CITY OF NEW YORK,

The Board met in pursuance of a call issued under the authority contained in the 112th section of chapter 335, and section 1 of chapter 779, Laws of 1873, and chapters 303, 304, and 308, Laws of 1874, and indorsed by the Mayor, Comptroller, President of the Board of Aldermen, and the President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments, and in pursuance of the following requisition:

Mayor, and Chairman of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

SIR—You are requested to call a meeting of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for the purpose of authorizing the re-issue of like bonds, to an amount sufficient to pay from the proceeds thereof those following, due November 1, 1876, as follows:

Assessment Bonds.....	\$245,000 00
Street Improvement Fund Bonds.....	1,267,500 00

—and for the transaction of such other business as may come before said Board.

The minutes of the meeting held September 29, 1876, were read and approved.

The Comptroller presented the following report:

CITY OF NEW YORK—FINANCE DEPARTMENT,

To the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

At a meeting held by the Board on September 29 last, a communication from Cornelius Flynn, relative to his claim for salary as Acting Assistant Clerk in the First District Court, was referred to me, and I respectfully submit the following

REPORT:

Reference is made to a late decision of the Court of Appeals in support of the claim of said Flynn, which, upon examination, I find was made in the case of John H. Whitmore, and that under said decision the Clerks of District Courts are entitled to a salary of \$3,000 per annum, and as the same provision of law contained in section 1 of chapter 438, Laws of 1872, fixes the salary of Assistant Clerks at the same amount, and chapter 275, Laws of 1876, provides that the Comptroller shall audit and certify the amount of the claim of said Flynn "at the rate established by law as the compensation for the services of the clerks of said District Courts in the City of New York at the time of the rendition of such services;" that the claim of said Flynn amounts to the sum of \$1,500 for the period specified, and the report of the Comptroller of September 15, 1876, should be modified accordingly.

The claim of Patrick McCabe, as Assistant Clerk in the Third District Court, is also reported on September 15, 1876, and comes under the same decision of the Court of Appeals, and being specially provided for also by chapter 300, Laws of 1876, said claim amounts to \$2,416.66, and the report of the Comptroller, of said September 15, 1876, in respect to the claim of said McCabe, should be modified accordingly.

COURT OF APPEALS.

JOHN H. WHITMORE, Respondent,

against

THE MAYOR, ETC., OF NEW YORK, Appellant.

Per Curiam:

We are of the opinion that the act, chapter 335, of the Laws of 1873, authorizing the Board of Apportionment to fix the salaries of all officers paid from the City Treasury, does not include any but city officers, such as are connected with the political organization of the city government. The act is entitled "An act to reorganize the local government of the City of New York."

The plaintiff is not such an officer, but is a judicial officer embraced within the judiciary system of the State. *Quinn vs. Mayor, etc.*, 44 How. Pr. R., 266, affirmed in this court, 53 N. Y., 627; *Leardon vs. Mayor, etc.*, Jones & Spenser, Sup. Ct. R., 467.

If the Legislature intended to embrace other than strictly city officers, it must be presumed that the statute would have so declared in express terms.

The constitutional question need not be considered.

The judgment should be affirmed.

Resolved, That the Comptroller be authorized to issue the sum of \$3,916.66, Revenue Bonds of the City of New York, payable at such time as he may determine, to provide means for payment of the claims mentioned in foregoing resolution, in pursuance of said chapters 275 and 300, Laws of 1876.

The Chairman put the question whether the Board would agree with said resolution.

Which was decided in the affirmative by the following vote:

Affirmative—The Mayor of the City of New York (Chairman), the Comptroller of the City of New York, the President of the Board of Aldermen, and the President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments—4.

The Comptroller offered for adoption the following resolution:

Resolved, That the sum of twenty-five thousand dollars be and is hereby appropriated, under the title of account of "Bureau of Municipal Correction—Expenses of," the same having been included in the levy for the year 1876, in pursuance of the provisions of chapter 212, Laws of 1876, for the purposes therein specified.

The Chairman put the question whether the Board would agree with said resolution.

Which was decided in the affirmative by the following vote:

Affirmative—The Mayor of the City of New York (Chairman), the Comptroller of the City of New York, the President of the Board of Aldermen, and the President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments—4.

The Comptroller offered for adoption the following resolution:

Resolved, That the sum of one thousand three hundred and fifty-nine dollars be and the same is hereby transferred from the appropriation "Election Expenses," 1875, the same being in excess of the amount required for the purposes and objects thereof, to the appropriation "Armories and Drill-rooms—For Wages of Armories," 1876, the amount of said appropriation being insufficient.

The Chairman put the question whether the Board would agree with said resolution.

Which was decided in the affirmative by the following vote:

Affirmative—The Mayor of the City of New York (Chairman), the Comptroller of the City of New York, the President of the Board of Aldermen, and the President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments—4.

By unanimous consent, the rule adopted at meeting of June 23, 1874, was suspended, in order to act upon the issue of "City Park Improvement Fund Stock," "Croton Water Main Stock," and "Assessment Bonds of the City of New York."

Whereupon, the Chairman offered for adoption the following resolution:

Resolved, That the Comptroller be and he is hereby authorized to issue, from time to time, as may be required, and at such rates of interest as he may determine, not exceeding seven per cent. per annum, "City Parks Improvement Fund Stock," as authorized by chapter 608, Laws of 1875, on account of a requisition of the Department of Public Parks, dated August 25, 1876, twenty-five thousand dollars.

—and, after debate, put the question whether the Board would agree with said resolution.

Which was decided in the negative by the following vote:

Negative—The Mayor of the City of New York (Chairman), the Comptroller of the City of New York, and the President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments—3.

Affirmative—The President of the Board of Aldermen—1.

The Comptroller offered for adoption the following resolution:

Resolved, That the Comptroller be and he is hereby authorized to issue, from time to time, as may be required, and at such rates of interest as he may determine, not exceeding seven per cent. per annum, "Croton Water Main Stock," as authorized by chapter 477, Laws of 1875, on account of requisition of the Department of Public Works, dated June 23, 1876, fifty thousand dollars.

The Chairman put the question whether the Board would agree with said resolution.

Which was decided in the affirmative by the following vote:

Affirmative—The Mayor of the City of New York (Chairman), the Comptroller of the City of New York, the President of the Board of Aldermen, and the President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments—4.

The Comptroller offered for adoption the following resolution:

Resolved, That in pursuance of the authority conferred upon the Board of Estimate and Apportionment by the provisions of section 112, chapter 335, Laws of 1873, the Comptroller be and he is hereby authorized to issue, from time to time, as may be required, and at such rates of interest as he may determine, not exceeding seven per cent. per annum, "Assessment Bonds of the City of New York," as authorized by chapter 397, Laws of 1852, and chapter 580, Laws of 1872, one hundred thousand dollars.

—accompanied by the following statement:

The Chairman put the question whether the Board would agree with said resolution.

Which was decided in the affirmative by the following vote:

Affirmative—The Mayor of the City of New York (Chairman), the Comptroller of the City of New York, the President of the Board of Aldermen, and the President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments—4.

The Comptroller offered for adoption the following preamble and resolution:

Whereas, Section 3 of chapter 756 of the Laws of 1873, provides for the issue of bonds in certain cases, as follows, to wit:

"Sec. 3. If at any time hereafter the amount in the Treasury of the City of New York, derived from the collections of assessments, shall be insufficient to meet and pay, when they become due and payable, any bonds issued by the Mayor, Aldermen, and Commonalty of the City of New York, for expenditures incurred in public improvements, payable in whole or in part from assessments, then it shall be lawful for the Comptroller, and he is hereby authorized to issue like bonds for an amount sufficient to pay, and, from the proceeds thereof, to pay the bonds so falling due, as aforesaid." Therefore

Resolved, That the Comptroller be and he is hereby authorized to issue, in pursuance of law, from time to time, in such amounts as may be required, and at such rates of interest as he may determine, not exceeding seven per cent. per annum, like bonds for an amount sufficient to pay, and, from the proceeds thereof, to pay the bonds falling due on the first day of November, 1876, the following bonds, viz.:

Assessment Bonds of the Corporation of the City of New York—Two hundred and forty-five thousand dollars.

Street Improvement Fund Bonds of the Corporation of the City of New York—One million two hundred and sixty-seven thousand five hundred dollars.

The aforesaid bonds shall be made payable at such times, not exceeding five years from the date of their issue, as the Comptroller shall deem expedient.

The Chairman put the question whether the Board would agree with said resolution.

Which was decided in the affirmative by the following vote:

Affirmative—The Mayor of the City of New York (Chairman), the Comptroller of the City of New York, the President of the Board of Aldermen, and the President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments—4.

A communication was received from the "Female Christian Home," requesting appropriation from the Excise Fund.

Which was referred to the Comptroller.

On motion, the Board adjourned.
