DEPARTMENT OF DOCKS.

At a meeting of the Board of Docks, held September 10th, 1884.

Present—The full Board.

The minutes of the meetings held September 3d and 8th, instant, were read and approved.

The following communications were received, read, and,

On motion, laid on the table to await action, as stated, to wit:

From the Equitable Gas-light Co.—Requesting permission to sink a crib at the foot of Fortieth street, East river. Engineer-in-Chief to be directed to examine and report.

From Israel C. Jones, Superintendent House of Refuge, Randall's Island—For permission to extend ferry landing at Randall's Island. Engineer-in-Chief to be directed to examine and report.

From Engineer-in-Chief:

1st. Reporting the suspension of Watchmen John J. Murphy, Jr., and Francis M. Madden, for being found asleep while on post on the night of September 4th, instant, and also reporting the suspension of Edward P. Mulhare, for being found off post on the night of September 4th, instant, and recommending that the said Watchmen be discharged from the service of the Department. Referred to Executive Session.

2d. Reporting suspension of Watchman Charles O'Rourke, for being found asleep on the night of September 7th, instant, and recommending that the said Watchman be discharged from the service of the Department. Referred to Executive Session.

3d. Reporting certain Dock Builders and Laborers who have not worked recently. Referred to Executive Session.

From George W. Wannmaker, Dock Master—In reference to and reporting obstructions in the slip between Piers, old 3 and 4, North river. Referred to Executive Session.

From Edward Abeel, Dock Master—In reference to the dumping of material into the slip at the bulkhead between Piers 52 and 53, East river. Engineer-in-Chief to be directed to examine and report as to dredging done between Piers 52 and 53, East river, as ordered by the Board.

The following communications were received, read, and,

On motion, ordered to be placed on file, action being taken where necessary as stated, to wit:

From Counsel to the Corporation:

1st. In reference to a modification of the contract with the Union Dredging Company, dated July 10, 1884, and requesting Department to furnish him with a copy of the said contract. Secretary directed to send a copy of the contract to the Counsel to the Corporation.

2d. Enclosing copies of the contract for dredging at Branch Workhouse Pier and Branch Lunatic Asylum Pier, and for rebuilding the Branch Workhouse Pier, Hart's Island, Long Island Sound, with his approval endorsed thereon.

3d. Requesting Department to furnish him with a copy of the resolution of the Board, passed November 21, 1883, inflicting a penalty of \$1,400 upon James Rogers, for encumbering Pier at One Hundred and Thirty-first street, North River. The Secretary stated that by direction of the Commissioners he had replied thereto; his action was approved.

4th. Enclosing check for \$262.50, received from Messrs. Schwarzchild & Sulzberger, for rent of bulkhead extension at Forty-fifth street, East River.

From Commissioners of the Sinking Fund—Transmitting copy of resolution adopted September 4th, instant, authorizing the Comptroller to issue Dock Bonds to the amount of \$250,000 for the uses and purposes of the Department.

From the Common Council—Transmitting copy of resolution adopted September 1st, instant, requesting the Department to increase the wages of the watchmen in their employ to correspond with that paid to the laborers.

From Department of Public Charities and Correction—In reference to enlarging and repairing the piers at Charity Hospital, Ward's and Randall's Island, so that their new steamer may be able to land thereat. Engineer-in-Chief to be directed to examine and report in respect to the matter.

From Department of Public Works—In reference to and stating that access to the two hydrants on the bulkhead south of Pier, new one, North river, heretofore used by that Department for supplying water to shipping, is completely shut off by the building of the new pier for the Police Department, and requesting permission to lay water pipes along Pier, old 23, North river, and to place two hydrants thereon, and also stating that it is intended to lay pipe and place two hydrants on the new pier being erected for the use of the Police Department when finished, and also stating that if the permission of this Department is needed for that purpose in addition to that of the Police Department, it is herewith asked.

Permission granted to place hydrants at Pier, old 23, North river, the work to be done under the supervision and direction of the Engineer-in-Chief. Secretary directed also to advise that this Board will in due time take the matter into consideration, respecting the placing of hydrants on the new pier now building at the Battery, and when action is taken by the Board he will be promptly advised as to the disposition of the same, and that the work contemplated to be done by the Department of Public Works cannot be done without a permit from this department.

From Department of Street Cleaning—In reference to the condition of the Pier at the foot of Forty-sixth street, East river, and requesting the Department to drive ten or twelve piles thereat and replace piles that are broken and out of place. Engineer-in-Chief to be directed to examine and report.

From Police Department—In reference to expiration of certificate of qualification of Dennis F. Eagan, and requesting that he be sent to be re-examined on the 16th instant. Secretary directed to notify the party to attend for re-examination.

From John F. Butt—Requesting permission to look at map of Pier 40, North river, for the purpose of making a draft of the same. The Secretary stating that by direction of the Commissioners the said permission had been granted, his action was approved.

From George Ott, Jr.—In reference to wharfage charged for canal boat.

From Manhattan Elevated Railway Company, per John Cavanagh—Requesting permission to repair Pier at One Hundred and Twenty-eighth street, Harlem river. Secretary to advise Mr. Cavanagh that the Board requires the application to be made by the officers of the Railway Company, and also requires that evidence of their title to the premises must be furnished to the Board before action will be taken on such application.

From Jere Pangburn, Jr.—Reporting that the bulkhead on the North river, between Piers new 39 and new 40, is in a very dirty condition, and requesting the Department to have the same cleaned. Secretary directed to send a copy of the letter to the Department of Street Cleaning, and request that the bulkhead be cleaned.

From Wm. H. Marsh—Requesting Department to furnish him with copies of test made of cement, about June 20th, 1884. Secretary directed to send copies of said report to Mr. Marsh.

From Thomas L. Madge—Offering to lease certain pier and bulkhead property on the East river.

From J. P. Bremner—Requesting permission to place a temporary derrick on the end of the pier at One Hundred and Twenty-ninth street, North river. Application denied, the end of the pier at One Hundred and Twenty-ninth street, North river, being fenced off from public use as unsafe and dangerous.

From Thomas L. Sturges—Requesting Department to reconsider their action in denying application for permission to leave opening in rip-rap at One Hundred and Fiftieth street, Harlem river. Application denied.

From Wm. P. Kelly—Agreeing to do extra work at the bulkhead between One Hundred and Twenty-ninth and One Hundred and Thirtieth streets, North river. Treasurer to issue order for doing the work; Engineer-in-Chief to make requisition therefor.

From Engineer-in-Chief:

1st. Reporting assignment of employees to special duty other than that to which they were appointed. Secretary directed to notify the Bookkeeper.

2d. Reporting the suspension of James Quinn, Laborer, for being absent from work three successive days without being excused. The action of the Engineer-in-Chief approved, and the said laborer discharged.

3d. Reporting as to erection of structure on the Harlem river, between One Hundred and Thirty-seventh and One Hundred and Thirty-eighth streets. The Dock Master to be directed to notify the parties to at once stop the work and to remove the same, or the penalty for violation of the rules will be imposed.

4th. Reporting that Laborers John Rice and Samuel Ward had been found asleep while on duty as Acting Watchmen, and recommending that they be not again assigned to duty as Watchmen. The action of the Engineer-in-Chief approved and the recommendation adopted.

5th. Reporting completion of offices, sheds, etc., at foot of West Fifty-seventh street, North river.

6th. Report on Secretary's Order No. 3659, that he had kept Pier foot of Horatio street, North river, in safe condition, until taken charge of by the contractor.

7th. Report on Secretary's Order No. 3883, as to test of cement furnished by S. L. Merchant & Co. Secretary directed to send them copy of said test.

8th. Report on Secretary's Order No. 3884, as to test of cement furnished by Louis Strauss & Co. Secretary directed to send them copy of said test.

From George W. Wannmaker, Dock Master—Reporting that the cross caps that extend north of the new bulkhead wall, north of Pier, new 26, North river, are very dangerous to vessels using the slip, and recommending that a pile be driven there to prevent vessels from running against them at high tides. Engineer-in-Chief to be directed to do the necessary work thereat.

From Abram Duryee, Dock Master—Reporting that he had notified the parties who erected the derrick on Pier foot of One Hundred and Thirtieth street, North river, to obtain a permit from the Department. Dock Master to be directed to report the name of the owner of the derrick. Penalty of \$25 imposed upon the owner thereof for violation of the rules, and the Secretary directed to notify the said owner to call and pay the amount of the said penalty to the Treasurer of the Department within five days after the receipt hereof, or the claim will be sent to the Counsel to the Corporation for collection. Engineer-in-Chief to be directed to forthwith remove the derrick on the Pier foot of One Hundred and Thirtieth street, North river.

A report from the Engineer-in-Chief, on Secretary's Order No. 3598 stating that he had made temporary repairs to Pier and approach foot West Forty-sixth street, North river, and submitting specifications and form of contract for resheathing the same at an estimated cost of about \$4,400, was received, read, and ordered to be placed on file, and the following resolution in relation thereto, offered by Commissioner Voorhis, unanimously adopted:

Resolved, That the specifications and form of contract, as prepared by the Engineer-in-Chief, for repairing the Pier and approach at the foot of West Forty-sixth street, North river, be and hereby are approved and adopted subject to the approval of the Counsel to the Corporation as to form, and that the Secretary be and hereby is directed to have a sufficient number of blank forms of proposals printed and proper advertisements inviting bids for doing the said work inserted in the papers designated by law.

A report from the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, transmitting copy of resolution adopted September 4th, instant, approving of the agreement entered into by the Department with the Old Dominion Steamship Company for the purchase by the Corporation of the City of New York of certain wharf property on the North river, having a frontage on bulkhead line on West street of one hundred and twenty-five feet southerly from the southerly side of Beach street, for the sum of \$75,000, provided that the title to the said property shall be approved by the Counsel to the Corporation, was received, read, and ordered to be placed on file, and the following preamble and resolution in relation thereto, offered by Commissioner Voorhis, unanimously adopted:

Whereas, This Board, on August 6th, 1884, entered into a contract with the Old Dominion Steamship Company for the purchase from said company of certain wharf rights, etc., on the North river, extending from the southerly line of Beach street for one hundred and twenty-five feet in a southerly direction, and it appearing that it is necessary to extend the time for the closing of said contract until September 24th, 1884, and the said Old Dominion Steamship Company having consented thereto; therefore

Resolved, That the time for closing the said contract be and it hereby is postponed until September 24th, 1884, between the hours of twelve o'clock noon and one o'clock P. M., and the officers of this Board are hereby authorized and directed to execute such instrument as may be necessary and proper for said postponement.

A communication from the Comptroller of the City, approving of the sureties of Walls & Van Riper to their estimate for repairing the Branch Workhouse Pier at Hart's Island, and for dredging thereat, was received and read, and together with the bids received and publicly opened on September 8th, instant, for doing the said work, which were taken from the table, was ordered to be placed on file, and the following resolution, offered by Commissioner Laimbeer, in relation thereto, unanimously adopted:

Resolved, That the contract for rebuilding the Branch Workhouse Pier at Hart's Island, and for dredging at the Branch Workhouse Pier and at the Branch Lunatic Asylum Pier, at Hart's Island, be and is hereby awarded to Messrs. Walls & Van Riper, their bid for doing the said work being the lowest under estimates publicly opened the 8th instant, and the Comptroller having approved of the sureties thereto the 10th instant.

The Auditing Committee presented an audit of thirteen bills or claims, amounting in the aggregate to the sum of \$5,837.55, which was accepted and adopted, and the Secretary directed to enter the same in full on the minutes as follows:
