

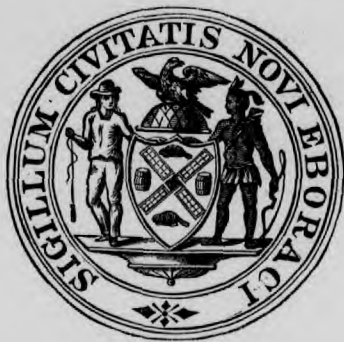

DEAR SIR—Annexed I beg to submit to your Honorable Board my report for the quarter ending December 31, 1882, the number of prisoners received and discharged, the labor on which they have been employed and the results accomplished by such labor during the quarter.

Blacksmiths—Made 1 balcony 27 feet long, 1 balcony 6 feet long, both with railings; 2 sets iron stairs, 8 large brackets, 1 platform and stand for foot of fire escape at Randall's Island, 11 augers, 2 18-pound sledge hammers, 14 bedsteads, 1 frame 3 feet by 3½ feet, 174 wedges, 84 steel hand drills, 36 steel points, 36 chisels, 24 gas hooks, 36 spikes, 24 plugs, 8 pitching tools, 2 fire hoes, 9 cot frames, 9 keys for locks, 1 rivet set, 3 cold chisels, 200 bolts of various sizes, 176 bucket handles, 319 rivets, 1 wagon, 1 iron tripod, also repaired a large number of carts, wagons, wheels, wheelbarrows, machinery, etc., etc.

Tinsmiths—Made 1,100 feet stove-pipe, 110 elbows, 230 bake pans, 24 fire shovels, 227 mess pans, 9 water cans, 3 boilers, 18 dippers, 330 quart cups, 10 flags for guard boats; also all necessary repairs to roof of prison and adjoining buildings; also repairs on buildings on Ward's and Randall's Islands.

Carpenters—Made 1 boat, 1 wagon, 1 refrigerator, 605 coffins, 109 buckets, 10 pails, 1 table, 355 bed blocks, 2 cleats, 300 tallies, 45 snow-shovels, 500 clothes pins, 26 dozen brush backs, 1 whiffletree, 6 tubs, 78 hammer handles, 150 stools, 34 steps for fire-escape, 14 wheelbarrows, besides all necessary repairs to vehicles belonging to the Department.

Tailors and Cot-makers—Made 249 woolen jackets, 302 pairs of pants, 402 vests, 500 caps, 220 pairs of mitts, 1 citizen suit, 34 cot bottoms; repaired 409 jackets, 469 pairs of pants, 185 vests, 30 caps, 150 cot bottoms.

Scrubbers—Made 175 dozen scrub brushes.

Shoemakers—Made 1,178 pairs men's and 1,270 pairs women's shoes; repaired 1,646 pairs men's and 89 pairs women's shoes.

At the Stone Shed—The prisoners cut 347 feet of sills, 163 feet of bond, 139 feet of chimney caps, 348 feet of lintels, 12 feet of jambs, 762 feet of coping, 12 feet of angle, 14 feet of platforms, 108 feet of steps, 828 feet of building stones.

At the Sewing Room—The female prisoners have made 504 aprons, 250 dresses, 730 shirts, 306 pillow ticks, 100 sheets, 400 petticoats, 300 nightgowns, 100 saques, 500 diapers, 6 baby suits, 100 blankets, 100 bed ticks, 400 pillow cases, 100 bed spreads, and bound 1,360 pairs of women's shoes; repaired 2,993 shirts, 436 pairs of pants, 80 dresses, 116 petticoats, 261 chemises, 135 stockings, 476 pillow ticks, 3 sheets, 143 socks.

By prisoners employed at out-door labor, the roads and sea wall have been kept in proper repair; 1,340 tons have been discharged.

The average daily number of male prisoners during the quarter has been 712, employed as follows:

CITY PRISON, NEW YORK, January 1, 1883.

The following improvements and repairs have been made at First, Second, Third and Fourth District Prisons, from October 1 to December 31, 1882, by prison labor and without expense to the Department of Public Charities and Correction, except the cost of the material:

FIRST DISTRICT PRISON.

Painting—Painted hall, iron bars, window frames, railing and doors of first tier, male prison (423 square yards); also storm houses at male prison and at boys' prison; also room in Magdalen (90 square yards); also roof Magdalen (400 square yards); also skylights, female prison, lamps and brackets in yard, gate at entrance to yard, Franklin street; repaired and painted roof of male prison, skylights, etc. (635 square yards); also roof of new prison (404 square yards).

Carpenter work—Four doors and casings in Magdalen and yard, and partition in Magdalen, four sashes in skylights in male and female prisons, and repaired four cell windows in male prison. Mason work—Plastering and pointing up with cement cells on second tier, also windows on second and third tiers, walls male prison and office female prison. Plumbing—Repaired water and soil pipes in female prison.

SECOND DISTRICT PRISON.

Pointed up with mortar, etc., the wall in yard of prison.

THIRD DISTRICT PRISON.

Repaired water and soil pipes.

FOURTH DISTRICT PRISON.

Repaired water-pipes, stoves, etc.

NEW YORK CITY ASYLUM FOR INSANE, }  
January 26, 1883.

Hon. HENRY H. PORTER, President, etc.:

DEAR SIR—I have the honor to forward herewith a statement of labor performed by the inmates of this institution during the three months ending December 31, 1882:

Printing Bureau—450 envelopes; 3 reams letter paper; 1,500 death cards; 150 copies of specifications; 10,000 labels; 3,000 diet blanks; 6,000 passes; 3,000 census returns; 1,500 Sunday passes; 2,000 letter headings; 30 copies of specifications (Retreat Building); 600 discharge passes; 1,000 certificates of discharge; 2,000 envelopes; 2,000 class cards; 1,000 invitations, Charity Hospital; 80 copies of specifications; 50 cards, Attendants' Register; 200 copies of programme; 2,000 envelopes; 2 reams letter-heads; 5,000 admission cards; 500 copies of Hospital Formulary; 1 ream letter-headings; 50 habeas corpus returns; 100 commitment blanks; 250 copies of Estimates for 1883; 1,200 student tickets; 500 passes for Pavilion; 1,000 passes for attendants; 500 coffin cards; 500 programmes; 100,000 labels, marked "Care"; 2,000 discharges; 1 ream letter-heads; 5,000 passes, Bellevue Hospital; 50 copies of specifications; 30 pages Annual Report; 3 Individual Institution Reports; 5 Per Capita Statements; 1,000 Tombs passes for general bookkeeper; 2,000 boat passes to Blackwell's Island; 100 furlough blanks for Charity Hospital. For Superintendent of Out-door Poor—1,000 cards, Bellevue Hospital; 500 cards, Penitentiary; 500 cards Insane Asylum, Blackwell's Island; 500 cards, Insane Asylum, Ward's Island; 500 cards, Workhouse; 500 cards, Charity Hospital. For Supply Clerk—500 order blanks; 40 specifications; 500 order blanks. For Hart's Island Hospital—1,000 passes; 40 specifications; 1,000 discharge blanks; 1,000 pass blanks. For Hart's Island Branch Asylum—1,000 discharge blanks; 1 box envelopes; 1 ream letter-heads. Superintendent of Out-door Poor—3,000 discharge passes. For Hart's Island Branch Asylum—250 bread orders; 3,000 discharge blanks. For Randall's Island Hospital—5,000 discharge blanks. Commissioners' Reports, 5,000; Medical Superintendent's Report, 100. For Bellevue Hospital—52,500 blank reports. For Superintendent Out-door Poor—1,000 cards. For Bellevue Hospital—500 library slips.

Masons—Lathed and plastered wall in Ward No. 19; repaired walls and floor of wash room and main hall Ward No. 21; repaired wall in Ward No. 22; cut doorway to fire-escape, Ward No. 3; cut door to fire-escape and repaired walls around windows where iron screens were removed in Ward No. 7; repaired wall and ceiling, also water-closet, Ward No. 18; cut and raised two flags in cellar for Engineer and relaid same; general repairs in Ward No. 8; built part of area wall west side new east wing; built up door-jamb of Wards Nos. 3 and 7 on fire-escape; cut a hole in brick stack for Engineer in Ward No. 4; repaired walls in two rooms and put in one register in Ward No. 11; repaired walls in two rooms and put in registers in Ward No. 14; built brick piers between doors leading to fire-escape; repaired the walls in Wards Nos. 21 and 22; cut doorway through to fire-escape in Ward No. 15; repaired brick wall between Wards Nos. 16 and 17; repaired walls and ceiling of kitchen and adjoining rooms; put in grate and brick lining in fire range for Steward; put in grate and fire-clay lining in range at hog pen; took down brick stack for Engineer in bath room in Ward No. 4.

Painters—Painting in new east wing and 135 lights of glass put in; painting drug store, kitchen and Cook's room; painting vegetable room and two other rooms off kitchen; painting Ward No. 2; painting and decorating pantries in Ward No. 2; painting, varnishing and calcimining in Ward No. 2; work at present new east wing; putting in 230 lights of glass through the building and out-door offices.

Plumbers—Gas put in night attendants' rooms, 50 feet 3/8-inch gas-pipe; in Ward No. 21 repaired bath tub and soil-pipe from the roof; 2 lengths of 4-inch pipe put in; put in one 4x2-inch T; 1 length of 2-inch cast iron on one 2-inch lead trap; 100 feet of gas-pipe changed in east wing; repaired bath tub in Ward No. 7; repaired water-closet in Ward No. 1; repaired gas-pipe in Ward No. 12; Ward No. 16, put on 3 L pendant cocks; repaired gas-pipe in Ward No. 18; repaired gas-burners in Wards Nos. 13 and 14; repaired gas-pipe in Laundress' room, Workhouse; repaired water-pipe in Annex; put in 2 new basin cocks in Steward's room; 3 new steam tables put in west wing, with 60 feet of 1 1/4-inch pipe; 75 feet of 1-inch pipe and 20 feet of 3/4-inch pipe, Ward No. 4; 20 feet of 3/4-inch pipe and 16 feet of 1-inch pipe put in bath room; Ward No. 2, one new 3/4-inch valve put in water-closet; Ward No. 11, drop light put in water-closet, 10 feet of 3/8-inch pipe; Wards Nos. 13 and 14, two dozen new burners put on; Ward No. 12, bath tub repaired; Ward No. 3, water-closet pipe repaired; Ward No. 9, ten new burners put on; Ward No. 21, sink in pantry repaired; Ward No. 8, urinal closet repaired; Ward No. 16, one new L patent cock put on; Wards Nos. 18 and 19, one dozen new burners put on; boiler-room gas-pipes repaired; sink in Steward's kitchen repaired.

Carpenters—Alterations made on coal dock; 15 flour boxes made; stable door repaired; 1 box made for Dr. Snyder; 3 new doors made, with fan-lights, for west wing leading to fire-escape; also 71 steps made and bolted for same; 2 chestnut doors, with casings, for new room in Ward No. 10; box for coil in Dr. Macdonald's office; drawing board and T-square made for office; step-ladder made for Cellarman; general repairs done in icehouse; new book shelf made for Dr. Douglas; new table made for Painter Smith's room; 6 straightedges made for Painter; new table made for Ward No. 9; corner-closet made for Drs. Harrison and Watson; new tray made for hospital; 6 new shelves made for kitchen, also 4 new benches; new box made for hog pen; new swill box for kitchen yard; box made for Steamfitter; box made for keys, Clerk's office; new doors made leading to fire-escape; 2 doors made for hospital; 2 doors made for Ward No. 22; one door made for Ward No. 23; one door made for Ward No. 20; one door made for Ward No. 15.

Tailors—Made 234 pairs of pants, 93 jackets, 19 vests, 23 blouses, 350 caps; repaired 1,971 pairs of pants, 753 jackets, 504 vests, 42 blouses.

Shoemakers—Made 71 pairs of new shoes; repaired 1,039 pairs of shoes; repaired 5 sets of harness; jobbing work per orders.

Matmaker—75 kihar mats, 57 rag mats, 2 pairs of moccasins.  
Broom-makers—Made 302 brooms.  
Out-door Improvement—Unloading coal from barges, weighing and carting same to both institutions; cleaning, preparing and housing broom corn; digging, pitting and carting vegetables; raising and finishing area wall around new east wing; keeping walks and roads in order; carting ashes, etc.; setting coping on area wall, new wing; regulating and grading grounds around east

wing; digging and housing farm produce; collecting manure and making heaps of the same; unloading 4 barges of coal and one barge of ice; carting and distributing 600 tons of coal to both engine-houses; keeping walks and yards in order; carting ashes and filling holes, etc.; unloading, weighing and carting coal from boats; carting coal to Insane and Homoeopathic boiler-houses, also boat landings; setting coping and stone stoop, new east wing; cleaning snow from yards and walks, and keeping same in repair; carting ashes and filling holes with same; collecting and preparing manure for farm; carting vegetables from farm to kitchens; digging sand, etc.; unloading and weighing cargo of gas coal and carting same to gashouse; cleaning and preparing broom corn for broom-maker; repairing icehouse and putting 50 barrels of sawdust in as lining; carting lumber, stones, etc., from docks to both institutions, etc.

Engineer—Has repaired the cold-water tanks in Pavilions I and II; put lining in 60-gallon cauldron in laundry; packed pumps, Pavilions D and E; cleaned out flues of kitchen range, and made and put up new smoke jack; repaired stove guards for all the pavilions; put in new gaskets in steam chest of steam pump; lined cold-water tank, Pavilion III, with lead; repaired and refitted the drums of Pavilion III, and put in new galvanized pipe; repaired hot-water tank, Pavilion E; put in new suction and valve in Pavilion E pump; repaired hot-water tank, Pavilion D; put new suction and foot valve in main pump, besides which he has done much other necessary work such as packing and repairing pumps, repairing water-closets, bath tubs, pipes, etc., cleaning out waste-pipes, and thawing out pipes in pavilions when frozen, blown off steam boiler and tried the salt-water connection as occasion required, and kept the fire engine in order. He has also attended to all repairs of pumps, water-closets, and bath tubs in the pavilions of Hart's Island Hospital, as well as all repairs to the gas-house.

Carpenter—Has made 2 new covers for boilers in kitchen, 2 new ladders for pavilions, 1 large chest for holding prisoners' clothing, a grating for the bread wagon, 1 tray for kitchen, 1 stove screen for Assistant Physician's room, and 16 coffins. Have put in new bottoms of yellow pine to cribs in Pavilion III; put in 51 panes glass in the various pavilions; put on 6 new locks to china closets and drawers; fitted 16 keys; repaired and put up storm-doors to all the buildings. Has repaired ventilators and roofs; repaired stove-guards, and put them in place, besides which he has made all necessary repairs, wherever required, to settees, benches, tables, doors, and windows; put in new sash cord and window fasteners, and kept the Wash-house and out buildings in good repair.

Workhouse Help—Have repaired and painted the roofs of Pavilions D and E; painted Assistant Physician's room, Hart's Island Hospital; whitewashed the Wash-house; put up and blackened stoves and stove-pipes, and whitewashed stoves in pavilions, wash-house, office, and other buildings. Have removed stoves from dock to store; have kept the roads, walks, and grounds in good order, and performed much other necessary work, such as taking clothes to and from laundry to pavilions, shoveled snow, removed ashes, etc., etc.

Patients—Have made 22 aprons, 183 chemises, 193 dresses, 120 drawers, 94 petticoats, 74 pillow slips, 4 spreads and 3 shirts, and knitted 65 pairs stockings and 16 pairs socks; mended 88 aprons, 2,811 bed ticks, 49 blankets, 3,619 chemises, 8 coats, 2,400 dresses, 1,557 pairs drawers, 510 hoods, 246 nightgowns, 57 pairs pants, 1,206 petticoats, 1,167 pillow-slips, 708 pillow ticks, 2,501 pairs stockings, 99 pairs socks, 1,571 sheets, 396 spreads, 126 shirts, and 10 towels and 149 skirts.

Laundry—Has laundried 33,197 pieces.

**LAWS OF NEW YORK, 1883.**

**CHAPTER 3.**

AN ACT to provide for the payment of inspectors of election in the city of New York, for services rendered by them in the year eighteen hundred and eighty-two.

Passed January 31, 1883; three-fifths being present.

The People of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact, as follows:

Section 1. Upon the certificate of the chief of the bureau of elections in the city of New York as to the period of service, compensation at the rate now fixed by law shall be paid to the inspectors of election in said city who were appointed in the year eighteen hundred and eighty-two for their services actually rendered, notwithstanding the failure by any inspector to comply with some requirements of law relating to his duties.

Sec. 2. This act shall take effect immediately.

**CHAPTER 26.**

AN ACT to change the name of the marine court of the city of New York to the "city court of New York."

Passed February 9, 1883; three-fifths being present.

The People of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

Section 1. The marine court of the city of New York shall, on and after the first day of July, eighteen hundred and eighty-three, be designated as the "city court of New York," and the justices of said court are continued in office for the balance of the terms for which they have been elected; and shall, on and after said first day of July, eighteen hundred and eighty-three, be known as the "justices of the city court of New York;" and the clerk of said court shall, in like manner, be known as the "clerk of the city court of New York."

Sec. 2. All actions and proceedings pending in said marine court on the thirtieth day of June, eighteen hundred and eighty-three, shall, without any order to that effect, be continued under the title of said court as amended by this act, and the seal of said court shall be made to conform thereto.

Sec. 3. All transcripts of judgments recovered, papers used or proceedings had in said marine court on and prior to said thirtieth day of June, eighteen hundred and eighty-three, shall be certified by the clerk of said city court, in the same manner as if this act had not been passed; but all subsequent proceedings had upon said judgments shall be prosecuted under the title of the "city court of New York;" but the fact that the judgment was recovered in the said tribunal under the title of the "marine court" may be recited therein.

Sec. 4. Except as hereinbefore provided, all laws now in force relating to the said marine court of the city of New York, the justices, clerks, and attaches thereof, shall continue in full force and effect, and shall apply to the said city court.
