.48 has been received from sales of condemned property, etc., and deposited with the City Chamberlain.

BOARD OF COMMISSIONERS OF RAPID TRANSIT.

CITY OF NEW YORK.

OFFICE OF THE BOARD, NEW COURT-HOUSE, WEDNESDAY, August 4, 1875—12 o'clock M.

The Board met, pursuant to adjournment, at 12 o'clock M.

Present—All the Commissioners, viz.: The President, Lewis B. Brown, Cornelius H. Delamater, Jordan L. Mott, and Charles J. Canda.

The printed minutes of the meetings held July 30, August 2, and August 3, 1875, respectively, were read, and, upon motion of Mr. Mott, were approved.

Communications were received from various persons, read, considered, and numbered from 171 to 178, inclusive.

Upon motion of Mr. Mott, it was

Resolved, That Samuel H. Shreve be and hereby is employed as one of the Engineers of the Board, to be subject to the directions of the Board, from day to day—but with the understanding that the amount of compensation for such services as he may render shall be hereafter determined by the Board; and that no part of such compensation shall be payable until or unless a corporation shall be organized by the Board, and an assessment made upon and collected from the subscribers to the capital stock of such corporation; and that such compensation shall be payable only from and out of the amount of the assessments so to be collected.

In compliance with the invitation of the Board, the President of the New York Elevated Railroad Company, accompanied by the counsel and by several of the directors and principal stockholders of the company, appeared before the Board, and were heard in reference to the applications by that company heretofore addressed to the Board.

Upon motion of Mr. Delamater, the Secretary was directed to notify the writers of communication 118 that, if they desire to be heard by the Board, an opportunity will be afforded on the 6th instant, at 12 o'clock M.

Upon motion of Mr. Brown, adjourned to the 6th instant, at 12 o'clock M.

APPROVED PAPERS.

Ordinances, Resolutions, etc., approved by the Mayor during the week ending August 7, 1875.

Resolved, That section 14 of article 1 of chapter 37 of the Revised Ordinances of 1866, as amended by ordinance approved July 14, 1875, be again amended so as to read as follows:

Section 14. It shall not be lawful for any public cartman, or for any person having charge of any public cart, wagon, or other vehicle, to drive or back any such public cart, or any other vehicle, on to the sidewalks of any of the streets of said city, or to stop any such cart or any other vehicle on any of the crosswalks or intersections of streets so as to obstruct or hinder the travel along such crosswalks or intersections of streets, or to place any such cart or other vehicle crosswise of any street or wharf of said city, except to load thereon, or unload therefrom, articles of greater weight each than two hundred pounds, but in no case shall it be lawful for any person to permit such cart or other vehicle to remain so crosswise of any street, for a longer period than may be actually necessary for such purpose, and not to exceed five minutes. The provisions of this ordinance relating to backing any such cart or other vehicle on to the sidewalks shall not apply to any portion of said city south of Fourteenth street, except Whitehall street, Broadway, Broad, Canal, Courtland, Wall, Liberty, Hudson, Bowery, and the following avenues: Second, Third, Fourth, Fifth, Sixth, Seventh, Eighth, Ninth, Tenth, and South Fifth avenues, Avenues A, B, and C, First and Eleventh avenues, provided that the owner or occupant of every store, warehouse, or other building so occupying the sidewalk in front thereof, shall provide a suitable platform, with convenient steps at each side, to be placed in front of every such store, warehouse, or other building, for the accommodation of pedestrians requiring to pass any such store, warehouse, or other building, while the sidewalk is so occupied, and no cart or other vehicle shall remain on the sidewalk in front of any such store, warehouse, or other building, continuously, for a longer period than five minutes.

BOARD OF REVISION AND CORRECTION OF ASSESSMENTS.

At a meeting of the Board of Revision and Correction of Assessments, held at the Comptroller's office, in the New Court-house, on Monday, August 2, 1875, at 3:20 P. M.

Present—Andrew H. Green, Comptroller, and John K. Hackett, Recorder.

Absent—E. Delafield Smith, Counsel to the Corporation.

The minutes of the meeting held July 13, 1875, were read and approved.

The Comptroller presented to the Board the assessment list for regulating, grading, setting curb gutter stones and flagging in One Hundred and Twenty-sixth street, from Eighth avenue to Lawrence street, transmitted by the Board of Assessors with communication dated July 20, 1875.

The said assessment list being in proper form, and no objections having been filed thereto, on motion of the Recorder, the same was confirmed; all the members of the Board present voting in the affirmative.

The assessment list for regulating and grading One Hundred and Twentieth street, from Seventh to Eighth avenue, received from the Board of Assessors with communication of July 20, 1875, and having objections filed to the same by Mary G. Pinckney, was also presented to the Board by the Comptroller.

After consideration of the objections, on motion of the Recorder, they were overruled and the assessment list was confirmed; all the members of the Board present voting in the affirmative.

The Comptroller presented to the Board the assessment list for regulating and grading One Hundred and Twenty-second street, from Mount Morris square to Ninth avenue; also the award for damages in said matter and accompanying papers, together with a communication from the Board of Assessors, dated July 23, 1875, stating that the assessment list and award had been made up in accordance with a writ of peremptory mandamus of the Supreme Court.

The Comptroller also presented an order in the matter of Teresa A. Doyle against the Board of Revision and Correction of Assessments and the Board of Assessors, amending the peremptory writ issued in the matter of regulating and grading One Hundred and Twenty-second street, from Mount Morris square to Ninth avenue, by striking therefrom the whole of the awards made for damages except the award to Teresa A. Doyle, and directing that the Board of Revision and Correction meet and confirm, without alteration or amendment, the assessment list as prepared or made up by the Board of Assessors.

In obedience to which writ, on motion of the Comptroller, the said assessment list, with award as made by the Board of Assessors, was confirmed; all the members of the Board present voting in the affirmative.

At 3:40 o'clock P. M., on motion, the Board adjourned.

**AT A MEETING OF THE BOARD OF HEALTH** of the City of New York, held at its office, on the 16th day of July, 1875, the following resolutions were adopted:

Resolved, That section 29 of the Sanitary Code be and is hereby amended to read as follows: Sec. 29. That no meat, fish, birds or fowl, fruit or vegetables, nor any milk, not being then healthy, fresh, sound, wholesome, and safe for human food, nor any meat or fish that died by disease or accident, shall be brought within said city, or offered or held for sale in any public or private market, as such food, anywhere in said city.

Resolved, That section 34 of the Sanitary Code be and is hereby amended to read as follows: Sec. 34. That no decayed or unwholesome fruit or vegetables shall knowingly be brought into said city to be consumed or offered for sale for human food, nor shall any such articles be kept or stored therein.

Resolved, That section 37 of the Sanitary Code be and is hereby amended as follows: Sec. 37. That no meat, fish, fruit, vegetables, or milk, or unwholesome liquid, shall knowingly be bought, sold, held, offered for sale, labeled, or any representation made in respect thereof, under a false name or quality, or as being what the same is not, as respects wholesomeness, soundness, or safety for food or drink.

Resolved, That section 38 of the Sanitary Code be and is hereby amended to read as follows: Sec. 38. That every person, being the owner, lessee, or occupant of any room, stall, or place where any meat, fish, fruit, or vegetables, designed or held for human food, shall be stored or kept, or shall be held or offered for sale, shall put and keep such room, stall, and place, and its appurtenances, in a cleanly and wholesome condition; and every person having charge, or interested, or engaged, whether as principal or agent, in the care, or in respect to the custody or sale of any meat, fish, fruit, birds, fowl, or vegetables, designed for human food, shall put and preserve the same in a cleanly and wholesome condition, and shall not allow the same, or any part thereof, to be poisoned, infected, or rendered unsafe or unwholesome for human food.

Resolved, That section 40 of the Sanitary Code be and is hereby amended to read as follows: Sec. 40. That it shall be the duty of every person knowing of any fish, meat, fowl, birds, fruit, or vegetables being bought, sold, or offered, or held for sale as food for human beings, or being in any market, public or private, in said city, and not being sound, healthy, or wholesome for such food, to forthwith report such facts, and the particulars relating thereto, to this Department, or to one of its officers or inspectors.

Resolved, That section 42 of the Sanitary Code be and is hereby amended to read as follows: Sec. 42. That upon any cattle, meat, birds, fowl, fish, fruit, or vegetables being found by any inspector, or other officer of this Department, in a condition which is, in his opinion, unwholesome and unfit for use as human food, or in a condition of a weight or quality in this code condemned or forbidden, he shall cause the same to be examined by two reputable persons, reasonably competent to judge in respect thereto, whom he may conveniently find; and if both said persons disagree with him in opinion in respect thereto, he shall take no action, and give no order, relative to the same, till he has been instructed by the Sanitary Superintendent; and if one or both of said persons agree with him in respect to said articles, then such inspector or officer may forbid the same being offered or exposed for sale, or being sold, for human food, till the owner or party in charge or other proper person has obtained the consent of the Sanitary Superintendent, or of this Board, to their being so offered, used, or sold. And if both such persons agree with him in opinion, he may order the same to be removed; and thereupon, or if this Board shall have approved the judgment of said inspector, it shall be the duty of the owner and party in charge to speedily remove such article from any market, street, or public place, and not to sell or dispose, or offer to sell or dispose thereof for the purpose of human food. And in default of such removal, and also in case of disobedience to such order, and also in all cases where, in his opinion, such articles, by reason of their being in a decayed or offensive condition, would, if allowed longer to remain, be dangerous to health, the same (as this Board may provide) may be caused to be removed by any inspector, police officer, or officer of this Department, to some suitable place, at the expense of the party who should have removed the same, and the owner and party in interest must take notice thereof.
