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COMMISSIONERS OF THE SINKING FUND.

Abstract of the Proceedings of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, at the meeting held October 6, 1882.

Present—William R. Grace, Mayor; Frederick Smyth, Recorder; Allan Campbell, Comptroller, and J. Nelson Tappan, Chamberlain.

The minutes of the meetings held July 14 and September 6, 1882, were read and approved.

The Comptroller submitted the following report, viz.:

FINANCE DEPARTMENT—COMPTRROLLER'S OFFICE,
October 6, 1882.

To the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund:

GENTLEMEN—Bonds and stocks of the City and County of New York, amounting to two million and fifty thousand three hundred and four dollars and forty-six cents (\$2,050,304.46), become due and payable on November 1, 1882, as follows:

7 per cent. Street Opening and Improvement Bonds.....	\$250,000 00

Payment of these bonds and stocks from "The Sinking Fund for the Redemption of the City Debt," is provided for by section 6 of chapter 383, of the Laws of 1878, as follows, to wit.:

"The Commissioners of the Sinking Fund are hereby authorized and empowered to call in, "pay and redeem any portion of the bonded debt, now or charge upon the treasury of the said City, "other than Revenue Bonds issued in anticipation of the collection of taxes, when they may deem "it to be advantageous for the interest of the City so to do. . . . and any part of "said bonded debt falling due, not exchanged for or redeemed from the proceeds of consolidated "stock as herein provided, may be paid from said Sinking Fund for the Redemption of the City "Debt," provided such "payment shall not in any way impair the preferred claims thereon, as in "the preceding section specified; and provided, also, the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund shall "deem it to be for the best interests of the City that such payment shall be so made."

The moneys of the Sinking Fund for the Redemption of the City Debt will be sufficient to pay off said bonds and stocks without impairing in any way the preferred claims thereon; and, deeming it to be for the best interests of the City that such payment shall be made, I submit and recommend the adoption of a resolution for that purpose.

Resolved, That the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, deeming it to be for the best interests of the City that such payment should be so made, do hereby authorize and direct that the payment be made from "The Sinking Fund for the Redemption of the City Debt," of the Bonds of the City and County of New York, which fall due on November 1, 1882, amounting to two million and fifty thousand three hundred and four dollars and forty-six cents (\$2,050,304.46), to wit.:

The following communication was received from the Commissioners of Docks, viz.:

CITY OF NEW YORK—DEPARTMENT OF DOCKS,
NEW YORK, September 13, 1882.

Hon. WILLIAM R. GRACE, Mayor and Chairman of Board of Commissioners of the Sinking Fund of the City of New York:

SIR—At a meeting of the Board governing this Department, held this date, the following resolution was adopted, to wit.:

"Resolved, That the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, pursuant to authority vested in them, "by subdivision 11 of section 6, chapter 574, Laws of 1871, be and are hereby respectfully "requested to direct the Comptroller of the City of New York to prepare and issue 'Dock Bonds "of the City of New York,' for the amount of (\$250,000) two hundred and fifty thousand dollars, "for the uses and purposes of the Department of Docks."

Whereupon, the Comptroller submitted the following resolution, which, on motion, was unanimously adopted, viz.:

Resolved, That the Comptroller, in accordance with subdivision 11 of section 6 of chapter 574 of the Laws of 1871, be and hereby is authorized and directed to prepare and issue, from time to time, as he may deem necessary to meet the requirements of the Department of Docks, "Dock Bonds of the City of New York," to the amount of two hundred and fifty thousand dollars (\$250,000), for the purpose of raising moneys necessary to carry out the provisions of said act relating to said Department, its powers and duties, the said sum being the amount of the requisition of the Dock Department, dated September 13, 1882.

The Comptroller submitted the petition of the Citizens Association of the Fourth Ward, Long Island City, that from the expiration of the present lease of the Thirty-fourth Street Ferry, November 1st, 1882, the fare on said ferry be reduced from four to two cents for each foot-passenger.

Hon. James W. Covert, Hon. John J. Cullen, J. P. Gleason, Esq., and John Higgs, Esq., respectively addressed the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund in relation to the subject.

Laid over for consideration.

The Comptroller, to whom was referred the application for lease of a ferry from the vicinity of James slip, East river, to Bridge street, Brooklyn, submitted the following report, viz.:

FINANCE DEPARTMENT—COMPTRROLLER'S OFFICE,
NEW YORK, October 2d, 1882.

To the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund:

GENTLEMEN:—The Comptroller, to whom was referred an application for a lease of the franchise of a ferry to run from a point near James slip, East river, to Bridge street, Brooklyn, respectfully presents the following

REPORT :

On October 15, 1863, a resolution was adopted by the Common Council, notwithstanding the objections of his Honor the Mayor, authorizing the Comptroller to advertise and sell at public auction, a lease for a ferry from the slip between Piers 32 and 33, East river, New York (adjoining James slip), and the foot of Bridge street, Brooklyn, for the term of ten years, from the first day of May, 1864, provided that the purchaser of such ferry lease shall procure, at his own risk and expense, the slips designated, and also suitable ferry boats for the accommodation of the public, and charge the usual rates of ferrage thereon.

Under this authority, the lease of the ferry was sold and made to the New York and Brooklyn Ferry Company, for the term of ten years, from May 1, 1864, at a yearly rent of \$600.

When the lease expired, on May 1, 1874, the ferry was abandoned, and it has not been run since that time. As the authority to operate the ferry ceased when the lease expired, a resolution of the Common Council to re-establish it is now requisite.

The New York and Brooklyn Ferry Company hold a lease of the slip between Piers 32 and 33, East river, from private owners, which expires May 1, 1883.

The ferry-houses, racks, etc., are very much decayed, and are not now in a condition to be used for ferry purposes.

It is represented that a ferry between the points mentioned in the application for a lease of the franchise is greatly needed by a large and growing section of the City of Brooklyn, and that the property-owners, proprietors of factories and residents interested, are prepared to provide suitable landings and ferry-boats to accommodate the public and operate the ferry at moderate rates of ferrage, and to lease the franchise from the city for the term of ten years at a reasonable yearly rental.

The application for the establishment of the ferry has been approved by his Honor the Mayor of Brooklyn and other public authorities of that city.

It is believed that the interests of the cities of New York and Brooklyn will be thereby materially promoted.

I recommend, therefore, that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund request the Common Council to pass a resolution or ordinance, to establish a ferry between the points mentioned in the application for a lease of the franchise, and submit a resolution for that purpose.

Whereas, A large number of property-owners, manufacturers, and residents in the City of Brooklyn, have applied to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund for a lease of the franchise of a ferry between a point near James slip, East river, in the City of New York, and the foot of Bridge street, in the City of Brooklyn, and,

Whereas, A ferry is not now established by the Common Council of the City of New York between those points, and a lease of the franchise or right to operate such ferry cannot be sold or entered into until the Common Council shall establish it, and,

Whereas, It appears that the public interests will be promoted by the operation of such ferry, therefore,

Resolved, That the Common Council of the City of New York be and is hereby respectfully requested to pass an ordinance to establish said ferry, and authorize the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund to sell and lease the same, as provided by law, and on such terms and conditions as will promote and secure the public interests, the ferrage to be fixed at reasonable and moderate rates, not exceeding two cents for each foot-passenger.

The report was accepted, and, on motion, the resolution was adopted.

A communication was received from John T. Hanemann, President of the German Hospital, in relation to extension of its lease, which, on motion, was referred to the Comptroller.

SIR--There were 547 deaths reported to have occurred in this city during the week ending Saturday, September 30, 1882, which is a decrease of 88, as compared with the number reported the preceding week, and 231 less than were reported during the corresponding week of the year 1881. The actual mortality for the week ending September 23, 1882, was 623, which is 60.6 above the average for the corresponding week for the past five years, and represents an annual death-rate of 25.15 per 1,000 persons living, the population estimated at 1,288,074.
