

### COMMISSIONERS OF THE SINKING FUND.

Abstract of the Proceedings of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, at the meeting held June 5, 1877.

Present—Hon. Smith Ely, Jr., Mayor (Chairman); Hon. John Kelly, Comptroller; J. Nelson Tappan, Esq., Chamberlain; and Patrick Keenan, Esq., Chairman of Finance Committee, Board of Aldermen.

#### Ferry Leases to be Disposed of.

Ferry from the foot of Whitehall street to Staten Island. Lease expired May 1, 1877.
Ferry from Whitehall street to the foot of Sixty-fifth street, Bay Ridge, in the town of New Utrecht, Long Island; established by resolution of Common Council, approved June 4, 1877.
Ferry from Cortlandt street, North river, to Jersey City. Leased for five years from May 1,

Refry from Cortaint street, North Tree, to Jessy Carl Lease to the Jessy Company 1876, at 2½ per cent. on gross receipts.

Rent paid to May I, 1877, at 2½ per cent. on gross receipts on New York side. Company refuses to execute lease except on that basis.

Ferry from Barclay street, North river, to Hoboken, New Jersey. Leased to October I, 1877, at 2½ per cent. on gross income. Company declines to pay, except for New York side. Rent paid at that rate to May I, 1879.

Ferry from Chambers street. North river, to Pavonia avenue, New Jersey. Lease expired

Ferry from Twenty-third street, East river, to Greenpoint, L. I. No lease executed—Bid was to November 1, 1880. Rent paid to May 1, 1877—2½ per cent. on New York side.

The following leases will expire on November 1, 1877:
Ferry from Thirty-fourth street, East river, to Hunter's Point, Long Island. Now leased to the Fast River Ferry Company.

Ferry from Ninety-second street, East river, to Astoria, Queens County, L. I. Now leased to the East River Ferry Company.

Whereupon, The following resolutions, submitted by the Comptroller, were, on motion, adopted with the company.

Ferry from Whitehall street to the foot of Sixty-fifth street, Bay Ridge, in the town of New Utrecht, Long Island.

Ferry from Cortlandt street, North river, to Jersey City.

Ferry from Barclay street, North river, to Hoboken, New Jersey.

Ferry from Chambers street, North river, to Pavonia avenue, New Jersey.

Ferry from Desbrosses street, North river, to Harsimus, Jersey City.

Ferry from Desbrosses street, East river, to Brooklyn, E. D.

Ferry from Tenth street, East river, to Greenpoint, Long Island.

Ferry from Twenty-third street, East river, to Greenpoint, Long Island.

Ferry from Thirty-fourth street, East river, to Hunter's Point, Long Island.

Ferry from Ninety-second street, East river, to Astoria, Queens Co., Long Island.

Resolved, That the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund do hereby appraise and fix the value of the ferry franchise, in each case, at five (5) per cent. of the gross receipts of each terry, collected at the landing-place in the City of New York.

The Comptroller submitted the application of the executors of the estate of Adam Treadwell, deceased, for return of amount overpaid on account of street vault, southeast corner of Greenwich and Murray streets, received and referred to the Comptroller, October 6, 1875; whereupon, the following resolution submitted by the Comptroller was, on motion, adopted, viz.:

Resolved, That the sum of three hundred and fifteen dollars and seventy-five cents (\$315.75) be returned to the estate of Adam Treadwell, being the excess paid for a vault, on September 23, 1873, in front of the premises known as the southeast corner of Murray and Greenwich streets.

The Comptroller presented the application of Joseph Hewlett, for release from the Corporation of the strip of land (caused by the change in the location of the street along the front of his property on Seventy-ninth street, between Fourth and Madison avenues; and submitted the following resolution, which, on motion, was adopted, viz.:

Resolved, That the Comptroller be authorized to dispose of the inter The Comptroller submitted the following report in relation to the claim of Sigmund Wise, for

compiling and preparing tables, etc., in reference to claims of the city against certain railroad companies, submitted to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, April 18, 1876, viz.:

To the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund: CENTILEMEN—Application has been made to this office by Sigmund Wise for payment of his claim for preparing tables and statements of facts in relation to claims of the City of New York claim for preparing tables and statements of facts in relation to claims of the City of New York against certain railroad companies, and attention has been called to the action of the Sinking Fund relative thereto, on April 18 and December 6, 1876, on which later date a report was submitted by the Recorder and Comptroller, recommending the sum of \$2,500 as a fair and reasonable compensation for the work performed; which report was, at that time, referred to the Comptroller, to be submitted to the Counsel to the Corporation for his opinion.

Upon an examination of the case it does not appear that any action was had pursuant to this last resolution, or any steps taken towards a settlement.

I would, accordingly, call attention to this claim, and request that the matter be taken up and a determination thereof had.

#### HEALTH DEPARTMENT.

HEALTH DEPARTMENT OF THE CITY OF NEW YORK, BUREAU OF VITAL STATISTICS,

June 5, 1877.

SIR—430 deaths were reported during the week ending Saturday, June 2, which is a decrease of 58 deaths, as compared with the preceding week, and 38 less than were reported during the corresponding week of 1876. The actual number of deaths for the week ending May 26, was 445, which is 82.6 below the average number of deaths for the corresponding week of the past five years, and represents an annual death-rate of 21.51 per 1,000 persons living, the population estimated at

and represents an annual death-rate of 21.51 per 1,000 persons fiving, the population estimated at 1,075,712.

There was a decrease during the past compared with the week previous of I death from zymotic diseases, 14 from constitutional diseases, 48 from local diseases, 3 from developmental diseases, and an increase of 8 deaths from violence. Measles decreased 3, scarlatina 2, cerebro-spinal fever 2, malarial fevers 5, puerperal diseases 3, diarrhoeal diseases 9, alcoholism 2, phthisis pulmonalis 12, aneurism 1, hydrocephalus and tubercular miningitis 4, convulsions 16, diseases of the brain and nervous system 29, enteritis, gastritis, and peritonitis 3, Bright's disease and nephritis 11, premature and preternatural birth 4, drowning 2; and an increase of I death from small-pox, 9 from diphtheria, 5 from membranous croup, 7 from whooping cough, 3 from erysipelas, 3 from typhoid fever, 2 from inanition, 2 from cancer, 3 from pneumonna, 2 from marasmus and scrofula, 2 from apoplexy, 5 from cirrhosis and hepatitis, 2 from cyanosis, and 1 from suicide.

whooping cough, 3 from erysipeias, 3 from typinia level, 2 from cirrhosis and hepatitis, 2 from cyanosis, and 1 from suicide.

Of the total number of deaths reported for the week 75 were in institutions, 210 in tenement-houses, 130 in houses containing 3 families and less, 3 in hotels and boarding-houses, 11 in rivers, boats, streets, etc. 4 were on the basement floor, 94 on the first, 127 on the second, 75 on the third, 34 on the fourth, and 10 on the fifth. 424 were stated to be residents of New York City and 6 non-residents. 53 were stated as single, 122 married, and 43 widowed, and the condition of 212 was not stated, these were children who had not attained a marriageable age. 86 deaths were of children under 1 year, 113 under 2 years, 159 under 5 years, and 35 were of persons 70 years and over.

The disposition of 426 deaths and still-births, or 90.25 per cent. of the total number reported, were in the following 14 cemeteries, which are in the vicinity of this city, viz.: Bayside (Jewish) 16, Calvary (Roman Catholic) 187, City (pauper burial ground—undenominational) 57, Greenwood (undenominational) 35, Lutheran (undenominational) 54, Cypress Hills (undenominational) 15, Evergreen (undenominational) 31, Woodlawn (undenominational) 8, St. Michael's (Protestant Episcopal) 2, Union (Methodist Protestant) 3, Holy Cross (Roman Catholic) 7, Machpelah, L. I. (Jewish) 4, St. Raymond's (Roman Catholic) 4, Washington (undenominational) 3.

The mean temperature for the week ending June 2d was 69.4 degrees Fahr., the mean humidity was 63, saturation being 100, the mean reading of the barometer was 30.058 inches, the number of miles traveled by the wind was 537, and the total amount of rain-fall was .06 inch, as reported by D. Draper, Director of the New York Meteorological Observatory, Central Park.

Resolved, That section 55 of the Sanitary Code be and is hereby amended to read as follows: On and after the fifth day of May, 1877, no cattle, swine, pigs, calves, or sheep shall be driven on or between Eleventh and Second avenues south of Sixtieth street, nor on any other streets or avenues, except as hereinafter mentioned.

rst. On First avenue, and the cross streets east of First avenue, between Forty-second and Forty-eighth streets,

2d. On the cross streets west of Eleventh avenue, be-veen Thirty-ninth and Forty-third streets, inclusive. 3d. On the cross streets west of Eleventh avenue, be-tween Forty fifth and Forty-ninth streets, inclusive.

4th. From the cattle yards on Sixtieth street to Tenth avenue; thence through Tenth avenue to Sixty-fourth street, Sixty-fourth street, Sixty-fourth street to Eighth avenue, Eighth avenue to Ninety-seventh street to Fifth avenue, Fifth avenue to One Hundred and Eighth street, One Hundred and Eighth street, One Hundred and Sixth street to the East river, between midnight and 6 o'clock A. M.

5th. From the cattle yards by the fourth route to second avenue, on Second avenue to One Hundred and Twenty-ninth street, on One Hundred and Twenty-ninth street to Third avenue, across Harlem Bridge, up Third avenue to be slaughter-houses in Morrisania, between midnight and colored.

cattle shall not leave the yards before midnight or after 5 o'clock A. M., that the drivers shall be orderly and quiet, and that the crosswalks shall be cleaned each morning before 8 o'clock. Permits under this subdivision shall be revoked by the Sanitary Superintendent on violation of any of the foregoing conditions.

9th. The Sanitary Superintendent may, in special cases, with the approval of the Board, give temporary permits to drive animals on other routes than those herein designated.
