SIR—There were 603 deaths reported to have occurred in this city during the week ending Saturday, November 22, 1884, which is a decrease of 56, as compared with the number reported the preceding week, and 2 more than were reported during the corresponding week of the year 1883. The actual mortality for the week ending November 15, 1884, was 655, which is 96.0 above the average for the corresponding week for the past five years, and represents an annual death-rate of 24.82 per 1,000 persons living, the population estimated at 1,372,237.


