

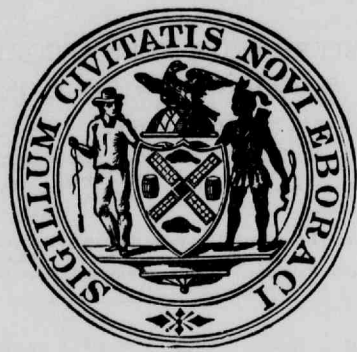

Whereas, The triumph of the Columbia College four, the representatives of American college oarsmen at the international regatta at Henley-on-the-Thames, London, on the memorable 4th and 5th days of July, 1878, redounds so directly and justly to the glory of our common country, that the governments and people of every section thereof should manifest their appreciation of the glorious victory there won by the most enthusiastic demonstrations of commendation and praise of the gallant four—Jasper T. Goodwin, Henry G. Risbeck, Cyrus Edson, and Edwin Sage—who so manfully upheld the honor of their native land, on the anniversary of its natal day, at the capital of the nation from whom, a century ago, we won our political independence, and who, until this great victory of Columbia College, claimed to be our superiors in manly sports and athletic games, particularly as oarsmen; and

Whereas, This brilliant achievement of a distinctively American college rowing crew, following so closely upon the victories of our American riflemen, and the admitted superiority of American yachtmen, proves conclusively that the men of this young republic have not deteriorated morally, mentally or physically, the assertions of the enemies of free government to the contrary notwithstanding, but proves, on the contrary, and most conclusively, that they are more than the equals of the best men in the old world, and that the glories of our free institutions is bearing its legitimate fruit—ambition, self-reliance, energy, and determination to succeed—being the chief characteristics of our countrymen; and

Whereas, The "Columbia Crew," being also distinctively the crew of a New York City rowing club, imposes upon the people and government of this city the duty of recognizing in an especial and particular manner the renown they have reflected upon the City of New York in winning the "Visitors' Cup," by defeating the crews of the Oxford and Cambridge Colleges, in the ever-memorable rowing race at Henley-on-the-Thames, in the city of London, on the 4th and 5th days of July, 1878; be it therefore

Resolved, That a special committee of five members of this Board, of whom the President shall be one, be appointed to receive the crew of the Columbia College Rowing Club on their arrival in this city, to welcome them home; to tender them the congratulations of the people and government of the City of New York upon their brilliant victories on the Thames, and to extend to them the use of the Governor's room in the City Hall, on any day that may best suit the convenience of the members of the crew, to receive personally the felicitations of their friends and our citizens generally; and be it further

Resolved, That a copy of this preamble and these resolutions be engrossed and framed, duly authenticated by the signatures of his Honor the Mayor and the President of the Board of Aldermen, the corporate seal affixed and attested by the Clerk of the Common Council, and presented to the President and Faculty of Columbia College, to be retained in the institution as a slight token of the appreciation of the people of the City of New York of the brilliant achievements of the Columbia College Crew of 1878 in defeating their competitors, the crews of Oxford and Cambridge Colleges, at the international rowing regatta, at the capital of the British empire, July 4 and 5, 1878.

NOTICE IN RELATION TO JURORS FOR STATE COURTS

OFFICE OF THE COMMISSIONER OF JURORS, NEW COUNTY COURT-HOUSE, NEW YORK, June 1, 1877.

APPLICATIONS FOR EXEMPTIONS WILL BE heard here, from 9 to 4 daily, from all persons hitherto liable or recently serving who have become exempt, and all needed information will be given.

Those who have not answered as to their liability, or proved permanent exemption, will receive a "jury enrollment notice," requiring them to appear before me this year. Whether liable or not, such notices must be answered (in person, if possible, and at this office only) under severe penalties. If exempt, the party must bring proof of exemption; if liable, he must also answer in person, giving full and correct name, residence, etc., etc. No attention paid to letters.

Persons "enrolled" as liable must serve when called or pay their fines. No mere excuse will be allowed or interference permitted. The fines, received from those who, for business or other reasons, are unable to serve at the time selected, pay the expenses of this office, and if unpaid will be entered as judgments upon the property of the delinquents.

All good citizens will aid the course of justice, and secure reliable and respectable juries, and equalize their duty by serving promptly when summoned, allowing their clerks or subordinates to serve, reporting to me any attempt at bribery or evasion, and suggesting names for enrollment. Persons between sixty and seventy years of age, summer absentees, persons temporarily ill, and United States and District Court jurors are not exempt.

Every man must attend to his own notice. It is a misdemeanor to give any jury paper to another to answer. It is also punishable by fine or imprisonment to give or receive any present or bribe, directly or indirectly, in relation to a jury service, or to withhold any paper or make any false statement, and every case will be fully prosecuted.

AT A MEETING OF THE BOARD OF HEALTH of the Health Department of the City of New York, held at its office on the 25th day of June, 1878, the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That Section 155 of the Sanitary Code be and is hereby amended so as to read as follows:

Section 155. That no captain, agent, or person having charge of, or attached to any ferry-boat, sailing, or other vessel, nor any person in charge of any car, stage, or other vehicle, or public or private conveyance, shall convey or allow to be conveyed thereon, or by any means aforesaid, nor shall any person convey or allow to be carried or conveyed, in any manner, from or in the City of New York, the dead body of any human being, or any part thereof, without a permit therefor from this Department. And the proper coupon for that purpose attached to any such permit, when issued shall be preserved and returned to this Department, as its regulations may require, by the proper officer or person on such boat or vessel, and by the proper person in charge of any train of cars or vehicle on which any such body may be carried from said city; provided, however, that the same effect shall be given, under this section, to a burial or transit permit issued by the health officer, or Board of Health of the City of Brooklyn, as to a burial or transit permit issued from this Department, when the death of the person named in the permit shall have occurred in the City of Brooklyn; and provided that the same effect shall be given under this section to a burial or transit permit issued by the Board of Health of the Vital Statistics of Richmond county, as to a burial permit from this Department, when the death of the person named in the permit shall have occurred in Richmond county; and provided that the same effect shall be given under this section to a burial or transit permit issued by the Board of Health, or health officer of the City of Yonkers, as to a burial or transit permit issued from this Department, when the death of the person named in the permit shall have occurred in said City of Yonkers.

And provided that the same effect shall be given under this section to a burial or transit permit issued under the laws of the State of New Jersey, and especially pursuant to provisions of an act of said State, entitled "An act concerning the registry and returns of marriages, births and deaths," passed April 5, 1878, as to a burial or transit permit issued from this Department, subject, nevertheless, in every case to all the care, precautions and diligence prescribed by the rules and regulations of this Department.
