Sanitary Bureau.

I have the honor to submit the following report of the work performed in the Sanitary Bureau for the week ending November 25, 1882:

The total number of inspections made by the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors was 1,458, as follows: 660 tenement-houses, 89 private dwellings, 65 other dwellings, 7 manufactories and workshops, 15 stores and warehouses, 43 stables, 54 slaughter-houses, 1 lodging-house, 1 coal yard, 1 public sewer, 28 sunken and vacant lots, 43 yards, courts, and areas, 68 cellars and basements, 183 waste pipes and drains, 152 privies and water-closets, 23 streets, gutters and sinks, 11 dangerous stairways, 1 smoky chimney, 3 cesspools, 10 other nuisances.

The number of reports thereon received from the Inspectors was 475.

During the past week 112 complaints were received from citizens and referred to the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors for investigation and report.

During the past week 51 permits were issued to the consignees of vessels to discharge cargoes, on vouchers from the Health Officer of the Port.

80 permits were granted scavengers to empty, clean and disinfect privy sinks.

The Disinfecting Corps have visited 80 premises where contagious diseases were found, and have disinfected and fumigated 79 houses, 769 privy sinks, together with clothing, bedding, etc.

Bureau of Vital Statistics.

The certificates of 597 births, 66 still-births, 234 marriages, and 553 deaths, reported to have taken place in this city, were received by this Bureau during the week ending Saturday, November 25, 1882. This shows an increase of 64 births, and 11 still-births, and a decrease of 50 marriages and 29 deaths, when compared with the number received during the preceding week; but when compared with the corresponding week of the year 1881, there was an increase of 76 births, 19 still-

births, and 5 marriages, and a decrease of 111 deaths. Compared with the mortality reported during the preceding week, the deaths from small-pox decreased 1; scarlatina, 3; erysipelas, 2; typhoid fever, 4; puerperal diseases, 3; diarrhoeal diseases, 15; alcoholism, 7; cancer, 8; phthisis pulmonalis, 4; bronchitis, 2; meningitis and encephalitis, 5; apoplexy, 2; cirrhosis and hepatitis, 2; premature and preterm births, 9; drowning, 1; while the deaths from measles increased 4; diphtheria, 2; croup, 5; cerebro-spinal fever, 2; inanition, 1; rheumatism and gout, 2; heart diseases, 2; aneurism, 2; marasmus, tabes mesenterica and scrofula, 11; hydrocephalus and tubercular meningitis, 4; convulsions, 2; all diseases of the brain and nervous system, 4; gastritis, enteritis and peritonitis, 2; Bright's disease and nephritis, 13; and suicide, 2. The number of deaths from whooping cough, malarial fevers, pneumonia, and cyanosis and atelectasis, was the same in the two successive weeks.

Deaths from the principal Zymotic Diseases, Phthisis Pulmonalis, Pneumonia, Bronchitis, and Children under five years of age, reported during the week and compared with the three preceding weeks.

The ages of 113 of the persons who died during the week were reported to be under one year, 150 under two years, 195 under five years, and 44 seventy years and over, which shows that the deaths of children under five years of age was 6 more than the number reported during last week, and represent 35.26 per cent. of the total weekly mortality.

Deaths reported from Small-pox, Measles, Scarlatina, Diphtheria, Membranous Croup, Whooping Cough, Typhus, Typhoid, Cerebro-Spinal, and Malarial Fevers, in Institutions, Tenement and other Dwellings, with Average Age, Floor, and Ward where the Death occurred, and the Hour of Death, for the week ending November 25, 1882.

Of the total number of deaths reported for the week, 108 were in institutions, 295 in tenement-houses, 136 in houses containing three families or less, 7 in hotels and boarding-houses, 7 in rivers, streets, boats, etc.; 15 were on the basement floor, 89 on the first, 138 on the second, 121 on the third, 52 on the fourth, 23 on the fifth, 0 on the sixth; 545 were stated to be residents of New York City, and 8 non-resident; 56 were stated to be single, 164 married, 74 widowed, and the condition of 259 was not stated; these were children who had not attained a marriageable age.

The total number of burial permits issued during the week are as follows, viz.: City deaths, 553; still-births, 66; bodies in transitu, 17; of the total burial permits issued for city and still-births 81 were upon certificates received from the Coroners; 597 births; 234 marriages; 66 still-births; 553 deaths; 17 applications for transit permits were recorded, indexed, and tabulated, 118 searches of the registers of births, marriages, and deaths were made, and 4 transcripts of the birth record, 11 of marriage, and 46 of death were issued during the week.

The mean temperature for the week ending November 25, 1882, was 34.7 degrees Fahr., the mean reading of the barometer was 29.884, the mean humidity was 85, saturation being 100, the number of miles-traveled by the wind was 1,441, and the total amount of rain-fall was 0. inch depth of water, as reported by D. Draper, Ph.D., Director of the New York Meteorological Observatory, Central Park.

The disposition of 530 deaths and still-births, or 85.62 per cent. of the total number reported, was in the following 14 cemeteries: Bayside (Jewish), 13; Calvary (Roman Catholic), 224; City pauper burial ground (undenominational), 69; Greenwood (undenominational), 42; Lutheran (undenominational), 94; Cypress Hills (undenominational), 14; Evergreen (undenominational), 36; Woodlawn (undenominational), 15; St. Michael's (Protestant Episcopal), 5; Union (Methodist Protestant), 6; Holy Cross (Roman Catholic), 4; Machpelah, L. I. (Jewish), 2; St. Raymond's (Roman Catholic), 4; Washington (undenominational), 2.

The distribution of deaths (actual mortality) for the week ending November 18, 1882, was in the following wards, viz.: First, 7; Second, 0; Third, 2; Fourth, 10; Fifth, 13; Sixth, 11; Seventh, 21; Eighth, 14; Ninth, 22; Tenth, 16; Eleventh, 29; Twelfth, 43; Thirteenth, 13; Fourteenth, 15; Fifteenth, 4; Sixteenth, 13; Seventeenth, 36; Eighteenth, 30; Nineteenth, 114; Twentieth, 27; Twenty-first, 46; Twenty-second, 38; Twenty-third, 12; Twenty-fourth, 8.

The actual mortality for the week ending November 18, 1882, was 544; this is 130 less than the number that occurred during the corresponding week of the year 1881, and 7.2 less than the average of the corresponding weeks of the past five years, and represents an annual death-rate of 21.85 per 1,000 persons living, the population estimated at 1,293,754.

The annual death-rate per 1,000 persons living, of the estimated or enumerated population, according to the most recent weekly returns of Philadelphia was 19.41; Brooklyn, 21.58; Baltimore, 19.96; New Orleans, 26.28; Buffalo, 16.34; Charleston, 39.78; Dayton, 12.10; Erie, 11.25; Savannah, 23.68; Lowell, 17.48; Worcester, 14.73; Cambridge, 21.69; Fall River, 16.98; Lynn, 12.22; Springfield, 15.60. Monthly returns—District of Columbia, 22.58; Milwaukee, 19.58; Rochester, 17; Burlington, Iowa, 6.67; Minneapolis, 21.45; Oakland, 15.66. - Fifty-fifth street paving, between Sixth and Seventh Avenues.
- Seventy-fifth street paving, between Third and Fourth Avenues.
- Eighty-third street paving, between Eighth Avenue and Boulevard.
- Ninety-fourth street paving, between Third and Lexington Avenues.
- One Hundred and Twelfth street paving, between Third and Fourth Avenues.
- Seventieth street regulating, grading, etc., between Eighth and Tenth Avenues.
- First Avenue sewer, between Twenty-first and Twenty-fourth streets.
- Fourth Avenue sewer, east side, between Thirty-fifth and Thirty-sixth streets.
- Fourth Avenue sewer, west side, between One Hundred and Eighth and One Hundred and Tenth streets.
- Twenty-third street sewer, between Eleventh and Thirtieth Avenues.
- Eighty-seventh street sewer, between Ninth and Tenth Avenues.
- Ninety-sixth and Ninety-seventh street sewers, between Third and Lexington Avenues.
- One Hundred and Nineteenth street sewer, between Sixth Avenue and Summit east of Sixth Avenue.
- One Hundred and Twenty-first street sewer, between Fourth and Madison Avenues.
