From Sanitary Committee—Report on sale of Narcotic Poisons.

Permits Granted.

To drive cattle from West Sixtieth street and North river, along Sixtieth street to Tenth avenue, thence to and along Sixty-fifth street to Eighth avenue, through Ninety-seventh street to Fifth avenue, up Fifth avenue to One Hundred and Eighth street, through One Hundred and Eighth street to and along Second avenue to One Hundred and Sixth street, near East river, between the hours of 12 o'clock Wednesday night and 6 o'clock Thursday morning, August 13 and 14, 1879.

To drive eight cattle from One Hundred and Seventy-fifth street and Central avenue, through Central avenue to Eighth avenue, through Eighth avenue to Sixty-fourth street, through Sixty-fourth street to Tenth avenue, through Tenth avenue to Fortieth street and Eleventh avenue, between the hours of 12 o'clock Wednesday night and 6 o'clock Thursday morning, August 13 and 14.

Resolved, That the resolution respecting the driving of cattle, passed at the meeting of this Board, held August 5, 1879, be and is hereby amended so as to read as follows:

Resolved, That all permits to drive beef cattle in this city, between First and Eleventh avenues, and on either of said avenues, be and are hereby revoked, this resolution to take effect on and after August 8, 1879.

Resolved, That the second plan (No. 234), for light and ventilation of three proposed tenement-houses, with extensions on south side of Fifty-fifth street, 100 feet west of Third avenue, submitted to this Board, under Laws 1867, chapter 908, and Laws 1879, chapter 504, by Messrs. D. & J. Jardine, be and is hereby approved.

Resolved, That the second plan (No. 240), for light and ventilation of four tenement-houses proposed to be built on and adjoining the southwest corner of First avenue and Seventy-seventh street, submitted to this Board under Laws 1867, chapter 908, and Laws 1879, chapter 504, by John F. Sanitary Bureau.

The following is a record of the work performed in the Sanitary Bureau for the week ending August 9, 1879:

The number of inspections made by the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors was as follows, viz.: 1 public building, 761 tenement-houses, 120 private dwellings, 61 other dwellings, 19 manufactories and workshops, 30 stores and warehouses, 48 stables, 1 stock yard, 15 slaughter-houses, 1 fat melting establishment, 2 lodging-houses, 1 head picking establishment, 1 lime kiln, 1 garbage dump, 3 manure dumps, 19 sunken and vacant lots, 1 pier, 2 oil works, 1 public sewer, 2 bone houses, 59 yards, courts and areas, 59 cellars and basements, 86 waste-pipes and drains, 180 privies and water-closets, 42 streets, gutters, and sidewalks, 2 dangerous stairways, 4 smoky chimneys, 2 cesspools, 1 piggery, 22 other nuisances, together with 42 visits of the Sanitary Inspectors to cases of contagious disease.

The number of reports thereon received from the Inspectors was 658.

During the past week 290 complaints were received from citizens and referred to the Sanitary Inspectors for investigation and report.

Permits were issued to the consignees of 98 vessels to discharge cargoes, on vouchers from the Health Officer of the Port.

201 permits were granted scavengers to empty, clean, and disinfect privy sinks.

The Disinfecting Corps have visited 45 premises where contagious diseases were found, and have disinfected and fumigated 42 houses, 42 privy sinks, together with clothing, bedding, etc.

One patient sick with contagious disease was removed to Hospital by the Ambulance Corps.

The Special Disinfecting Corps have disinfected 3,642 privies, 236 yards, 162 cellars, 350 garbage boxes, and 79 3-16 miles of street-gutters.

Bureau of Vital Statistics.

The certificates of 526 births, 39 still-births, 107 marriages, and 710 deaths, reported to have taken place in this city, were received by this bureau during the week ending Saturday, August 9, 1879. This shows a decrease of 12 births, 7 still-births, 4 marriages, and an increase of 74 deaths, when compared with the number received during the preceding week, but when compared with the corresponding week of the year 1878, there was an increase of 94 births, 7 marriages and 150 deaths, and a decrease of 9 still-births. Compared with the mortality reported during the preceding week, the deaths from scarlatina decreased 2; whooping-cough 6; erysipelas 3; yellow fever 1; puerperal diseases 1; phthisis pulmonalis, 7; bronchitis, 3; heart diseases, 1; aneurism 1; meningitis and encephalitis, 1; apoplexy, 1; cirrhosis and hepatitis, 4; enteritis, gastritis, and peritonitis, 3; while the deaths from measles increased 2; diphtheria, 3; typhoid fever, 2; cerebro-spinal fever, 1; malarial fevers, 1; diarrhoeal diseases, 45; inanition, 3; alcoholism, 6; rheumatism and gout, 2; cancer, 4; pneumonia, 2; marasmus, tabes mesenterica and scrofula, 6; hydrocephalus and tubercular meningitis, 3; convulsions, 3; direct effect of solar heat, 9; all diseases of the brain and nervous system, 13; Bright's disease and nephritis, 3; cyanosis and atelectasis, 3; premature and preterm births, 14; drowning, 1. The deaths from small-pox, croup, and suicide were the same as those reported for the preceding week.

Deaths from the principal Zymotic Diseases, Phthisis Pulmonalis, Pneumonia, Bronchitis, and Children under five years of age, reported during the week and compared with the three preceding weeks.

The ages of 294 of the persons who died during the week were reported to be under one year; 360 under two years; 400 under five years, and 30 seventy years and over, which shows that the deaths of children under five years of age was 63 more than the number reported during last week, and represent 56.34 per cent. of the total weekly mortality.

Of the total number of deaths reported for the week, 143 were in institutions, 385 in tenement houses, 164 in houses containing 3 families or less, 5 in hotels and boarding-houses, 12 in rivers, streets, boats, etc.; 8 were on the basement floor, 134 on the first, 178 on the second, 139 on the third, 69 on the fourth, 24 on the fifth, 2 on the sixth. 704 were stated to be residents of New York City, and 6 non-resident. 56 were stated to be single, 144 married, 59 widowed, and the condition of 451 was not stated; these were children who had not attained a marriageable age.

The total number of burial permits issued during the week are as follows: City deaths, 710; still-births, 39; bodies in transitu, 37. Of the total burial permits issued for city deaths and still-births 76 were upon certificates received from the Coroners. 526 births, 107 marriages, 39 still-births, 710 deaths, 37 applications for transit permits were recorded, indexed, and tabulated. 30 searches of the registers of births, marriages, and deaths were made, and 2 transcripts of the birth record, 5 of marriage, and 20 of death were issued during the week.

The mean temperature for the week ending August 9, 1879, was 75 degrees Fahr., the mean reading of the barometer was 29.762, the mean humidity was 65, saturation being 100, the number of miles traveled by the wind was 599, and the total amount of rain-fall was 1.20 inches depth of water, as reported by D. Draper, Director of the New York Meteorological Observatory, Central Park.

The disposition of 679 deaths and still-births, or 90.65 per cent. of the total number reported, was in the following 14 cemeteries: Bayside (Jewish), 14; Calvary (Roman Catholic), 284; City, (pauper burial ground—undenominational), 127; Greenwood (undenominational), 42; Lutheran, (undenominational), 92; Cypress Hills (undenominational), 18; Evergreen (undenominational), 45; Woodlawn (undenominational), 16; St. Michael's (Protestant Episcopal), 13; Union (Methodist Protestant), 3; Holy Cross (Roman Catholic), 10; Machpelah, L. I. (Jewish), 3; St. Raymond's (Roman Catholic), 3; Washington (undenominational), 9.

The distribution of deaths (actual mortality) for the week ending August 2, 1879, was in the following wards, viz.: First, 9; Second, 0; Third, 4; Fourth, 10; Fifth, 6; Sixth, 16; Seventh, 20; Eighth, 26; Ninth, 27; Tenth, 33; Eleventh, 31; Twelfth, 76; Thirteenth, 12; Fourteenth, 13; Fifteenth, 5; Sixteenth, 19; Seventeenth, 48; Eighteenth, 33; Nineteenth, 109; Twentieth, 54; Twenty-first, 48; Twenty-second, 69; Twenty-third, 15; Twenty-fourth, 5.

The actual mortality for the week ending August 2, 1879, was 692; this is 124 more than the number that occurred during the corresponding week of the year 1878, and 33.8 more than the average of the corresponding weeks of the past five years, and represents an annual death-rate of 32.76 per 1,000 persons living, the population estimated at 1,098,545.

The annual death-rate per 1,000 persons living, of the estimated or enumerated population, according to the most recent weekly returns, of Philadelphia was 19.09; Brooklyn, 23.49; St. Louis, 15.6; Baltimore, 23.15; Boston, 31.05; New Orleans, 23.77; San Francisco, 14.20; Cleveland 26.9; Richmond 13.65; Charleston, 41.05; Lowell, 27.38; Worcester, 26.81; Cambridge, 18.77; Fall River, 37.63; Lawrence, 32.76; Lynn, 23.01; Springfield, 19.86.
