

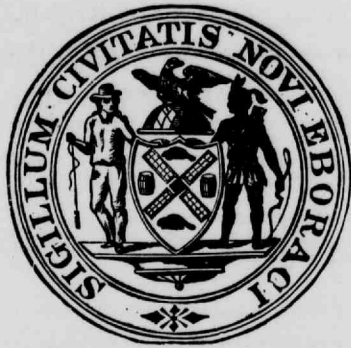

Special meeting, Wednesday, July 30, 1879.

The following communications were received. From Wm. Cauldwell and others, Local Improvement Committee of the North Side Association, relative to drainage of the Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards.

The accounts of the late Treasurer were reported upon as having been examined and found correct.

A requisition was received from the Metropolitan Museum of Art for scaffolds, and the same authorized purchased.

The resignation of Commissioner Conover, as Treasurer and Chairman of the Auditing Committee, was received and laid on the table.

All good citizens will aid the course of justice, and secure reliable and respectable juries, and equalize their duty by serving promptly when summoned, allowing their clerks or subordinates to serve, reporting to me any attempt at bribery or evasion, and suggesting names for enrollment. Persons between sixty and seventy years of age, summer absentees, persons temporarily ill, and United States and District Court jurors are not exempt.

Every man must attend to his own notice. It is a misdemeanor to give any jury paper to another to answer. It is also punishable by fine or imprisonment to give or receive any present or bribe, directly or indirectly, in relation to a jury service, or to withhold any paper or make any false statement, and every case will be fully prosecuted.
