## PROCLAMATION.

\$1,000 REWARD.

MAYOR'S OFFICE,  
NEW YORK, September 6, 1875.

Whereas, JAMES H. NOE was brutally assaulted at his place of business, at No 275 Greenwich street, in this city, on the 22d day of August, 1875, by one or more persons attempting a burglarious entry of his premises, and died from the effect of the wounds then received, on the 26th day of August, 1875; now,

I, WILLIAM H. WICKHAM, Mayor of the City of New York, do hereby offer a reward of one thousand dollars for the discovery and conviction of the party or parties who may have committed the deed, the said reward to be paid on the conviction of the said party or parties, and the certificate of the District Attorney that such conviction was had upon the testimony of the person or persons claiming the reward. But all claims not presented to the Mayor within twenty days after such conviction shall be disregarded.

### Sanitary Bureau.

The following is a record of the work performed by the Sanitary Bureau for the week ending September 25, 1875: The total number of inspections made by the Inspectors was 2,297, as follows, viz.: 3 public buildings, 1,217 tenement houses, 145 private dwellings, 64 other dwellings, 9 manufacturing and workshops, 17 stores and warehouses, 85 stables, 55 slaughter-houses, 1 dumping ground, 1 rag house, 8 manure dumps, 10 fat-rendering establishments, 2 head and gut cleaning establishments, 1 ofal-dock, 39 sunken and vacant lots, 82 yards, courts, and areas, 50 cellars and basements, 136 waste-pipes and drains, 155 privies and water-closets, 86 streets, gutters and sidewalks, 34 dangerous stairways, 2 cisterns and cesspools, 1 piggery, 6 dangerous chimneys, 1 violation of the Sanitary Code, 3 dangerous buildings, 32 other nuisances, and 26 visits of the Inspectors to cases of contagious diseases.

The number of reports thereon received from the Inspectors was 839.

During the past week 93 complaints were received from citizens, and referred to the Sanitary and Assistant Inspectors for investigation and report.

79 permits were issued to the consignees of vessels to discharge cargoes on vouchers from the Health Officer of the Port.

113 permits were granted to scavengers to empty, clean, and disinfect privy-sinks.

The Disinfecting Corps have visited 30 premises where contagious diseases were found, and have disinfected and fumigated 17 houses, 17 privy-sinks, together with clothing, bedding, etc.

9 cases of small-pox were removed to the Morgue by the Ambulance Corps.

The following number of cases of contagious diseases was reported during the week ending September 25, 1875: Typhus fever, 1; typhoid fever, 18; scarlet fever, 9; measles, 5; diphtheria, 79; and small-pox, 15.

21 tanks and 2,436 cans of night-soil were removed by the scavengers from the privy-vaults of the city during the week ending September 25, 1875.

The following amount of meat and fish was condemned by the officers as unfit for human food during the week ending September 25, 1875: Calves (bob), 2 carcasses; calves (case), 1 carcass; sheep, 2 carcasses; corned beef, 22 pounds; beef, 16 pounds; veal, 45 pounds; and poultry, 100 pounds.

Bureau of Vital Statistics.

During the week ending September 25, 1875, there were issued from this Bureau 568 burial permits for city deaths, 37 for bodies in transitu, and 36 for the interment of still-born infants. There were recorded 568 deaths, 163 marriages, 452 births, 36 still-births, 37 applications for transit permits, and 50 returns from Coroners. There were 21 searches of the registers of births, marriages, and deaths, and 2 transcripts of birth record, 3 of marriage, and 16 of death were issued from this Bureau. Two cases of deaths were referred to Coroners.

To the Board of Health:

The following report gives the names of the owners of milk farms where we tested the quality and temperature of milk in the springs and cooling houses on the farms located on the line of the New York and Erie Railroad, in the vicinity of Goshen, Chester, and Grey Court, Orange County. Also the quality and temperature of milk taken from each cow separately while being milked in the different cow-stables, testing the milk with the lactometer adopted by the Board of Health, and using a thermometer to note the temperature of each cow's milk when examined.

September 18—Farm of John N. Ryerson, Goshen. Milks 36 cows; tested 10 cans of milk in the cooling house in a large box filled with ice and water; temperature of milk, 43 degrees; each can stood as follows: 120, 120, 120, 120, 120, 120, 120, 120, 120; tested the milk of 13 cows on the above farm while being milked, and experimented on the milk of the 4 first cows.

Table with 4 columns: Cow number, Temperature, Milk, and Milk. Rows include 1st cow's milk, 2d, 3d, 4th, and 5th, with sub-rows for cooled to and individual cow milk (6th-13th).

The above farmer feeds his cows on corn, meal, and pasture, and they appear to be in a healthy condition.

September 19—Farm of Col. F. M. Cummins, Goshen (Milk Farm). Tested milk from 10 cows, while being milked on the above farm, and experimented on the milk of the 3 first cows.

Table with 4 columns: Cow number, Temperature, Milk, and Milk. Rows include 1st cow's milk, 2d, 3d, and 4th, with sub-rows for cooled to and individual cow milk (5th-10th).

The above cattle are in a healthy condition, and feed on pasture only.

September 19—Farm of William Hughes, Goshen. 23 cows; tested 5 cans of milk in spring on the above farm; temperature of spring, 52 degrees; milk stood 114, 114, 114, 114, and 116. Saw the above cans delivered at the depot for New York.

September 20—Farm of Daniel D. Banker, Chester. Milks 23 cows; tested 6 cans of milk spring on the farm; temperature of milk, 55 degrees, which stood as follows: 112, 112, 114, 114, 116, 116; tested the milk of 5 cows while being milked on the above farm.

Table with 4 columns: Cow number, Temperature, Milk, and Milk. Rows include 1st cow's milk, 2d, 3d, and 4th, with sub-rows for cooled to and individual cow milk (5th).

The above cows are fed on pasture only, and appeared to be in fine condition.

September 20—Farm of James M. Bull, Chester, farmer. Tested 4 cans of milk in the above farm; spring temperature of milk, 55 degrees, stood as follows: 118, 118, 118, 118; tested the milk of 3 cows.

Table with 4 columns: Cow number, Temperature, Milk, and Milk. Rows include 1st cow's milk, 2d, and 3d, with sub-rows for cooled to and individual cow milk (2d, 3d).

The above cows are fed on wheat, bran, and pasture.

September 20—Farm of Charles F. Johnson, Goshen. Milks 35 cows; tested 9 cans of milk in cooling-house, where the water was 40 degrees temperature; milk stood 120, 120, 120, 120, 120, 120, 120, 120, 120. Tested 13 cows while being milked.

Table with 4 columns: Cow number, Temperature, Milk, and Milk. Rows include 1st cow's milk, 2d, 3d, 4th, 5th, 6th, and 7th, with sub-rows for cooled to and individual cow milk (8th-13th).

The above cows are fed on corn meal and pasture, and are in fine condition.

September 21—Farm of Thaddeus Durland, Grey Court, Orange County. Milks 48 cows; feeds on pasture only; tested 10 cans of milk in the cooling house; temperature of water 40 degrees; milk stood as follows: 120, 120, 120, 120, 120, 120, 120, 120, 120; tested the milk of 21 cows on the above farm.

OFFICE OF THE MAYORALTY, EXECUTIVE DEPARTMENT, CITY HALL, NEW YORK, September 23, 1875.

SIR—At a meeting of the Board of Commissioners governing this Department, held yesterday, the following resolution was adopted:

"Resolved, That the Commissioners of the Department of Public Parks of the City of New York hereby make requisition upon the Comptroller of the City of New York for the sum of two hundred and fifty thousand dollars (\$250,000), for the construction of a Museum of Art and a Museum of Natural History, as provided by section 2, chapter 290 of the Laws of 1871."

The Chairman put the question whether the Board would agree with said motion.

DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC WORKS, COMMISSIONER'S OFFICE, ROOM 19, CITY HALL, NEW YORK, September 24, 1875.

Hon. WM. H. WICKHAM, Mayor, and

Chairman Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

SIR—By chapter 252 of the Laws of 1875, this Department is directed to remove from Tenth avenue the aqueduct gate-houses near One Hundred and Nineteenth and One Hundred and Thirty-fifth streets, and the waste weir at One Hundred and Forty-second street, and to replace them by structures outside the boundaries of the avenue.

Under section 2 of this act the moneys required for this purpose must be raised by the issue of bonds authorized by chapter 230 of the Laws of 1870.

The estimated cost of the work is three hundred thousand dollars (\$300,000), including cost of land required.

The issue of one hundred thousand dollars (\$100,000) of this amount is deemed necessary at this time for the purchase of the land required, and for other necessary expenses, and requisition is hereby made for the same.

Resolved, That in pursuance of the authority conferred upon the Board of Estimate and Apportionment by the provisions of section 112 of chapter 335 of the Laws of 1873, the Comptroller be and he is hereby authorized to issue, from time to time as may be required, and at such rates of interest as he may determine, not exceeding seven per cent. per annum, additional "New Croton Aqueduct Stock of the City of New York," as authorized by chapter 230 of the Laws of 1870, and chapter 252 of the Laws of 1875, and for the purposes authorized in said chapter 252 of the Laws of 1875, to meet the requirements of the Department of Public Works, as per requisition of said Department, dated September 24, 1875, one hundred thousand dollars (\$100,000).

The Comptroller presented the following resolution:

Resolved, That in pursuance of the authority conferred upon the Board of Estimate and Apportionment by the provisions of section 112 of chapter 335 of the Laws of 1873, the Comptroller be

and he is hereby authorized to issue, from time to time as may be required, and at such rates of interest as he may determine, not exceeding seven per cent. per annum, "Museums of Art and Natural History Stock," as authorized by chapter 290, Laws of 1871, fifty thousand dollars (\$50,000). Which was laid over.

The Comptroller presented the following resolution: Resolved, That the Comptroller be and he is hereby authorized and directed to issue bonds of the City of New York, as provided in chapter 756 of the Laws of 1873, for the purpose of providing moneys for the payment of judgments which have been or may be obtained against the city, the amount of said bonds not to exceed the sum of twenty-seven thousand dollars (\$27,000), said bonds to be designated "New York City Bonds for the Liquidation of Claims and Judgments," and bear interest not exceeding seven per cent. per annum, and payable at such time, within three years, as the Comptroller may determine. Which was laid over.

The Comptroller offered for adoption the following resolution: Resolved, That the sum of two hundred and thirty dollars and four cents (\$230.04) is hereby transferred from the appropriation for the "New York State Lunatic Asylum," for the year 1874, the same being in excess of the amount required for the objects and purposes thereof, to the appropriation for "New York State Homoeopathic Asylum for the Insane," for 1875, for which it is required.

The Chairman put the question whether the Board would agree with said resolution. Which was decided in the affirmative by the following vote: Affirmative—The Mayor of the City of New York (Chairman), the Comptroller of the City of New York, the President of the Board of Aldermen, and the President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments—4.

The Comptroller presented the following preamble and resolutions: Whereas, Chapter 565 of the Laws of 1865, provides for "the laying out and improving of certain portions of the City and County of New York," by the Commissioners of the Central Park; and

Whereas, Section 94 of chapter 574 of the Laws of 1871, provides that "all acts conferring powers and devolving duties upon the Board of Commissioners of the Central Park are hereby transferred to and conferred upon the (said) Department of Public Parks;" and

Whereas, The Commissioners of the Department of Public Parks adopted, the sixth day of September, 1875, the following resolution, pursuant to section 7 of chapter 565 of the Laws of 1865: "Resolved, That the Commissioners of the Department of Public Parks hereby direct that the public fund or stock authorized and directed to be created by section 7 of chapter 565 of the Laws of the State of New York, passed April 24, 1865, shall be issued at such time or times, and in such manner of such description, and in such amounts as the Comptroller of the City of New York, in compliance with the provisions of said section, shall from time to time find to be necessary to provide funds for the payment of the damages awarded by the Commissioners of Estimate and Assessment, and of the expenses, charges, and disbursements in a certain proceeding instituted by virtue of said chapter, to wit:

"In the matter of the application of the Commissioners of the Central Park for and in behalf of the Mayor, Aldermen, and Commonalty of the City of New York, relative to the opening of Eleventh avenue, northwardly from the northerly line of the road or Public Drive to the southerly line of the street leading from Kingsbridge road, near Inwood street, to the Harlem river, near Shearman's creek, in the City of New York, such public fund or stock shall be payable not more than forty years from the date of issue thereof, and shall bear interest, payable half-yearly, at a rate not exceeding seven per cent. per annum; and the total amount of such fund or stock, hereby directed to be issued, shall not exceed the sum of seven hundred and twenty-nine thousand seven hundred dollars, and shall be issued in sums composed of even hundreds of dollars, and for not less than the par value thereof.

"Proposals for said fund or stock shall be invited by said Comptroller by advertisement, for the period of ten days; and the fund or stock shall be awarded by the Comptroller to the person or persons, corporation or corporations who shall offer the highest premiums for the same, except that said fund or stock or any portion thereof may be subscribed for and awarded to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund without proposals being invited for the same in the manner aforesaid; and said Comptroller shall, upon the payment of the price for which said fund or stock shall be so awarded, issue certificates therefor, in such form as said Comptroller may direct, and as nearly as may be in the usual form of stock of the County of New York, heretofore issued;" therefore,

Resolved, That the Comptroller be and he is hereby authorized to issue, from time to time as may be required, and at such rates of interest as he may determine, not exceeding seven per cent. per annum, the stock authorized by section 7 of chapter 565 of the Laws of 1865, in the name of the Mayor, Aldermen, and Commonalty of the City of New York, under chapter 304 of the Laws of 1874, payable not more than forty years from the date of the issue thereof, in pursuance of a resolution of the Department of Public Parks, adopted September 6, 1875, which said stock, so authorized to be issued, shall be denominated "Assessment Fund Stock," to the amount of Which was laid over.

The Chairman presented the following communication:

LAW DEPARTMENT, OFFICE OF THE COUNSEL TO THE CORPORATION, NEW YORK, September 27, 1875.

The Honorable the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

GENTLEMEN—I would request from your Honorable Board a transfer of the sum of \$5,000 from the fund for contingencies for this Department, to the appropriation for salaries of assistants, clerks and messengers.

Hon. WILLIAM H. WICKHAM, Mayor, Chairman of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

SIR—By direction of the Board governing this Department, I have the honor to transmit to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment the inclosed petition of Messrs. Henry F. Spaulding and others, in relation to the appropriation for the maintenance of roads, etc., in the Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards.

The petition was sent to this Department open. Yours, respectfully, WM. IRWIN, Secretary D. P. P.

To the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of the City of New York:

The undersigned, residents and taxpayers of Riverdale and its vicinity, late of the township of Kingsbridge, now a part of the Twenty-fourth Ward of the City of New York, respectfully represent: That, previous to our annexation, we were in the enjoyment of excellent roadways, partially macadamized, and kept in perfect, good order.

And that, since we became a portion of the City of New York, the assessed value of our real estate for taxation has been increased fifty per cent.; while, up to this time, not a single dollar has ever been expended by the city, within a mile of the Riverdale Depot, upon any of our roadways.

Last year we were obliged to keep them in decent order by private subscription. This year, after the recent heavy rains, we asked the Department of Public Parks to make a moderate and immediate outlay in our neighborhood which would render our roads passable, and save the city from very heavy expenditures hereafter.

We got for an answer, "that there was only \$15,000 in their treasury to maintain all the roadways of the Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards for the remainder of the fiscal year;" and "that, bad as they found our roads, they were so much worse in other sections, that they could not spare us a single cent, owing to their estimates having been so seriously cut down by your Honorable Board."

Consequently we have, for a second time since annexation, been obliged by private subscription to raise the funds to put these roads in condition to render them passable for the fall and coming winter.

Without gas-lights on our streets, without Croton water, without a single paved street or avenue, or sidewalk, with no expenses for street cleaning, we are taxed for them for the sole benefit of those who have and enjoy them in other parts of the city.

We respectfully and earnestly ask your Board to set apart a portion of the money derived from our taxation sufficient to put in order and to maintain our roadways, in the same good condition in which the City of New York found them when it took us into its embrace.

These are facts, we merely add, that the simplest principles of justice require your Honorable Board to accede to our request.
