Sanitary Bureau.

The following is a record of the work performed in the Sanitary Bureau for the week ending June 14, 1884:
The number of inspections made by the Sanitary Inspectors was 7,211.
The number of complaints returned by the Sanitary Inspectors was 1,097.
During the past week 301 complaints were received from citizens and referred to the Sanitary Inspectors for investigation and report.
116 permits were issued to the consignees of vessels to discharge cargoes, on vouchers from the Health Officer of the Port.
5 permits were issued to consignees to discharge rags (in bulk, under bonds).
175 permits were issued to scavengers to empty, clean and disinfect privy sinks.
51 premises were visited where contagious diseases were reported, and 40 disinfections and 20 fumigations were performed.
5 cases of contagious diseases were removed to Riverside Hospital.
592 vaccinations were performed, of which 145 were primary and 447 re-vaccinations.
5,055 pounds of meat and 4,950 pounds of fish were seized and condemned.
63 specimens of milk were examined, 4 analyses were made, and \$520 fines imposed.
The following is a record of the work performed in the Sanitary Bureau for the week ending June 21, 1884:
The number of inspections made by the Sanitary Inspectors was 7,724.
The number of complaints returned by the Sanitary Inspectors was 1,116.
During the past week 280 complaints were received from citizens and referred to the Sanitary Inspectors for investigation and report.
65 permits were issued to consignees of vessels to discharge cargoes, on vouchers from the Health Officer of the Port.
15 permits were issued to consignees to discharge rags (in bulk, under bonds).
172 permits were issued to scavengers to empty, clean and disinfect privy sinks.
58 premises were visited where contagious diseases were reported, and 58 disinfections and 7 fumigations were performed.
9 cases of contagious diseases were removed to Riverside Hospital.
518 vaccinations were performed, of which 173 were primary and 345 re-vaccinations.
6,315 pounds of meat were seized and condemned.
126 specimens of milk were examined, 3 analyses were made, 1 arrest was made, and \$75 fines imposed.

The certificates of 581 births, 55 still-births, 263 marriages, and 621 deaths, reported to have taken place in this city, were received by this Bureau during the week ending Saturday, June 14, 1884. This shows an increase of 8 births, 14 still-births, and 13 marriages, and a decrease of 9 deaths, when compared with the number received during the preceding week; but when compared with the corresponding week of the year 1883, there was an increase of 79 births, 3 still-births, 32 marriages, and 70 deaths. Compared with the mortality reported during the preceding week, the deaths from measles decreased 7; whooping cough, 1; cerebro-spinal fever, 1; malarial fevers, 3; puerperal diseases, 3; inanition, 3; alcoholism, 2; rheumatism and gout, 2; cancer, 7; phthisis pulmonalis, 5; pneumonia, 6; heart diseases, 8; aneurism, 1; convulsions, 4; direct effect of solar heat, 1; apoplexy, 2; cirrhosis and hepatitis, 2; Bright's disease and nephritis, 10; cyanosis and atelectasis, 2; drowning, 1; while the deaths from croup increased 2; typhus fever, 1; typhoid fever, 5; diarrhoeal diseases, 29; bronchitis, 5; marasmus, tabes mesenterica, and proflua, 3; hydrocephalus and tubercular meningitis, 2; meningitis and encephalitis, 5; all diseases of the brain and nervous system, 2; gastritis, enteritis, and peritonitis, 3; surgical operations, 3. The number of deaths from scarlatina, diphtheria, erysipelas, premature and pretermatural births, and suicide, was the same in the two successive weeks.

Deaths from the principal Zymotic Diseases, Phthisis Pulmonalis, Pneumonia, Bronchitis, and Children under five years of age, reported during the week and compared with the three preceding weeks.

The ages of 156 of the persons who died during the week were reported to be under one year; 205 under two years; 269 under five years; and 46 seventy years and over, which shows that the number of deaths of children under five years of age was 15 more than the number reported during the preceding week, and represents 43.32 per cent. of the total weekly mortality.
