

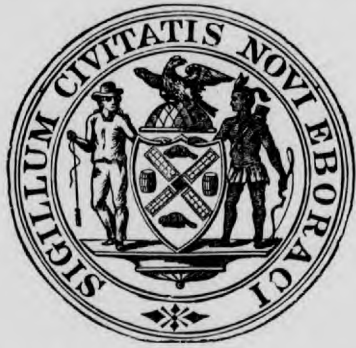

Shafer, shall, when adopted and printed, be as follows: "Ordinances of the Mayor, Aldermen, and Commonalty of the City of New York, revised A. D. 1879, with the amendments thereto, and additional ordinances passed since the last revision; revised by Elliott F. Sheppard and Ebenezer B. Shafer, Commissioners appointed for that purpose. Adopted by the Common Council and published by their authority." That the revision shall be in style uniform with former revisions, viz.: by chapters, titles, and sections, each chapter to begin with section I, unless divided by titles, when the chapter shall begin by title I, section I; that the revision be continued so as to embrace the whole of the year 1879, and that a copy of said revision, duly certified and authenticated by the signatures of the said Commissioners, be deposited in the office of the Clerk of the Common Council, preparatory to the adoption and publication thereof.
