



APPROVED PAPERS

Ordinances, Resolutions, etc., approved by the Mayor during the week ending June 29, 1878.

Resolved, That a receiving-basin and culvert be built on the northwest corner of Madison and Birmingham streets, under the direction of the Commissioner of Public Works; and that the accompanying ordinance therefor be adopted.

Adopted by the Board of Aldermen, June 11, 1878.

Received from his Honor the Mayor, June 24, 1878, without his approval or objections thereto; therefore, as provided in section 11, chapter 335, Laws of 1873, the same became adopted.

Resolved, That the Commissioners of the Park Department be and they are hereby requested to communicate to this Board at an early day such plans as they should adopt relative to restoring Tompkins square as a public park, pursuant to the act of 1878, in the event of being directed by the Common Council to so restore said square.

Adopted by the Board of Aldermen, June 18, 1878.

Approved by the Mayor, June 24, 1878.

Resolved, That Ferdinand H. May be and he hereby is appointed a Commissioner of Deeds in and for the City and County of New York, in the place and stead of Philip L. Berlinger, resigned.

Approved by the Mayor, June 24, 1878.

Resolved, That Patrick J. Flemming be and he is hereby appointed Commissioner of Deeds, in place of John E. Burke, who has resigned.

Adopted by the Board of Aldermen, June 18, 1878.

Approved by the Mayor, June 24, 1878.

Resolved, That permission be and the same is hereby given to William Feldhausen to place a free drinking-hydrant in front of No. 337 Washington street, the same to be a substitute for the water-trough now there, the work to be done at his own expense, under the direction of the Commissioner of Public Works; such permission to continue only during the pleasure of the Common Council.

DEPARTMENT OF DOCKS.

At a meeting of the Board of Docks held 19th June, 1878.

Present—the full Board.

The minutes of the meeting held June 12 were read and approved.

A communication was received from the New York Gas Light Company, asking that they be permitted to place a gas-pipe and meter upon Pier, new 1, North river, in order to supply gas to the steamer "Plymouth Rock" lying thereat; and, being read,

On motion, the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That permission be and the same is hereby granted to the New York Gas Light Company to place and retain until otherwise ordered by this Board, on Pier, new 1, North river, a small gas-pipe, for the purpose of supplying the steamer "Plymouth Rock," berthed at said pier, with gas; provided that the said pipe shall be located and laid in conformity with the direction of the Engineer-in-Chief of this Department, but no meter shall be placed upon said pier in connection with said pipe under this permit.

A communication was received from the Engineer-in-Chief in reference to the bad condition of the bulkhead north of the pier at foot of Laight street, North river, and inclosing a report of the Superintendent of Lamps and Gas, stating that the gas-lamps would not be replaced thereat until the premises were put in proper repair; and, being read,

On motion, it was

Resolved, That Harvey P. Farrington, lessee of bulkhead north of and adjoining Pier, old 38, at Laight street, North river, be, and is hereby notified, in accordance with the terms and conditions of his lease, to repair said premises without delay, the Engineer-in-Chief having reported that the timbers have been forced out, and that, in places, the filling has been washed away, and that the bulkhead should be rebuilt for a length of about 50 feet.

A communication was received from the Department of Public Charities and Correction requesting that repairs be made to docks on Randall's Island and at Twenty-sixth street, East river; and, being read,

On motion, the Engineer-in-Chief was directed to make the repairs to said premises, provided the cost of doing the same shall not exceed \$100 for the docks on Randall's Island, and \$100 for that at Twenty-sixth street, East river, and that in case the repairs cannot be made for that sum to report to the Board before doing any work, and that the Secretary advise the Commissioners of Public Charities and Correction of the action thus had.

The following communications were received, read, and,

On motion, laid on the table, to await action when the Commissioners shall have visited the premises.

From Thomas Rutter—For permission to build a platform dock between Sixtieth and Sixty-first street, East river.

From Engineer-in-Chief—In reference to the advisability of building a platform dock, as applied for by Thomas Rutter.

From Charles McCarty—To retain office and tool-box on bulkhead at Pier 11 East river.

From R. L. Williams, Agent—To retain small house, scales, etc., on Pier 7 East river.

From Silliman & Co.—To retain small house on Pier 7 East river.

From Police Department—As to incumbrances on piers and bulkheads on the East river.

The following communications were received, read, and, on motion, placed on file, action being taken where necessary, as stated, to wit:

From Health Department—As to the repairs needed to pier at 28th street, N. R., the Secretary to advise that the repairs referred to had been ordered to be made on 12th inst.

From Department of Public Works—In reference to having floats placed at the free floating baths.

From Engineer-in-Chief—As to repairs made to pier at 38th street, East river.

From Engineer-in-Chief:

1. As to work performed during week ending June 15th.
2. As to repairs to dock at Blackwell's Island. Engineer-in-Chief directed to drive 2 oak spring piles thereat.

From John Gray—Requesting that permission be granted for placing on pier at 23d street, East river, a stand for selling soda water. Request denied.

The Auditing Committee presented an audit of 17 bills or claims, amounting in the aggregate to the sum of \$4,524.11; and, being read, was

On motion, accepted and adopted, and the Secretary directed to forward the said bills, together with proper requisitions for the amount, to the Finance Department for payment.

A communication was received from the Compagnie Generale Transatlantique, lessees of Pier, new 42, North river, stating that the use of the bulkhead north of said pier by coal boats was a serious inconvenience to their business, as the discharging of coal thereat caused the coal dust to settle upon their steamers when freshly painted, etc., and further that they had been informed that this Board had under consideration an application for permission to erect a coal derrick on the bulkhead south of said Pier, new 42, for the purpose of discharging coal boats thereat, and requesting that this Board should not grant permission to erect a new derrick at the premises last mentioned, etc.; and, being read, was

On motion, placed on file; and the Secretary directed to advise said Company that it is not the intention of this Board to grant to any one permission to erect a coal derrick on the bulkhead south of said Pier, new 42, North river, as it is believed that the facilities for landing coal at the bulkhead north of said pier are ample and sufficient for that portion of the water front.

A report was received from the Engineer-in-Chief in reference to dredging required at the bulkhead at Thirtieth street, East river; and, being read, was

On motion, placed on file, and the Engineer-in-Chief directed to make requisition for the necessary dredges, scows, and labor to excavate and remove from in front of said bulkhead about 400 cubic yards of mud, and to superintend the work of such dredging, said estimated quantity having been stated in his report as being required in order to secure a depth of ten feet at mean low water.

Mr. S. L. M. Barlow being present, was heard at length in reference to the improvements proposed to be made to the ferry premises foot of East Houston street.

A communication was received from the Health Department inclosing reports of W. H. B. Post, Sanitary Inspector, as to the condition of the water front between Fortieth and Forty-first and between Fifty-fifth and Fifty-ninth streets, North river, and requesting that action be taken to render said premises free from its present foul and unhealthy condition; and, being read, and the Engineer-in-Chief presenting a report on the condition of said localities together with drawings thereof,

On motion, the communication from the Health Department was placed on file, and the following resolutions were adopted:

Resolved, That the Engineer-in-Chief be and is hereby directed to make requisition for the necessary dredges, scows and labor to excavate and remove the quantities of mud and sunken wrecks from the water front on the North river lying between Fortieth and Forty-first and Fifty-fifth and Fifty-eighth streets, as follows: At foot of Fortieth street and between Fortieth and Forty-first street, 2,500 cubic yards of mud and sunken canal boat; between Fifty-fifth and Fifty-sixth streets, 6,000 cubic yards of mud and sunken hulk; between Fifty-sixth and Fifty-seventh streets, 5,000 cubic yards of mud and sunken canal boat, and between Fifty-seventh and Fifty-eighth streets, 6,000 cubic yards of mud, and to superintend the work of such dredging; said estimated quantities having been stated in his report thereon as being required in order to secure a depth of three feet at mean low water between Fortieth and Forty-first street and Fifty-fifth and Fifty-sixth streets, and for that portion of the water front between Fifty-sixth and Fifty-eighth streets lying outside of the embankment now being made between said streets.

Resolved, That the Board of Health be informed by the Secretary, of the action taken by this Board in reference to the dredging of the water front between Fortieth and Forty-first streets and Fifty-fifth and Fifty-eighth streets, North river, and that as soon as the embankment now being made between Fifty-sixth and Fifty-eighth streets is completed, the Police Department be notified that the space lying easterly of said embankment may be filled in with ashes and clean filling, but it is the intention not to permit garbage to be deposited with the filling received from said Department.

On motion, the following appointments were made, to wit.

Michael Boyle, Michael Daley and Patrick Kane, as watchmen, and Philip Donohue, as a laborer.

On motion, it was

Resolved, That when this Board adjourns, it shall adjourn to meet on Tuesday, 25th instant, at eleven o'clock A. M.

HEALTH DEPARTMENT, NO. 301 MOTT STREET, NEW YORK, June 25, 1878.

The Board of Health met this day.

Reports Received.

Seizure of Unwholesome Food.

The weekly report on seizure of unwholesome food at West Washington Market was received.

Resolutions.

Whereas, It is reported to this Department that the midwife Mary Baur, 1497 Third avenue, attended Mrs. Blutz at 1407 Third avenue, on Monday, June 24, and did administer "labor drops," three or four times before birth, and that a child was born about two hours thereafter; therefore

Resolved, That the Coroner be requested to hold an inquest on the body of said child, now lying at 1492 Third avenue, and ascertain whether the death of said child was caused by the administration of "labor drops," and whether said midwife is authorized by law to administer medicine in such cases.

Resolved, That the pay-rolls of this Department for the month of June, 1878, when approved by the Finance Committee, shall duly be signed by the President and Secretary, and forwarded to the Comptroller for payment.

Resolved, That the time required for the fencing of premises at northwest corner of Fifty-sixth street and Sixth avenue be and is hereby extended to August 1, 1878, but the premises be cleaned and disinfected immediately.

Resolved, That the Register of Records be and he is hereby authorized and directed to make the following corrections in the Register of Death:

James McCormack, died May 25, 1875, make correction to correspond with corrected certificate of the Coroner.

James Mumenthaler, died June 13, 1878, in place of John Mumandaller.

Louis Anna Offermans, born June 26, 1876, in place of Louis Anna Offerman, the same being clerical errors.

Resolved, That under the power conferred by law upon the Health Department, Section 64, of the Sanitary Code, for the security of life and health be and the same is hereby amended to read as follows:

Sec. 64. That from and after the first day of July, 1878, the slaughtering of animals shall not be allowed or conducted at any place between First avenue and Eleventh avenue in the City of New York.

Resolved, That the Secretary be and he is hereby authorized and directed to publish the above ordinance as required by law.

Resolved, That order on premises of Nos. 7, 9, and 11 Madison street be and are hereby extended to July 6, 1878.

Sanitary Bureau.

The following is a record of the work performed in the Sanitary Bureau for the week ending June 22, 1878:

The total number of inspections made by the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors was 1,778, as follows, viz.: 4 public buildings, 835 tenement houses, 173 private dwellings, 72 other dwellings, 15 manufactorys and workshops, 15 stores and warehouses, 62 stables, 28 slaughter-houses, 14 fat-rendering establishments, 1 fertilizing works, 5 dumping grounds, 4 manure dumps, 1 garbage dump, 2 lard-rendering establishments, 2 soap factories, 1 lime kiln, 41 sunken and vacant lots, 51 yards, courts, and areas, 58 cellars and basements, 117 waste pipes and drains, 146 privies and water closets, 24 streets, gutters, and sidewalks, 6 dangerous stairways, 4 smoky chimneys, 1 cesspool, public drain, 5 docks, 1 stock yard, 1 piggery, 14 other nuisances, together with 75 visits of Sanitary Inspectors to cases of contagious disease.

The number of reports thereon received from the Inspectors was 635.

During the past week 173 complaints were received from citizens and referred to the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors for investigation and report.

Permits were issued to the consignees of 105 vessels to discharge cargoes, on vouchers from the Health Officer of the port.

136 permits were granted to scavengers to empty, clean, and disinfect privy-sinks.

The Disinfecting Corps have visited 52 premises where contagious diseases were found, and have disinfected and fumigated 51 houses, 51 privy-sinks, together with clothing, bedding, etc.

One case of measles was removed to the hospital by the Ambulance Corps.

During the week ending June 22, 1878, there were issued from this Bureau 469 burial permits for city deaths, 15 for bodies in transitu, and 37 for the interment of still-born infants. There were recorded 469 deaths, 143 marriages, 400 births, 37 still-births, 56 returns from coroners. There were 17 searches of the registers of births, marriages, and deaths, and 4 transcripts of marriage record, and 13 of death were issued from this Bureau.
