The total amount of moneys which came into the hands of the Public Administrator during the year 1875 was the sum of seventy-seven thousand one hundred and fifty-nine dollars and thirty-three cents, and the total amount disbursed by him for expenses, and paid to next of kin, etc., was the sum of ninety-one thousand and eighty-five dollars and twenty-two cents.

The Public Administrator paid during the year 1875, to the Comptroller of the City of New York, for commissions, the sum of two thousand nine hundred and twenty-nine dollars and sixteen cents.

The balance of moneys standing to the credit of the Public Administrator and the Comptroller of the City of New York, in the National Park Bank, on the first day of January, 1876, was the sum of forty-nine thousand seven hundred and forty-four dollars and seventy-five cents, of which the sum of two thousand one hundred and eleven dollars and eighteen cents was interest accrued during the year 1875.

The balance of the moneys in the account of the Public Administrator and the Comptroller with the Guardian Savings Institution, still uncollected, is the sum of fourteen thousand two hundred and thirty-three dollars and sixty cents.
