PROCLAMATION.

\$1,000 REWARD.

MAYOR'S OFFICE, NEW YORK, September 6, 1875.

Whereas, James H. Noe was brutally assaulted at his place of business, at No 275 Greenwich street, in this city, on the 22d day of August, 1875, by one or more persons attempting a burglarious entry of his premises, and died from the effect of the wounds then received, on the 26th day of August, 1875; now,

I, WILLIAM H. The Committee on Surgeons submitted the following rules, which, on motion of Commissioner Disbecker, were adopted, and the Superintendent directed to promulgate the same by general order:

#### BOARD OF SURGEONS.

RULE 150.

The Surgeons appointed by the Board of Police shall constitute "The Board of Surgeons."

The Chief Surgeon shall be designated by the Board of Police. The Board of Surgeons shall elect annually, at their first meeting after the first day of January in each year, a Secretary from their

umber, who shall hold office for one year. When a vacancy occurs in the office of Secretary, it shall be filled by the Board of Surgeons, at the first meeting held thereafter.

Ten members shall form a quorum for business. They may adopt by-laws for the government of their meetings, not inconsistent with law or the Rules and Regulations of the Board of Police.

RULE 153.

The Board of Police shall detail committees of three Surgeons, to attend at the Central Depart. ment on Tuesday of each week, to examine and report upon the qualifications of candidates for appointment as Patrolmen. The Surgeon first named shall act as chairman of the committee.

RULE 156.

Each Surgeon of the several committees in attendance shall make personal examination of each candidate before signing the certificate, and the concurrence of three Surgeons comprising the committee shall be required to pass a candidate; provided, however, that candidates who are short in height, and light in weight, but who are otherwise qualified, shall be fully examined, and a certificate of such examination granted, as in other cases. The cause of rejection shall, in every case, be clearly and fully stated.

RULE 158.

The Board of Surgeons shall, in addition to the stated meetings of the Board, meet as often as required, when called upon by the Board of Police, or Chief Surgeon, and examine and report upon all questions, subjects, and matters referred to them; and they shall serve, whenever required, upon committees of their number, to examine and report in relation to all crimes, casualties, nuisances, injuries, and disasters, and other matters referred to them.

RULE 159.

The Chief Surgeon and Board of Surgeons shall, in the month of January in each year, make an annual report to the Board of Police, setting forth the transactions of the year; the sanitary condition of the station-houses, prisons, lodging-houses, and the "House of Detention for Witnesses," and of the Police Force, and the sanitary condition of the city and its inhabitants, with such statistics and suggestions concerning their diseases, their causes, and remedies, as shall be deemed useful to the Department and the public.

#### SURGEONS' DUTIES.

Rule 170.

Each Surgeon shall answer calls at and from the station-houses of his district, and from the Central Department; and he shall not make any charge or receive any compensation for services rendered at a station-house or at the Central Department.

RULE 171.

Each Surgeon shall keep a record of all cases attended by him at the station-houses, and of calls from station-houses, with the date, the name of the person treated, and a brief statement of each case; and shall make written reports of such cases to the Chief Surgeon on the first day of each month, who shall examine the same and forward them to the Chief Clerk on the following day.

First.—When any member of the command reports sick, Captains and Sergeants will immediately send to the Surgeon a written notice of the fact, containing the name and residence of the sick man; such notice to be transmitted by means independent of the sick man.

Second.—On receiving notice that a member of the force has reported sick, it shall be the duty of the Surgeon in charge of the Precinct to visit him without delay, and if, upon examination, it shall be ascertained that such member of the force is unfit for duty, the Surgeon shall assume charge and care of the patient, shall make daily visit to him, and more frequent visits if the condition of the patient, shall require it.

patient shall require it.

Third.—When a Policeman is so far restored to health as to be able to perform the police duties to which he is assigned, it is the duty of the Surgeon to give such Policeman a written order to report at his station-house for duty at the next occurring hour of six o'clock, P. M., or 8 o'clock A. M., and to transmit to the Captain a written notice that such Policeman has been ordered to report for duty, stating the hour at which he is to report; such notice to be transmitted by means independent of the

officer ordered to report for duty.

Fourth.—Any substitution of visits by the sick Policeman to the Surgeon, in place of the required visits of the Surgeon to the sick Policeman, is not allowed, except by leave of the Chief Surgeon to be granted in each case, and reported to the Board of Police at its next meeting, with the reasons therefor.

RULE 175.

Surgeons shall, in their respective districts, keep a careful record of the sick time of each member of the force, and make report thereof to the Chief Clerk, on the first day of each month, in pursuance of the rules and regulations, setting forth in such report the name and rank of the sick member, the date and duration of the sickness, the number of visits made during the same, the total number of days of time lost, and the portion thereof for which full pay, half-pay, or no pay is recommended to be allowed, and carefully and particularly the grounds and reasons for allowing or withholding pay; and also, in plain and popular language, the name, character, and special features of the disease or disability, and the probability, if any, of any future ill-effects arising from such disease

Rule 176.

In all cases where a member of the force has been borne on the sick list beyond thirty days, a special report of his case shall be sent the District Surgeon to the Chief Surgeon.

The Chief Surgeon shall forthwith designate a committee of three Surgeons, who shall make a careful examination and transmit a report to the Chief Surgeon, stating the nature of his disease, the probable time necessary for a recovery, and other information or special features of the case that demand attention. The Chief Surgeon shall transmit the report to the Board of Police with such recommendations as he may deem proper. recommendations as he may deem proper.

Rule 177.

Surgeons of Police will allow full time only to men injured in the discharge of their duty, upon the certificate of the Captain or Sergeant commanding, setting forth in detail how and when the injury was sustained, together with all the circumstances in relation thereto. The approval in writing of the Chief Surgeon must be obtained before such allowance is authorized. The certificates of the Captain, or Sergeant commanding, and the Surgeon of the District, must be forwarded to the Chief Surgeon, at Headquarters, on the morning of the first day of each month. The certificates sent to the Chief Surgeon, relating to claims for full pay, shall be kept on file in the office of the Chief Clerk.

RULE 178.

When a transfer is made of any member attached to his district, the Surgeon shall immediately report in writing to the Surgeon of the district to which the transfer is made, whether any and what time has been lost by sickness, with the disease and full particulars of the case, the same as required in the monthly reports to the Chief Clerk.

RULE 180. Each Surgeon shall, as often as circumstances require, make a written report to the Board of Police, setting forth any defects in the location, building, lighting, warming, ventilation, and cleanliness of the station-houses, and prisons, and suggest any alterations or improvements deemed necessary for the comfort and better efficiency of the Department.

Rule 181.

Each Surgeon shall transmit to the Board of Health of the City of New York written notice of all cases of malignant, infectious, contagious, or epidemic diseases coming within his knowledge and occurring in his own district.

RULE 182. Each Surgeon shall reside and keep his professional office within the Surgeon's District to which

he shall be assigned. Rule 183. ection of the station-houses under his supervision. He Fach Surgeon shall make a weekly inspecti

shall also report all violations of the orders of the Board of Police in respect to the care and hygiene of the members of the force. RULE 184.

Surgeons shall not charge, receive or take any compensation for medicine furnished to or for medical or surgical attendance upon any member of the force. It shall be the duty of each Surgeon or other member of the force who shall become cognizant or credibly informed of any violation, of this rule to forthwith report the facts of the case, with the name of the offending party, and of the witnesses, in writing, to the Chief Surgeon, who shall thereupon transmit the same to the Superintendent of Police, who shall prefer charges based upon such report against the offending party.

RULE 186. When a Policeman is on the sick list he is under the control and command of the Surgeon of the District, and, so far as relates to the treatment of his disease, is to obey all orders and instructions of the Surgeon relative thereto. For any violations of the orders of the Surgeon the offender shall be tried for disobedience of orders in the usual form.

#### CHIEF SURGEON.

Rule 187.

The Chief Surgeon shall be designated by the Board of Police from amongst the District Surgeons. He shall hold his office during the pleasure of the Board, and be subject to the same rules and regulations that apply to other Surgeons of the Department. He shall have official cognizance of the surgical and hygienic care and treatment of the members of the force and the sanitary condition of station-houses and buildings under the jurisdiction of the Board of Police. He shall see that the rules and regulations of the Department are observed by the Surgeons, and, with the approval of the Board, issue such orders as may be necessary to secure a proper observance of the same.

RULE 188.

The Chief Surgeon shall meet District Surgeons in consultations in serious cases, and shall also be authorized in all such cases to call upon any District Surgeon to accompany him in such consultations. No capital or serious operation shall be performed by any Police Surgeon upon a member of the Police Force, without the assent in writing of the Chief Surgeon, except in cases when the Chief Surgeon cannot be present; and it shall be the duty of the Chief Surgeon to be present when any such operation is performed.

RULE 189.

The Chief Surgeon shall not be called upon to serve as a regular member of any examining committee, but shall be, ex officio; a member of all committees of Surgeons, and shall, as such member, be present at all meetings of committees of Surgeons.

Rule 190.

It shall be the duty of the Chief Surgeon to visit all members of the Department who may be removed to any hospital for treatment, and report upon the condition and the circumstances of each case to the Board of Police.

RULE 191.

The Chief Surgeon shall, at least once in six months, accompanied by the District Surgeon, visit all station-houses and make a full report on their condition, and make such suggestions to the Board of Police as will tend to improve the hygiene and comfort of the members of the force.

All requisitions for Surgeons' supplies must be approved by the Chief Surgeon before presented to the Committee on Repairs and Supplies.

RULE 193.

The Chief Surgeon shall report daily at the Central Office at 1 o'clock P. M.

The Chief Surgeon shall report daily at the Central Office at Turner 194.

The Chief Surgeon shall report to the Superintendent in writing any and all violations of the rules and regulations of the Department, or neglect of duty on the part of surgeons. Upon such report it shall be the duty of the Superintendent to prefer charges, which shall be tried in the same manner as charges preferred against other members of the force.

SEALED BIDS WILL BE RECEIVED AND publicly opened at the Comptroller's office, on Thursday, September 23, 1875, at a o'clock P. M., for Leases of Franchise or right to maintain and operate several ferries around the City of New York for the terms and on the conditions hereafter set forth.

The leases will be made to conform to the requirements of the laws relative to ferries, and subject to such regulations, ordinances, or by-laws, as now are or hereafter may be made or passed by the Common Council or State Legislature, and the leases will also provide that the lessees shall take and assume at their own costs and charges all or any responsibilities and liabilities of the Corporation of the City of New York to the present lessees of terries in relation to boats, fixtures, etc., belonging to such lessees at the respective ferries.

The minimum rate for which the ferry franchise or license to operate ferries shall be used or enjoyed, has been appraised and set by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund at two and one-half per centum of the gross receipts for ferriage that shall hereafter accrue at each separate ferry, to be paid quarter-yearly, a statement in writing verified by oath or affirmation of the lessee or of such proper officer of the lessee as may be designated by the Comptroller of the actual total gross receipts for ferriage received by such lessee during the preceding three months, and also that the lessees shall keep regular books of account showing the daily gross receipts for the ferry leased, and allow said Comptroller or any person designated by him to examine such books.

The Department of Docks of the City of New York has fixed and established the rent for which it will lease the property in wharves, piers, slips, and lands under water belonging to the Corporation, at the several ferries to be leased to the parties or persons to whom the lease of the ferry franchises at the respective ferries.

Proposals for the lease or license to use the ferry franchise at

Island, for the term of five years from October 1, 1875, subject to \$2,000 per annum rent, payable as last mentioned.

5th. The ferry from the foot of Desbrosses street, North river, to Jersey City, New Jersey, for the term of one year from October 1, 1875, subject to \$3,000 per annum rent, payable as last mentioned.

6th. The ferry from the foot of Chambers street, North river, to Pavonia, New Jersey, for the term of one year from May 1, 1875, subject to \$15,000 per year rent, payable as last mentioned.

All of such leases to contain, in addition to the usual covenants and agreements, a clause to the effect that the lessees will, at all times during the term of their respective leases, well and sufficiently repair, uphold, sustain, amend, maintain and keep all and singular the floats, racks, fenders, bridges, and other fixtures at each landing place of their respective ferries, and that in the event of any damage to the bulkheads and piers adjoining their respective ferries, from collision by ferryboats or otherwise, from any action or negligence on their part, that they the said lessees will immediately repair and restore said property to its former good condition, free of cost and expense to the Corporation; also, that if at any time during the continuance of the demised term the Department of Docks shall require any of the premises connected with any ferry slip or landing place so leased, upon written notice having been given for three months previously that it is the desire of the Department of Docks to progress with the improvements in that vicinity, such Department of Docks may declare the demised term to be terminated, and the lessees shall surrender up the premises and vacate the same without any claim upon the City of New York for any damages whatever.
