

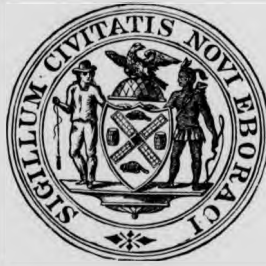

The certificates of 552 births, 51 still-births, 200 marriages and 771 deaths, reported to have taken place in this city, were received by this Bureau during the week ending Saturday, June 28, 1884. This shows a decrease of 22 births, 10 still-births and 36 marriages, and an increase of 137 deaths when compared with the number received during the preceding week; but when compared with the corresponding week of the year 1883, there was an increase of 12 births and 55 deaths, a decrease of 9 still-births and the same number of marriages. Compared with the mortality reported during the preceding week, the deaths from diphtheria decreased 1; whooping cough, 5; cancer, 7; phthisis pulmonalis, 13; pneumonia, 7; aneurism, 3; meningitis and encephalitis, 9; all diseases of the brain and nervous system, 2; cirrhosis and hepatitis, 4; premature and preterm births, 2; suicide, 2; while the deaths from scarlatina increased 5; croup, 7; erysipelas, 4; typhus fever, 2; cerebro-spinal fever, 1; malarial fevers, 3; puerperal diseases, 3; diarrhoeal diseases, 89; inanition, 2; rheumatism and gout, 2; bronchitis, 1; marasmus, tabes mesenterica and scrofula, 2; hydrocephalus and tubercular meningitis, 8; convulsions, 5; direct effect of solar heat, 6; gastritis, enteritis and peritonitis, 21; Bright's disease and nephritis, 17; drowning, 8. The number of deaths from measles, typhoid fever, alcoholism, apoplexy, cyanosis and atelectasis, and surgical operations was the same in the two successive weeks.

Deaths from the principal Zymotic Diseases, Phthisis Pulmonalis, Pneumonia, Bronchitis, and Children under five years of age, reported during the week and compared with the three preceding weeks.

The total number of burial permits issued during the week are as follows, viz.: City deaths, 955; still-births, 59; bodies in transit, 22; of the total burial permits issued for city and still-births 74 were upon certificates received from the Coroners; 678 births, 244 marriages, 50 still-births, 955 deaths; 22 applications for transit permits were recorded, indexed and tabulated; 108 searches of the registers of births, marriages, and deaths were made, and 9 transcripts of the birth record, 6 of marriage, and 64 of death were issued during the week.

The mean temperature for the week ending July 12, 1884, was 72.3 degrees Fahr., the mean reading of the barometer was 29.743, the mean humidity was 61, saturation being 100, the number of miles traveled by the wind was 894, and the total amount of rain-fall was 1.17 inches depth of water, as reported by D. Draper, Ph. D., Director of the New York Meteorological Observatory, Central Park.

That the books of "Annual Record of Assessed Valuations of Real and Personal Estate," which had been open for inspection and correction from the second Monday of January last, were closed on the first day of May last, as required by law, to enable the Commissioners to prepare Assessment Rolls for delivery to the Board of Aldermen. The Commissioners have caused such Assessment Rolls to be prepared in form prescribed by law, and the same are now complete and ready for delivery to the Board of Aldermen on the first Monday of July, instant, as required by section 828 of the New York City Consolidation Act.

CITY OF NEW YORK—FINANCE DEPARTMENT, COMPTROLLER'S OFFICE, July 1, 1884.

To the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

The Comptroller, to whom was referred at the last meeting a resolution of the Board of Education, making application for the issue of bonds to the amount of one million dollars, under chapter 458, Laws of 1884, respectfully submits the following

REPORT:

By the provisions of said act the Comptroller of the City of New York is authorized, upon the application of the Board of Education, and upon the approval of a majority of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, to issue bonds in the name of the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of the City of New York, during the years eighteen hundred and eighty-four, eighteen hundred and eighty-five and eighteen hundred and eighty-six, for an amount not exceeding two million dollars (\$2,000,000) par value, to be known as "School-house Bonds, for the purchase of new school sites,

for the erection of new school buildings, and for fitting up and furnishing the same for the use of the Common Schools of the said City of New York."

The act also provides that, "said bonds shall be issued, from time to time, during said years eighteen hundred and eighty-four, eighteen hundred and eighty-five and eighteen hundred and eighty-six, as they may be required by the said Board of Education, shall run for such term or terms of years as the Comptroller shall direct, but not longer than twenty years, and shall draw interest at not more than three per cent. per annum."

Herewith I submit a resolution for the approval of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, and to authorize the issue of "School-house Bonds," to the amount of one million dollars (\$1,000,000), upon the application of the Board of Education, as provided by said chapter 458 of the Laws of 1884.

Whereas, Chapter 458 of the Laws of 1884 provides that, upon the application of the Board of Education of the City of New York, and upon the approval of a majority of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of said City, the Comptroller is authorized to issue bonds in the name of and on behalf of the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty, during the years eighteen hundred and eighty-four, eighteen hundred and eighty-five, and eighteen hundred and eighty-six for an amount not exceeding two million dollars (\$2,000,000), and

Whereas, The said Board of Education has made application for the issue of such bonds to the amount of one million dollars (\$1,000,000) for the purposes specified in said act, therefore,

Resolved, That, pursuant to the provisions of said chapter 458 of the Laws of 1884, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment hereby approves of the issue of bonds in the name of and on behalf of the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of the City of New York, and authorizes the Comptroller of said city to issue the same, to run for such term or terms of years as the said Comptroller shall direct, not longer than twenty years from the date of issue, and at such rate of interest as he may determine, not exceeding three per cent. per annum, to the amount of one million dollars (\$1,000,000), the proceeds of which shall be used "for the purchase of new school sites, for the erection of new school buildings, and for fitting up and furnishing the same for the use of the common schools of the said City of New York," which said bonds shall be known as "School House Bonds," and shall be exempt from taxation by the City and County of New York, but not from taxation for State purposes, when directed by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, pursuant to section 137 of the New York City Consolidation Act of 1882, and as authorized by an ordinance of the Common Council, approved by the Mayor, October 2, 1880. The said bonds shall also be known as Consolidated Stock of the City of New York, as provided by section 132 of said Consolidation Act of 1882.

SIR—I have the honor to inform you of the adoption of the following preambles and resolution at a meeting of the Board of Commissioners of this Department, held on the 25th instant, and respectfully ask that the same may receive early consideration:

"Whereas, The Commissioners of the Sinking Fund have set apart for the purposes of this Department a plot of ground 25 by 100 feet on East Sixty-seventh street, and 50 by 100 feet on East Sixty-eighth street, between Third and Lexington avenues, upon which this Department proposes to erect a fire-proof building for use as a house for a Hook and Ladder Company, an office for a duplicate fire alarm telegraph, and for Headquarters of Life Saving Corps and the School of Instruction, as well as for general drill purposes; and

"Whereas, It unexpectedly became practicable to begin the erection of the new house for Engine Company No. 52 at Riverdale, in 1883, the contract therefor having been made on December 28, 1883, making the appropriation for that purpose in the estimate for that year available; and

"Whereas, The erection of a new house in West Forty-seventh street, for Engine Company No. 54, is not considered as important as that of the proposed new building in East Sixty-seventh and Sixty-eighth streets; therefore, be it

"Resolved, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment be requested to amend the title of the appropriation for this Department for the current year 'For New Houses for Engine Companies Nos. 52, 53, 54 and 55,' and Hook and Ladder Company No. 15, \$100,000,' so as to make the same read as follows: 'For New Houses for Engine Companies Nos. 53 and 55, Hook and Ladder Company No. 15, and for a Building to be used for Hook and Ladder Company No. 16, as well as for Headquarters of the Life Saving Corps, the School of Instruction and General Drill Purposes, and as an Office for a Duplicate Fire Alarm Telegraph, \$100,000.'"

In connection with this application, attention is respectfully invited to the communication from this Department to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, under date of April 25, 1884, wherein the necessity for the proposed new building on East Sixty-seventh and Sixty-eighth streets was fully set forth, and a copy of which is herewith enclosed.

Hon. FRANKLIN EDSON, Mayor, and Chairman Commissioners of the Sinking Fund:

SIR—I have the honor, on behalf of the Department, to make application for a plot of ground, twenty-five (25) by one hundred (100) feet on East Sixty-seventh street, and fifty (50) by one hundred (100) feet on East Sixty-eighth street, as per accompanying diagram, on which it is proposed to erect buildings for the use of this Department.

In this immediate vicinity are located the following-named institutions and hospitals, schools, and other large buildings, as also numerous factories, viz:

- Chapin Home for the Aged, Sixty-sixth street, between Third and Lexington avenues.
- Colored Home and Hospital, Sixty-fourth and Sixty-fifth streets, First avenue and Avenue A.
- Mount Sinai Hospital, Lexington avenue, Sixty-sixth and Sixty-seventh streets.
- Hahnemann Hospital, Fourth avenue, between Sixty-seventh and Sixty-eighth streets.
- Institute for Deaf Mutes, Lexington avenue, Sixty-seventh and Sixty-eighth streets.
- Baptist Home for Aged, Sixty-eighth street, between Lexington and Fourth avenues.
- Dominican Convent, No. 329 East Sixty-third street.
- Public School No. 74, Sixty-third street, between Second and Third avenues.
- American Institute Building, Sixty-third and Sixty-fourth streets, Second and Third avenues.
- Third Avenue Railroad Depot and Stables, Sixty-fifth and Sixty-sixth streets, Second and Third avenues.

Seventh Regiment Armory, Sixty-sixth and Sixty-seventh streets, Lexington and Fourth avenues.
New York Foundling Asylum, Sixty-eighth and Sixty-ninth streets, Lexington and Third avenues.

- Normal College, Sixty-eighth and Sixty-ninth streets, Lexington and Fourth avenues.
- Little Sisters of the Poor (for Aged), Seventieth street, between Second and Third avenues.
- Public School (new), Sixty-eighth street and Lexington avenue.
- Presbyterian Hospital, Seventieth and Seventy-first streets, Madison and Fourth avenues.
- Presbyterian Home for Aged, Seventy-third street, between Madison and Fourth avenues.
- Jones' Wood Coliseum, Sixty-eighth and Seventieth streets, Avenue A and East river.

The nearest Hook and Ladder Companies are No. 13, located in East Eighty-seventh street, near Lexington avenue, on the north, and No. 2, located at Fifth street and Lexington avenue, on the south, in either case nearly one mile distant from this important section, and the immense value of property, as well as proper protection of human life, demands that the protection afforded by a Hook and Ladder Company should be given at the earliest practicable moment, and I therefore ask on behalf of the Commissioners of this Department, that early and favorable action be taken upon this application.

It is proposed to erect a house for a Hook and Ladder Company on the plot, 25 x 100 feet, on East Sixty-seventh street.

Upon the plot, 50 x 100 feet, fronting on East Sixty-eighth street, it is proposed to erect a suitable building, to be used as a permanent School for Instruction and Training in the general duties of the fireman, and particularly in the practical use and handling of scaling ladders, life lines and other appliances pertaining to the Life Saving Corps, as well as for the storage of reserve apparatus, etc.

Since the establishment of the Life Saving Corps, the practical instruction referred to has been given at an old sugar house, very inconveniently and inconveniently located near the foot of One Hundred and Fifty-eighth street, North river, the use of which the Department is not certain of for any time, and which does not afford the necessary facilities for thorough instruction and practice. The importance of this branch of the Department's service has already practically demonstrated itself on several occasions, notably at the recent fire in the St. George Flats, where the methods thus taught were unquestionably the means of saving a human life, which, owing to the fact that the longest extension ladder was too short, would otherwise have been sacrificed. Upwards of two hundred and fifty (250) officers and men now in service have thus far become members of the Life

Saving Corps of the Department, and are now assigned mainly to the various Hook and Ladder Companies of the Department, in readiness to practically apply what they have learned.

It is also proposed to locate in this building duplicate telegraph machinery and apparatus for the reception and transmission of alarms, to be kept for use in case of any accident or injury happening to the apparatus in the Headquarters building.

Attention is again invited to the numerous and important charitable and educational institutions, enumerated in the first part of this letter, located in the immediate vicinity of the proposed site, the inmates of which would be peculiarly helpless in the case of fire or panic.
