### BOARD OF ESTIMATE AND APPORTIONMENT.

BOARD OF ESTIMATE AND APPORTIONMENT—CITY OF NEW YORK, }  
MAYOR'S OFFICE, CITY HALL, }  
TUESDAY, December 16, 1879—2 o'clock P. M. }

The Board met in pursuance of an adjournment.

Present, all the members, viz.: Edward Cooper, the Mayor of the City of New York; John Kelly, the Comptroller of the City of New York; Jordan L. Mott, the President of the Board of Aldermen; John Wheeler, the President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments.

The minutes of the meeting held December 13, 1879, were read and approved.

The Comptroller moved to reconsider the vote on the following resolution, acted upon at meeting of December 13, 1879:

Resolved, That the sum of twelve hundred dollars be and the same is hereby transferred from the appropriation made to the Department of Buildings for the year 1879, entitled "Contingencies—Department of Buildings," which is in excess of the amount required for the purposes or objects thereof, to the appropriation made to the same Department for the year 1879, entitled "Salaries—Department of Buildings," which is insufficient.

Which was agreed to.

The Comptroller then offered for adoption the said resolution.

The Chairman put the question whether the Board would agree with said resolution.

Which was decided in the affirmative by the following vote, viz.:

Affirmative—The Comptroller of the City of New York, the President of the Board of Aldermen, and the President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments—3.

Negative—The Mayor of the City of New York (Chairman)—1.

The Comptroller presented a communication from the Police Department, dated December 15, 1879, asking for the transfer of an appropriation.

Which was referred to, and the original paper sent to the Comptroller.

The Comptroller presented the following communication:

HEALTH DEPARTMENT—No. 301 MOTT STREET, }  
NEW YORK, December 15, 1879. }

JOHN KELLY, Esq., Comptroller:

SIR—At a meeting of the Board of Health, held this day, it was

Resolved, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment be and is hereby requested to transfer the sum of \$1,248.99 from the appropriation made to the Health Department for the year 1877, entitled "Rebuilding Small Pox Hospital," which is in excess of the amount required for the purposes or objects thereof, to the appropriation made for the year 1879, entitled "Judgments and Claims," said amount being required to pay a judgment obtained against the city by Messrs. Gibb & O'Reilly for damages caused by failure of the city to carry out a contract for building a Small Pox Hospital between Twenty-sixth and Twenty-eighth streets and East river.

Resolved, That the sum of twelve hundred and forty-eight dollars and ninety-nine cents be and the same is hereby transferred from the appropriation made to the Health Department for the year 1877, entitled "Rebuilding Small-Pox Hospital," which is in excess of the amount required for the purpose, to the appropriation made for the year 1879, entitled "Judgments and Claims," which is insufficient.

The Chairman put the question whether the Board would agree with said resolution.

Which was decided in the affirmative by the following vote, viz.:

Affirmative—The Mayor of the City of New York (Chairman), the Comptroller of the City of New York, the President of the Board of Aldermen, and the President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments—4.

The Comptroller presented a communication from the Board of Excise, requesting the Board to set aside the sum of \$3,132.55 from the Excise Fund, for the purpose of paying the expenses of the late trial of Richard J. Morrisson and Philip Merkle, Commissioners of Excise, charged with unlawfully granting a license.

Which was referred to the Counsel to the Corporation, for his opinion as to the power of the Board in the premises.

The President of the Board of Aldermen presented a communication from "The Home for the Aged of the Little Sisters of the Poor," dated October 20, asking for an appropriation.

Which was referred to, and the original paper sent to the Comptroller.

The Chairman offered for adoption the following resolution:

Resolved, That the heads of departments be notified that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, in acting upon the final estimate for the year 1880, will consider any communication, in writing, on the subject of the appropriations for their respective departments which they may deem it important to lay before the Board; such Communications to be submitted on or before 1 o'clock, P. M., Friday (10th) next.

And put the question whether the Board would agree with said resolution.

Which was decided in the affirmative by the following vote, viz.:

Affirmative—The Mayor of the City of New York (Chairman), the Comptroller of the City of New York, the President of the Board of Aldermen, and the President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments—4.

The Chairman moved that when the Board adjourn it do so to meet on Friday, December 19, 1879, at one o'clock, P. M.

Which was agreed to.
