COMMISSIONERS OF THE SINKING FUND.

Proceedings of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund at the Meeting held October 22d, 1884.

Present—Franklin Edson, Mayor; Frederick Smyth, Recorder; S. Hastings Grant, Comptroller; and Henry B. Laidlaw, Chamberlain.

The minutes of the last meeting were read and approved.

The Comptroller submitted the following resolution, viz.:

Resolved, That the resolutions adopted by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, September 4th and 30th, 1884, authorizing the issue of "Dock Bonds of the City of New York," to the amount of \$250,000 respectively, at a rate of interest not exceeding three and one-half per cent. per annum, be and the same are hereby amended, and the Comptroller is hereby authorized and directed to issue any portion of said bonds not heretofore issued, at a rate of interest not exceeding four per cent. per annum.

On motion, the resolution was adopted.

The Comptroller submitted the following communication from "The Municipal Service Examining Boards of the City of New York":

EQUITABLE BUILDING, NEW YORK, October 14, 1884.

To the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund of the City of New York:

GENTLEMEN—The Municipal Service Examining Boards of the City of New York require rooms for the accommodation of themselves and their clerks, and for the examination of persons applying for positions in the city service.

Up to this time the Trustees of the College of the City of New York have permitted them to occupy a portion of the College building. Their accommodations here have never been adequate, and the requirements of the service under the amended act of 1884 are so much greater than they have been hitherto, that it is quite impossible for them to perform the duties imposed on them by that act, and by the regulations adopted by the Mayor in pursuance of it, without suitable offices for the purpose.

They have applied to the Mayor of the City of New York for accommodations in some of the buildings belonging to the city, but these are fully occupied, and no offices in any of them are available for the use of the Boards. It therefore becomes necessary to lease suitable offices. They have made inquiry respecting premises available for the purpose, and have ascertained that the house No. 23 East Twentieth street, in the City of New York, can be hired from the owner, A. C. Kingsland, for a term beginning immediately and ending on the first day of May, 1886, at the annual rent of \$2,500, such rent to begin from and after the first of January, 1885.

We respectfully request the Commissioners to authorize a lease of said premises for the before-mentioned rent.

Resolved, That the Counsel to the Corporation be requested to prepare or approve of a form of lease of the building No. 23 East Twentieth street, in the City of New York, for the term of one year, six months and fifteen days, from the 15th day of October, 1884, at the annual rent of \$2,500, payable in equal quarterly payments, except the first payment which shall be made on the 1st day of May, 1885, and be the rent for the four months commencing January 1st, 1885, the balance of said rent on the regular quarter days, on the 1st day of August, November, February and May; and the Comptroller is hereby authorized and directed to execute such lease when prepared and approved by the Counsel to the Corporation, as provided by section 123 of the New York City Consolidation Act of 1882, and when the requisite appropriation therefor has been made by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment.

Whereupon the following resolution, submitted by the Comptroller, was, on motion, adopted:

Resolved, That a warrant for four hundred and two dollars and twenty-five cents (\$402.25), payable from the "Sinking Fund for the Payment of Interest on the City Debt," be drawn in favor of the Chamberlain for deposit in the City Treasury to credit of "Croton Water Rent—Refunding Account," for refunding Croton Water Rents paid in error, as per statement herewith.

The Comptroller submitted the following communication from the Judges of the Supreme Court, relative to the vacating, by the Finance Department, of the rooms in the New County Court-house, now occupied by said Department, viz.:

Whereas, All of the several rooms now occupied by the Comptroller, City Chamberlain, and Department of Finance, in the County Court-house in the City of New York, are actually needed for the use of the several terms and circuits of the Supreme Court; and

Whereas, Two of the lawfully assigned terms and circuits of said court, which were contemplated in the increase of the number of the justices of the Supreme Court, cannot now be held for want of the rooms now occupied by said city officers; and

Whereas, The land upon which said court-house was erected was purchased from the city by the County of New York, for court-house purposes, and the money expended in its building was raised upon the credit of the county, and was provided for the building of a county court-house, and such building consequently belongs specially to the use of the courts and the county officers connected therewith; and

Whereas, The occupancy of the rooms of the said court-house by the Comptroller, City Chamberlain, and the Department of Finance of the city to the exclusion of the courts is unauthorized by law and prevents the holding of the courts above mentioned, and thereby interferes with and prevents the administration of justice in the City and County of New York;

Therefore the undersigned, Justices of the Supreme Court of the First Department and District of this State, hereby give notice to the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of the City of New York, and to the Comptroller and City Chamberlain of said city, and to all other officers of the Finance Department of the said city, now occupying the rooms aforesaid in said court-house, that the said several rooms and each and every one of them now so occupied, are required and are necessary for the use of the said courts, and that two branches of the said Supreme Court are not now and cannot be held by reason of such occupancy of said rooms by the Comptroller, City Chamberlain, and the Finance Department of said city, and that said several rooms must be vacated so that the same may be fitted for the use of such courts, on or before the first day of November next, and in case the same be not done, the said Supreme Court will be compelled to take such further steps as may be necessary to enable the circuits and special terms assigned to be held in November next, and thereafter to occupy and hold terms and circuits in said rooms.

And it is ordered that copies of this notice be forthwith served on the Mayor, the Board of Aldermen, Comptroller and City Chamberlain of said city.

The Fourth Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within One Hundred and Forty-fifth street, Brook avenue, One Hundred and Forty-second street, and Third avenue.

The Fifth Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within One Hundred and Forty-fourth street, Rider avenue, One Hundred and Forty-second street, Third avenue, and Harlem river.
