BOARD OF EDUCATION.

WEDNESDAY, July 3, 1878.

The Board of Education held a stated session at the Hall of the Board, corner of Grand and Elm streets, on Wednesday afternoon, July 3, at 4 o'clock P. M.

Present—William Wood, Esq., President, and Commissioners Beardslee, Cohen, Donnelly, Dowd, Goulding, Halsted, Jelliffe, Katzenberg, Manierre, Vermilye, Watson, West, Wetmore, and Wickham—15.

Absent—Commissioners Bell, Kelly, Place, Traud, Walker, and Wheeler—6.

Commissioners Walker and Wheeler, on motion, were excused.

The minutes of the session held on June 19 were amended and approved.

The President laid before the Board the following communications from the Trustees of the several Wards:

From the Ninth, Thirteenth, and Twentieth Wards, nominating Evening School Teachers. Referred to the Committee on Evening Schools.

From the Fifth, Tenth, Seventeenth, and Twenty-third Wards, asking to excuse the absence of teachers. Referred to the Committee on Teachers, with power.

From the Twelfth, Seventeenth, Nineteenth, and Twenty-first Wards, relative to leave of absence, transfer, etc., of teachers. Referred to the Committee on Teachers.

From the Tenth, Seventeenth, and Nineteenth Wards, awarding contracts for repairs. Referred to the Finance Committee.

From trustees of the Fifth Ward, asking pay for a bill for repairs. Referred to the Committee on By-Laws, etc.

From the Ninth Ward, asking to pay bills for repairs to furniture. Referred to Committee on School Furniture.

From the Twelfth Ward, asking for book-cases for the Holbrook libraries.

From the Thirteenth Ward, asking for authority to advertise for a school site. Referred to the Committee on Sites and New Schools.

From trustees of the Ninth and Sixteenth Wards, directing to review the legacy of Inspector James Kelly, for medals for schools in said wards. Commissioner Halsted presented a resolution directing the Committee on By-laws to invest said Kelly fund, together with the bequest to the Normal College, so as to carry out the directions of the donor. Adopted.

From the Nineteenth Ward, asking for a site in East Forty-sixth street. Referred to the Committee on Sites and New Schools.

From the Twenty-second Ward, relative to pay of a music teacher in evening school. Referred to the Committee on Evening Schools.

The President laid before the Board the report of the Superintendent of Truancy for the month of June. Entered in the minutes.

From the President of the College of New York, submitting a statement of the admissions from the schools to the college at the late examination. Entered in the minutes.

From the Superintendent of School Buildings, on the sanitary condition of Grammar School building No. 48. Entered in the minutes. Referred to the Committee on Buildings.

From J. W. Goodrich, Superintendent of the Chinese Mission School, asking for old books and slates, etc. Referred to the Committee on Supplies.

From the Heating and Sanitary Fountain Co., relative to their drinking apparatus for school buildings. Referred to the Committee on Supplies.

From Van Antwerp, Bragg & Co., asking that Harvey's English Grammar be added to the list of supplies. Referred to the Committee on Course of Study and School Books.

Reports were presented from Standing Committees, as follows:

By Commissioner Wickham, from the Committee on Normal College, recommending the appointment of five junior teachers in the Training Department. Adopted.

Also, to appoint Miss Isabella Parsells Superintendent of the Training Department. Adopted.

By Commissioner Halsted, from the Committee on Teachers, to pay difference of salary to Miss Hebbard, Grammar School No. 6. Referred to the Committee on By-laws, etc.

Also, adverse to paying salary of a deceased teacher for a period named, a successor having been immediately appointed. Adopted.

Also, to pay a deceased teacher's salary for the balance of the month. Adopted.

Also, two reports on appeals from Teachers. Which were adopted.

Commissioner Vermilye presented reports from the Finance Committee, as follows:

To appropriate \$1,320 for repairs and painting Primary School No. 26. Adopted.

On the "financial ability" to appropriate \$1,500 for rent for Primary School No. 6. Laid over.

To appropriate \$2,595 for repairs to Grammar School Buildings Nos. 40 and 42. Adopted.

To pay \$19.50 for chairs in the Nineteenth Ward. Adopted.

To appropriate \$256.30 for sundry searches, etc., on school property in East Seventh street and Downing street. Adopted.

Commissioner West presented reports from the Committee on By-laws, Elections, and Qualifications, recommending the adoption of the report of the Committee on Salaries and Economy relative to the salary of Miss Julia A. Clark, Branch Primary Department, Grammar School No. 4. Adopted.

Also, relative to an amendment to the by-laws. Laid over, under the rule.

Also, to amend section 133 of the by-laws. Adopted.

Commissioner Beardslee presented a report from the Committee on Evening Schools adverse to the establishing of an additional Evening High School. Laid over, and printed.

Also, adverse to changing the course of study in the Evening High School. Laid over and printed.

Commissioner Watson presented a report from the Committee on Buildings, to pay John Murphy a bill of \$132.14, for repairs in the Nineteenth Ward. Adopted, reconsidered, and referred to the Committee on By-laws, etc.

Also, several reports to pay bills for extra work, repairs, etc. Referred to the Finance Committee.

Commissioner Goulding presented reports from the Committee on School Furniture, recommending the payment of sundry bills from various wards, and the approval of the award of contracts for furniture for the Seventh, Tenth, Seventeenth, Nineteenth, and Twenty-fourth Wards. Referred to the Finance Committee.

Commissioner Dowd presented a report from the Auditing Committee, recommending the payment of sundry bills for incidental expenses, postage, printing, advertising, etc. Adopted.

The Board adjourned.
