Resolved, That the application of the Board of Police Justices for the detailment of a patrolman to the First District Police Court, to act as Interpreter of the Italian language, be and the same is hereby respectfully denied on the following grounds: That the Board of Police Justices have an annual appropriation to defray the expense of "Clerks, Attendants, Stenographers, Interpreters and Janitors, the Record Clerk and Secretary of the Board of Police Justices," amounting to \$83,880.40. The Board of Police have not the legal right to detail patrolmen for the performance of anything but police duty.

Resolved, That Rules 591 and 593 be published in a general order, and the Superintendent be directed to have it read in the various station-houses every Monday until after the coming election.

BOARD OF SURGEONS.

RULE 150.

The Surgeons appointed by the Board of Police shall constitute "The Board of Surgeons." The Chief Surgeon shall be designated by the Board of Police. The Board of Surgeons shall elect annually, at their first meeting after the first day of January in each year, a Secretary from their
