GENTLEMEN—I have the honor to inform you that the following work has been done during the last week upon the bridge, viz.: 303 main truss pins erected, 132 top connections, and 201 knee braces.

The erection of the six main trusses was completed on the 16th inst. This completes the heavy work of erection, and there yet remains to be put in place a portion of the promenade diagonals, knee braces, and top connections.

The planking has been laid on about two hundred lineal feet of the promenade, including the elevated sections around the towers, and about four hundred lineal feet of the roadway planking has been laid.

The weather during the week has not been favorable for work.
