

BOARD OF ESTIMATE AND APPORTIONMENT.

Board of Estimate and Apportionment—City of New York, Mayor's Office, City Hall, Wednesday, February 11, 1880, 2 o'clock p. m.

The Board met in pursuance of the following call:

In pursuance of the authority contained in the 112th section of chapter 335, being an act entitled "An act to reorganize the local government of the City of New York, "passed April 30, 1873; and section 1 of chapter 779, being an act entitled "An act in relation to raising money by taxation in the County of New York, for county purposes," passed June 14, 1873; and chapter 304, being an act entitled "An act in relation to the estimates and apportionment for the government of the City and County of New York, and further to regulate the same," passed April 30, 1874; and chapter 303, being an act entitled "An act in relation to the estimates and apportionment for the support of the government of the County of New York," passed April 30, 1874; and chapter 308, being an act entitled "An act in relation to the estimates and apportionment for the support of the government of the City of New York," passed May 1, 1874—a meeting is hereby called of the Mayor, Comptroller, President of the Board of Aldermen, and the President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments, constituting a Board of Estimate and Apportionment, to be held at the office of the Mayor, on Wednesday, February 11, 1880, at 2 o'clock P. M., for the purpose of acting upon a communication from the Department of Public Works, requesting the trrosfer of \$15,500 from the appropriation "Aqueduct—Repairs and Maintenance, and Strengthening," 1880, to "Expense of laying four-feet Croton mains, etc.," 1880, and for the transaction of such other business as may come before the Board.

The minutes of the meeting held January 27, 1880, were read and approved.

Hon. EDWARD COOPER, Mayor, and Chairman Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

Hon. Edward Cooper, Mayor, and Chairman Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

Sir.—In the Final Estimate for 1880 your Board allowed the sum of \$60,000, asked in the Departmental Estimate for laying four-foot pipes in Eighth avenue and in Ninetieth street, in place of the six-feet pipes, forming part of the conduit for bringing water into the city reservoirs. The Departmental Estimate was made last August, since which time the prices of iron, lead, and labor required for this work have risen very considerably, so that the lowest bids for the contracts for furnishing and laying the new pipe, received and opened at the letting on the 23d inst., amount in the aggregate to \$75,293.25. The contracts cannot be signed unless the deficiency in the appropriation is supplied, as their estimated cost becomes a liability against the appropriation as soon as they are executed. The old six-feet pipes are now, and have been for years, in imminent danger of breaking and causing great injury. The large sums expended upon them for repairs have been a charge upon the appropriation for "Aqueduct Repairs and Maintenance," and any repairs they may require hereafter in consequence of any delay or inability to substitute the tour-feet pipes would have to be charged to that account. I have to request, therefore, that the sum of \$15,500 be transferred from the appropriation for "Aqueduct Repairs and Maintenance and Strengthening," for 1880, to the appropriation for "Expense of laying four-feet Croton-mains, etc.," for 1880, in order that the contracts may be executed as early as possible.

In the Final Estimate and Apportionment:

In the Final Estimate for each of the years 1879 and 1880, an appropriation of \$14,400 was made under the title of "Salaries of Janitors of Civil and Police Courts," to pay the salaries of twelve Janitors, at \$1,200 each per annum, in the Civil and Police Courts.

The following condition was attached to the appropriation in each year:

"No portion of this appropriation, however, is to be paid by the Comptroller until the question is judicially determined, on an adjusted case or otherwise, in whom by law the appointment of Janitors of these Courts is placed. It is claimed on one hand that the appointment is in the Board of Police Justices and the Justices of the Civil Courts, and on the other, that the appointment is in the Commissioner of Public Works. The City is not to be burdened with the expense of two sets of Janitors."

In September, 1879, James McCullough, Janitor of the Second District Civil Court, John Murphy, Janitor of the Fourth District Civil Court, and Samuel Barclay, Janitor of the Eighth District Civil Court, presented their claims for salary to this Department. It was ascertained that each of the persons named held the office of Janitor by the appointment of the Justice of the Court, and also by the appointment of the Commissioner of Public Works. As no legal reason existed why their salaries should not be paid, as there was no conflict of authority in these cases, I recommended the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to pass a resolution authorizing the Comptroller to pay the salaries of these Innitors. This resolution was adopted on the 30th of September, 1879, and under it the salaries of these three persons have been paid for the year 1879.

William J. Kennedy who is acting as Janitor of the Third District Civil Court, or rather of the building wherein that Court is located, by the appointment of the Commissioner of Public Works brought suit against the city for his claim for salary as Janitor, and the Court of Appeals has recently rendered a decision in the case, dismissing the proceedings, for the reason that the case as made up and presented to the Court did not show all the facts. The effect of the decision is to prevent the payment of salary to the Janitors of the Police and District Courts, where here are contesting incumbents of the office, until the Courts pass upon an action or submission to which all the claimants are parties, and then only when the power of appointment of Janitors is exclusively vested either in the Justices of the Courts or in the Commissioner of Public Works, as there cannot be two sets of Janitors paid by the City

Provided, however, if any conflict of authority arise affecting any of the above persons, they shall no longer be entitled to payment of their salaries under this resolution; and provided, further, that the pay-rolls of these persons shall be certified to the Finance Department by the officers from whom they hold appointments.

The Mayor submitted the application of the Commissioners of Public Charities and Correction "for a suitable plot of land for the erection of a Lying-in Asylum in this city, for which appropriation has been made by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, for Maternity Hospital," which, on motion, was referred to the Comptroller.

The Mayor submitted the application of M. & S. Sternberger for reduction of rate of interest from 7 to 6 per cent. on bonds and mortgages, held by the corporation of the City of New York and past due, which, on motion, was referred to the Comptroller.

The Comptroller submitted the following resolution, which, on motion, was adopted, viz.:

Resolved, That the Comptroller in accordance with subdivision 11, of section 6, of the act, chapter 574, of the Laws of 1871, be and hereby is directed to prepare and issue, from time to time, as he may deem necessary to meet the requirements of the Dock Department, one hundred thousand

dollars (\$100,000) Dock bonds of the City of New York, for the purpose of raising moneys necessary to carry out the provisions of said act, relating to the Department of Docks, its powers and duties; the said amount being on account of the requisition of the Commissioners of Docks, dated November 20, 1879, for two hundred and fifty thousand dollars (\$250,000).

The Mayor submitted a letter from the Clerk of the Senate Committee on Cities, in response to the resolution of this Board adopted at the last meeting; notifying "the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, that Mr. Astor's Bill for the removal of the reservoir from Murray Hill is set down for Tuesday, February 17th, when they can have a hearing."

The Comptroller called attention to the provisions of a bill, now before the Committee on Cities of the Assembly, at Albany, in relation to certain improvements in the City of New York, known as "The West Street Improvement Bill," and submitted the following preamble and resolutions, viz.: Whereas, By virtue of the provisions of the amended charter of 1870, of the City of New York, the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty are vested with the title to certain lands under water, around the city for public uses for the construction of wharves, piers, bulkheads, basins, and slips for the permanent improvement of the water front of the city, under plans to be approved by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund; and

Whereas, The said Mayor, Aldermen, and Commonalty are to become vested with all portions of the water front not owned by the corporation, when the same shall become permanently improved under the said plans, the said charter, as re-enacted by the charter of 1873, requiring the corporation to acquire all rights and titles in such portions before proceeding with the work of improving the premises, and

under the said plans, the said charter, as re-enacted by the charter of 1873, requiring the corporation to acquire all rights and titles in such portions before proceeding with the work of improving the premises, and

Whereas, The said land under water conveyed by the said grant has been taken possession of by the Department of Docks on behalf of the Mayor, Aldermen, and Commonalty, in progressing with the said work of permanently improving the water front, and a large sum of money, the proceeds of dock bonds issued by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund for the purpose, has already been expended in erecting nearly a mile of the new bulkhead wall, together with nearly twenty new piers under the new plan adopted; and

Whereas, The Commissioners of the Sinking Fund are the custodians and trustees of all corporation lands and other property, to be held as a security for the redemption of the city debt; and

Whereas, An act has been introduced into the present Legislature for the purpose of requiring the corporation to give title in perpetuity for such portions of the new bulkhead as may be constructed in front of existing or old bulkheads, to the persons who may establish a claim to the rights in such existing or old bulkheads; provided the said persons shall pay to the corporation within four years time \$125 per lineal foot of bulkhead claimed; and also for the purpose of increasing the width of the new bulkhead from about twelve feet to a width of fifty feet, and gives, free of rent or expense, to the said persons the right to cover such space with warehouses for receiving, shipping, and storage of merchandise; and

Whereas, The Department of Docks, in progressing with the work, has been legally advised by two successive Counsels to the Corporation and by the opinion of Charles O'Conor that "rights" of bulkheads, unprotected by a grant of land under water in front of and beyond the existing structure, comprise no title or ownership in fee for the corporation to acquire, in permanently improving the water front

the city invaded no right of the old bulkhead in making use of its land on the outside thereof; therefore,

Resolved, That the Board of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund of the City of New York, hereby respectfully requests, that the Honorable Committee on the Affairs of Cities, to whom the said act has been referred by the Assembly, will report unfavorably thereon, as in the judgment of the members of the said Board such action should prevail, for the following reasons:

First—The Legislature of 1871 having vested the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of the City of New York with the title to certain land under water around the city, neither the present Legislature nor any subsequent one can dispose of any portion of said land.

Second—The grant for the said land under water conveyed title thereto to the said Mayor, etc., for the construction of wharves, piers, etc., to be erected and laid out from plans prepared and approved under the provisions of the Charter of the city, which required the corporation to acquire title to its entire water front; so that this land under water became deeded solely for public purposes, and the city cannot be required to pass title for any portion of it without causing a forfeiture of the grant made by the State.

grant made by the State.

Third—The improved bulkhead property, the wall, piers, and street erected at the expense of the corporation from the proceeds of dock bonds issued under the provisions of the City Charter, upon land under water, the property of the corporation, is public property, and together with its revenue, is pledged for the redemption of the city debt, and cannot be disposed of for a fixed price by leavillability engagings.

legislative enactment.

Fourth—The cost of making the permanent improvement of the water front is approximately estimated at say \$450 per lineal foot, including the paving, curbing, and sewering of the new width of the street; while this act proposes to require the city to give title forever to this properly upon the payment to it of \$125 per lineal foot, and the taxpayers to pay say \$325 per lineal foot for improving property to be owned by a few favored individuals, and to lose all revenues therefrom forever.

Fifth—The plans adopted under the provisions of said Charter stipulate that West street shall be widened to a width of 250 feet, while this act reduces its width to 200 feet, by erecting on the exterior 50 feet, warehouses 50 feet deep, thereby shutting off the bulkhead from free use by the public with a continuous row of buildings.

Sixth—It is believed and held to be most unwise, and certainly most unjust, to the taxpayers of the city to enact a law proposing to compromise as for damages sustained by a few individuals for certain rights or privileges, extinguished (as was contemplated they should be when granted), consequent upon the erection of public improvements now demanded by the increased growth of the city, when the corporation has been advised, by the decision of the Supreme Court, that the city invades no right of the old or former bulkhead in erecting a new bulkhead on corporation property outside thereof.

Seventh—The present law, as provided in section 6, chapter 574, Laws of 1871, is believed to be ample to enable the Department of Docks to progress with the work of the permanent improvement as rapidly as the requirements and necessities of the commerce of the city may demand and permit.

Resolved, That this preamble and these resolutions be spread in full upon the minutes, and that the Comptroller be requested to transmit, without delay, a copy of the same, duly signed by every member of the Board, to the Honorable Committee on the Affairs of Cities of the Assembly at

Albany.
