



DEPARTMENT OF DOCKS.

At meetings of the Board governing this Department, held during the week ending 14th February, 1877, inclusive, all the Commissioners present, except that on the 14th instant President Wales was absent, the following action was had, to wit:

Organization, etc.

February 14—Hugh Fitzpatrick, of 329 East Fifty-ninth street, appointed Night Watchman, vice William R. Thornton, removed. Salary \$2.25 per day, to take effect from 10th instant, inclusive.

Applications for Permits, etc.

February 9—From Screw Dock Company, to erect an extension southerly from outer end of dock between Piers 39 and 40, East river. Denied.

Contracts, etc.

February 9—Eight proposals for furnishing granite stones for bulkhead or river wall, received and publicly opened and read in the presence of the Comptroller, and the award of the contract, under the following bids, deferred for further consideration:

February 9—Contract for furnishing granite stones for bulkhead or river wall, awarded to Davis Tillson, of Rockland, Maine, under proposals publicly opened this date, and officers of Board authorized and empowered to execute the contract when prepared in proper form. Sureties, Courtland P. Dixon, of 52 Broadway, and Jonathan O. Fowler, of 96 Nassau street.

February 14—McIntire Bros., contractors for building wooden platform in rear of bulkhead wall between Piers 47 and 48 (old numbers), North river, requested to advise why work under the contract has not been commenced.

February 8—Comptroller informed that the issuing of a grant of land under water for premises between One Hundred and Sixty-third and One Hundred and Sixty-sixth streets, North river, under the application of the Institution for the Instruction of the Deaf and Dumb, now before the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, will not interfere with the plans of this Department, provided the westerly limit of said grant shall not be beyond the bulkhead line of the Park Department, as established by law in 1868.

February 9—Board of Commissioners of Pilots advised that in view of the fact of the Counsel to the Corporation having given his opinion to the effect that the power to prevent ashes, garbage, dirt, shavings, etc., from being thrown into the slips or upon wharf property, on the water-front of the city, is vested in this Department by the laws of the State, no necessity exists for application to the Legislature for additional powers therefor.

February 14—Captain of the Port requested to advise whether Pier 40, East river, has been heretofore used by sailing vessels regularly employed in foreign commerce and having a draft of more than 18 feet of water.

February 14—During the week ending this date, fifteen communications received and read, and eight taken from the table, and three from the Executive Committee, of which 15 were placed on file, and 11 laid on the table.

DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC PARKS.

Abstract of Proceedings for the week ending February 24, 1877.

MEETING, FEBRUARY 21ST.

It was stated that the Trustees of Morrisania had duly appointed Commissioners to assess the expenses of grading, etc., on 114th street, and they were notified to proceed with the work of assessing the cost of the 144th street work.

Upon the recommendation of Mr. C. Vaux, Architect, and the Superintending Architect, endorsed, "Approved, Theodore Roosevelt, Wm. A. Haines, for Committee of Trustees," the following alterations or modifications in the plans for the Museum of Natural History Building were approved, and the Treasurer authorized to issue orders therefor, viz.:

1. Modification in the arrangement of the doors of cases, at a cost not exceeding \$100.
2. Alterations in the floors of the gallery cases, at a cost not exceeding \$216.
3. To paint the wood and iron work of windows, etc., with three additional coats, and to finish them in maroon, at a cost not exceeding \$195.

A communication was received from the Landscape Architect and the Civil and Topographical Engineer, stating that the plan for laying out the district of the Twenty-fourth Ward, west of Riverdale road, and submitted by them on the 20th December, 1876, has been publicly exhibited for a period of six weeks, and that written invitations were addressed to all known land owners of the district, requesting them to examine the plan, and express their views upon it. That few exceptions were taken to the plan proposed, and these in matters that did not interfere with the general plan. That in each case where an exception had been made, the plan had been restudied, and the wishes of the land owners, as far as possible, complied with. They then submitted the plan thus revised, for the further action of the Board.

The Civil and Topographical Engineer was directed to notify the land owners of said district that the Board will take action upon such plan on Wednesday, the 28th instant, at 11 o'clock A. M.

The following-named officers were tried and found guilty upon the undermentioned charges, viz.:

Wm. B. Love, Gate-keeper, charged with leaving his gate before he was relieved.
Patrick Burns, Post-keeper, charged with smoking while on duty.
Gate-keeper Love, was fined five days' pay, and Post-keeper Burns three days' pay.
Commissioner Wennman presented a report, of which the following is a copy:

NEW YORK, February 21, 1877.

To the Honorable the Board of Commissioners Department Public Parks:

GENTLEMEN—The undersigned, to whom was referred the charges made by H. Ramsey, of Nineteenth Police Precinct, against Lieutenant John Corcoran, as per letter of 13th instant, begs leave to report, that he has given the subject a thorough and careful investigation, and fails to find the slightest approach to truth in the same, but, to the contrary, finds the letter itself to be the production of some person of malicious intent, who has used the name of an officer of the Nineteenth Precinct without his knowledge or consent.

Report accepted and filed.

The assessment-list for the work of flagging the east sidewalk of Thomas avenue, from Kingsbridge road to the new Fordham school-house, in the Twenty-fourth Ward, together with the statement of the amount and cost of the work, was signed by the Commissioners and transmitted to the Board of Assessors.

The following resolutions were adopted, viz.:

I.

Resolved, That W. E. Worthen, the contractor for the construction of the steam engine for the Third Avenue Bridge, be notified to complete same without delay; and that he will be held to his default in not having completed said engine within the time specified, unless it is finished and in position by March 1, 1877.

II.

Whereas, This Department, on the 3d day of November, 1876, directed Messrs. Jones & McQuade, contractors for the construction of the Brook avenue sewer, to proceed with the work in accordance with the terms of the contract; and

Whereas, The said contractors have not made any progress with said work, alleging as the reason, that they could not do so unless they were allowed to lay masonry, which the terms of the contract prohibited during the winter.

Resolved, That said contractors be and hereby are directed to proceed with said work at once, and that they be allowed to build masonry work on and after March 1, 1877, except on such days as the Engineer in charge shall direct the work to be suspended on account of frost.

III.

Whereas, The Commissioners of the Department of Public Parks of the City of New York, or a majority of them, deem a change to be required (as specified on the plan hereinafter mentioned), in the grade of Elton avenue, in the Twenty-third Ward, from One Hundred and Sixty-second street to Brook avenue, and of One Hundred and Sixty-second street, from a point three hundred feet east of Melrose avenue to the west curb line of Washington avenue, as laid down and established by the Commissioners appointed under chapter eight hundred and forty-one of the Laws of 1868, on a map of the same, filed in the office of the Register of the County of Westchester, on the twenty-third day of February, 1871;

Resolved, That under and by virtue of the powers conferred on the Commissioners of the Department of Public Parks of the City of New York, by chapters 329 and 604 of the Laws of 1874, they do hereby alter said grades, and do establish the grades of Elton avenue and One Hundred and Sixty-second street aforesaid, in such manner that the elevation of the surface of said street and avenue at their intersection and the crossing of the Port Morris Branch Railroad shall be fifteen feet and three inches above the datum plan of levels, as shown on a plan entitled "Sketch of proposed change of grades in Elton avenue and One Hundred and Sixty-second street" to accompany letter of February 20, 1877, and signed "J. J. R. Croes, Civil and Topographical Engineer."

And that the President of the Department cause to be prepared, and submitted to this Board, three similar profiles of the same, to be filed in pursuance of said laws above mentioned.

PROPOSALS FOR FURNISHING FRESH BURNT "PORTLAND" CEMENT.

SEALED PROPOSALS FOR FURNISHING THIS material, indorsed as above, and addressed to "Salem H. Wales, President of the Department of Docks," will be received at this office, until 12 o'clock M., of Wednesday, 14th March, 1877, at which time and place the bids will be publicly opened by the head of said Department and read. The award of the contract will be made as soon as practicable after the opening of the bids.

Any bidder for this contract must be known to be engaged in and well prepared for the business, and shall give security for the faithful performance of his contract, in the manner prescribed and required by ordinance, in the sum of four thousand dollars.

The Cement required under the contract must be Fresh Burnt Portland Cement, fully up to the standard of the best brands imported, and average at least 400 pounds gross weight to the barrel. No Cement will be received that shall have been ground or burnt for a longer period than two months prior to the date of delivery; the manufacturers' certificate of date of manufacture will be required with each delivery, and said date must be marked on each barrel with a stencil plate.

The quantity to be delivered under the contract is 5,000 barrels, and the delivery is to commence within 15 days after the date of signing the contract; and the time allowed for the fulfillment of the contract will be three months from the date of its execution, and a penalty of fifty dollars per day, as liquidated damages, will be exacted for each day that the delivery of any part of the said 5,000 barrels may be delayed beyond the time stipulated for its delivery, or that the contract may be unfulfilled, after the said three months has expired, Sundays and holidays not to be excepted.

Bidders will state in their proposals the price for each barrel of Cement, by which the bids will be tested. This price is to cover all expenses necessary for the complete fulfillment of the contract.

Bidders will write out the price bid, in addition to inserting the same in figures.

Should the lowest bidder or bidders neglect or refuse to accept this contract within forty-eight (48) hours after written notice that the same has been awarded to his or their bid, he or they shall be considered as having abandoned it, and as in default to the Corporation; and the contract will be re-advertised and relet, and so on until it be accepted and executed.

Bidders are required to state in their proposals their names and places of residence, the names of all persons interested with them therein; and if no other person be so interested, the proposal shall distinctly state that fact; also that the bid is made without any connection with any other person making any estimate for the same material, and that it is in all respects fair, and without collusion or fraud; and also that no member of the Common Council, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of the Corporation is directly or indirectly interested therein, or in the supplies or work to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof; which proposals must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party making the estimate, that the several matters stated therein are in all respects true. Where more than one person is interested, it is requisite that the verification be made and subscribed by all the parties interested.

Each proposal shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders of the City of New York, with their respective places of business or residence, to the effect that if the contract be awarded to the person or persons making the bid, they will, on its being so awarded, become bound as his or their sureties for its faithful performance; and that if said person or persons shall omit or refuse to execute the contract, they will pay to the Corporation any difference between the sum to which said person or persons would be entitled on its completion, and that which the Corporation may be obliged to pay to any higher bidder to whom the contract may be awarded at any subsequent letting; the amount in each case to be calculated upon the estimated amount of the work by which the bids are tested. The consent above mentioned shall be accompanied by the oath or affirmation, in writing, of each of the persons signing the same, that he is a householder or freeholder in the City of New York, and is worth the amount of the security required for the contract, over and above all his debts of every nature, and over and above his liabilities as bail, surety and otherwise; and that he has offered himself as surety in good faith and with the intention to execute the bond required by section 27 of chapter VIII. of the Revised Ordinances of the City of New York, if the contract shall be awarded to the person for whom he consents to become surety. PROPOSALS FOR FURNISHING THE GAS OR other illuminating material for, and Lighting and Extinguishing, Cleaning, Repairing and Maintaining (and supplying Gas, etc., for New Lamps when required) the Public Lamps on the Streets, Avenues, Piers and Places in the City of New York, under the Department of Public Works (not including Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards), for the nine months from April 1, 1877, to December 31, 1877, both days inclusive.

Proposals for the above, made in accordance with section 73, chapter 335, Laws of 1873, and Revised Ordinances of 1859, chapter 8, article 2, and enclosed in a sealed envelope endorsed "Proposals for furnishing the Illuminating Material and Lighting and Extinguishing, Cleaning, Repairing and Maintaining (and supplying Gas, &c., for New Lamps when required), the Public Lamps on the Streets, Avenues, Piers and Places in the City of New York, for the period from April 1, 1877, to December 31, 1877, both days inclusive," with the name of the party making the same written thereon, will be received at the office of the Commissioner of Public Works, until 12 o'clock M. of Thursday, March 1, 1877, at which place and hour they will be publicly opened and read.

Bidders are requested to state in their proposals their names and places of residence; the names of all persons interested with them; and if no other person be so interested, they shall distinctly state that fact; also that it is made without any connection with any other person making any estimate for the above supplies and work, and that it is in all respects fair, and without collusion or fraud; and also that no member of the Common Council, head of a Department, Chief of a Bureau, Deputy thereof, or Clerk therein, or other officer of the Corporation, is directly or indirectly interested therein, or in the supplies or work to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof; which proposals must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party making the estimate, that the several matters stated therein are in all respects true. Where more than one person is interested, it is requisite that the verification be made and subscribed by all the parties interested.

Each proposal shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders of the City of New York, with their respective places of business or residence, to the effect that if the contract be awarded to the person or persons making the bid, they will, on its being so awarded, become bound as his or their sureties for its faithful performance; and that if he or they shall omit or refuse to execute the same, they will pay to the Corporation any difference between the sum to which he or they would be entitled on its completion, and that which the Corporation may be obliged to pay to any higher bidder to whom the contract may be awarded at any subsequent letting; the consent above mentioned shall be accompanied by the oath or affirmation, in writing, of each of the persons signing the same, that he is a householder or freeholder in the City of New York, and is worth the amount of security required for the above work, over and above all his debts of every nature, and over and above his liabilities as bail, surety, and otherwise; that he has offered himself as a surety in good faith, and with the intention to execute the bond required by article 2, chapter 8, of the Revised Ordinances of 1859, organizing the Municipal Government of the City of New York, if the contract shall be awarded to the person or persons for whom he consents to become surety. The adequacy and sufficiency of the sureties offered to be determined by the Comptroller.

Bidders are required to state in their proposals the several streets or parts of streets in which they propose to perform the requirements herein contained, and also the illuminating or candle power of the gas they propose to furnish, when tested at a distance of not less than one mile from the place of manufacture; and bidders proposing to furnish any illuminating material other than coal-gas, must state distinctly what kind of material they propose to furnish, and the illuminating power of the burner they propose to use for the same.
