HEALTH DEPARTMENT OF THE CITY OF NEW YORK, NEW YORK, November 21, 1882.

The Board met this day.

Sanitary Bureau.

The following is a record of the work performed in the Sanitary Bureau for the week ending November 18, 1882.

The total number of inspections made by the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors was 1498, as follows, viz.: 2 public buildings, 738 tenement-houses, 87 private dwellings, 55 other dwellings, 7 manufacturing and workshops, 12 stores and warehouses, 46 stables, 25 slaughter-houses, 1 lodging-house, 2 lard-rendering establishments, 1 brewery, 1 mill, 26 sunken and vacant lots, 66 yards, courts and areas, 75 cellars and basements, 149 waste-pipes and drains, 184 privies and water-closets, 7 streets, gutters and sidewalks, 12 dangerous stairways, 1 smoky chimney, 1 cesspool, and 10 other nuisances.

The number of reports thereon received from the Inspectors was 499. During the past week 118 complaints were received from citizens and referred to the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors for investigation and report.

42 permits were issued to the consignees of vessels to discharge cargoes, on vouchers from the Health Officer of the Port. 72 permits were granted scavengers to empty, clean, and disinfect privy sinks.

Bureau of Vital Statistics.

The certificates of 533 births, 55 still-births, 284 marriages, and 582 deaths, reported to have taken place in this city, were received by this Bureau during the week ending Saturday, November 18, 1882. This shows a decrease of 14 births, an increase of 37 marriages and 19 deaths, and the same number of still-births, when compared with the number received during the preceding week; but when compared with the corresponding week of the year 1881, there was an increase of 84 births and 25 marriages, a decrease of 97 deaths, and the same number of still-births.

Deaths from the principal Zymotic Diseases, Phthisis Pulmonalis, Pneumonia, Bronchitis, and Children under five years of age, reported during the week and compared with the three preceding weeks.

The ages of 129 of the persons who died during the week were reported to be under one year, 156 under two years, 189 under five years, and 64 seventy years and over, which shows that the deaths of children under five years of age was 29 less than the number reported during last week, and represent 32.47 per cent. of the total weekly mortality.

Deaths reported from Small-pox, Measles, Scarlatina, Diphtheria, Membranous Croup, Whooping Cough, Typhus, Typhoid, Cerebro-Spinal, and Malarial Fevers, in Institutions, Tenement and other Dwellings, with Average Age, Floor, and Ward where the Death occurred, and the Hour of Death, for the week ending November 18, 1882.

Of the total number of deaths reported for the week, 141 were in institutions, 280 in tenement-houses, 148 in houses containing three families or less, 8 in hotels and boarding-houses, 4 in rivers, streets, boats, etc.; 10 were on the basement floor, 111 on the first, 155 on the second, 81 on the third, 59 on the fourth, 20 on the fifth, 0 on the sixth; 581 were stated to be residents of New York City, and 1 non-resident; 58 were stated to be single, 176 married, 80 widowed, and the condition of 268 was not stated; these were children who had not attained a marriageable age.

The total number of burial permits issued during the week are as follows, viz.: City deaths, 582; still-births, 55; bodies in transitu, 15; of the total burial permits issued for city and still-births 66 were upon certificates received from the Coroners; 533 births; 284 marriages; 55 still-births; 582 deaths; 15 applications for transit permits were recorded, indexed, and tabulated, 134 searches of the registers of births, marriages, and deaths were made, and 5 transcripts of the birth record, 11 of marriage, and 48 of death were issued during the week.

The mean temperature for the week ending November 18, 1882, was 42.1 degrees Fahr., the mean reading of the barometer was 29.959, the mean humidity was 88, saturation being 100, the number of miles traveled by the wind was 1,148, and the total amount of rain-fall was 0.35 inch depth of water, as reported by D. Draper, Ph.D., Director of the New York Meteorological Observatory, Central Park.

The disposition of 554 deaths and still-births, or 86.97 per cent. of the total number reported, was in the following 14 cemeteries: Bayside (Jewish), 16; Calvary (Roman Catholic), 219; City pauper burial ground (undenominational), 107; Greenwood (undenominational), 32; Lutheran (undenominational), 78; Cypress Hills (undenominational), 18; Evergreen (undenominational), 29; Woodlawn (undenominational), 29; St. Michael's (Protestant Episcopal), 9; Union (Methodist Protestant), 3; Holy Cross (Roman Catholic), 3; Machpelah, L. I. (Jewish), 1; St. Raymond's (Roman Catholic), 3; Washington (undenominational), 7.

The distribution of deaths (actual mortality) for the week ending November 11, 1882, was in the following wards, viz.: First, 15; Second, 0; Third, 1; Fourth, 10; Fifth, 10; Sixth, 6; Seventh, 18; Eighth, 14; Ninth, 13; Tenth, 23; Eleventh, 33; Twelfth, 56; Thirteenth, 6; Fourteenth, 11; Fifteenth, 5; Sixteenth, 18; Seventeenth, 43; Eighteenth, 29; Nineteenth, 123; Twentieth, 31; Twenty-first, 54; Twenty-second, 54; Twenty-third, 14; Twenty-fourth, 7.

The actual mortality for the week ending November 11, 1882, was 594; this is 39 less than the number that occurred during the corresponding week of the year 1881, and 76.4 more than the average of the corresponding weeks of the past five years, and represents an annual death-rate of 23.89 per 1,000 persons living, the population estimated at 1,292,334.

The annual death-rate per 1,000 persons living, of the estimated or enumerated population, according to the most recent weekly returns of Philadelphia was 19.18; Brooklyn, 22.01; Baltimore, 21.86; New Orleans, 27.92; Charleston, 34.32; Erie, 13.13; Worcester, 17.33; Cambridge, 25.63; Fall River, 23.34; Lynn, 19.02; Springfield, 9.36. One Hundred and Nineteenth street sewer, between Sixth Avenue and Summit East of Sixth Avenue.
One Hundred and Twenty-third street sewer, between Fourth and Madison Avenues.
One Hundred and Fifty-third street sewer, between Tenth Avenue and St. Nicholas Avenue.
Montgomery street sewer, between Madison and Monroe streets.

- St. Nicholas Avenue tree-planting, between One Hundred and Tenth and One Hundred and Fifteenth streets.
Wallis Avenue crosswalks, between One Hundred and Thirty-eighth and One Hundred and Thirty-ninth streets.
