

APPROVED PAPERS,

Ordinances and Resolutions passed by the Common Council during the week ending Feb. 20, 1886.

Whereas, The Legislative printing of the State has been taken from the legally appointed contractors by the majority in the Legislature, and given to a firm that were not the lowest bidders and who also discriminate against the union printers of this State; and,
Whereas, In doing so the aforesaid majority have been guilty of a high-handed, illegal and

Whereas, In doing so the atoresaid majority have been garry arbitrary act; be it Resolved, That in the name of the people of this city we denounce the same and call upon our representatives in the Legislature to take immediate steps to bring about a reconsideration of the action of the majority, with a view to having the legislative printing awarded to some firm which does not discriminate against the organized workingmen of this State; and be it further Resolved, That a printed copy of the foregoing preamble and resolution be duly authenticated by the signature of the Clerk of the Board and transmitted to each member of the State Legislature representing constituencies in this city.

Adopted by the Board of Aldermen, January 26, 1886. Received from his Honor the Mayor, February 15, 1886, without his approval or objections thereto; therefore, as provided in section 75, chapter 410, Laws of 1882, the same became adopted.

Resolved, That the Commissioners of the Department of Public Charities and Correction be and they are hereby authorized and empowered to continue the present connections with the several institutions under their charge, during the year 1886, by telephone, without advertising the same for public competition, and contracting therefor, pursuant to the provisions of section 64, chapter 410, Laws of 1882.

Adopted by the Board of Aldermen, February 9, 1886. Approved by the Mayor, February 15, 1886.

Resolved, That permission be and the same is hereby given to the Veteran Firemen's Association of the City of New York to place and keep two lamps inside the stoop-line in front of the headquarters of the Association, No. 53 East Tenth street, the work to be done and gas supplied at the expense of the Association, under the direction of the Commissioner of Public Works; such permission to continue only during the pleasure of the Common Council.

Adopted by the Board of Aldermen, February 9, 1886. Approved by the Mayor, February 16, 1886.

Resolved, That the Commissioner of Public Works be and he is hereby authorized and directed to lay water-mains in Seventh avenue, between One Hundred and Tenth and One Hundred and Twenty-fourth streets, pursuant to section 356 of the New York City Consolidation Act.

Adopted by the Board of Aldermen, February 9, 1886. Approved by the Mayor, February 16, 1886.

Resolved, That the Commissioner of Public Works be and he is hereby authorized and directed to lay water-mains in Thirty-first street, betweeen First and Second avenues, pursuant to section 356 of the New York City Consolidation Act of 1882.

Adopted by the Board of Aldermen, February 9, 1886. Approved by the Mayor, February 16, 1886.

Whereas, Horatio Seymour, formerly Governor of the State of New York, died at Utica on Friday, the 12th instant, in the seventy-fifth year of his age; and Whereas, The death of our illustrious fellow-citizen imposes upon this Common Council the duty of testifying to the high estimation in which he was held by the people of the city; be it

duty of testifying to the high estimation in which he was held by the people of the city; be it therefore

Resolved, That the death of Horatio Seymour is deplored by this Common Council. The public has already manifested a just sense of the magnitude of the loss it has sustained. He possessed the power and the wisdom that coupled science with the daily avocations of men; the philosophy that encompassed mankind; the religion that excluded none from its peaceful fold. He was tireless in the pursuit of truth; humble in the practice of every virtue, and stern and unyielding in the dispensation of their inexorable laws, sensitive and tender as a child, yet his simplicity of manner and purity of heart made him the censor of every human vice. He was a mentor to the novice in public life; a guide to the most experienced in the affairs of state, a counsellor to the most wise; a shining example to the most upright and conscientious. A philosopher, a statesman, a sage, the characteristics of them all were so blended in him that he was the most versatile and brilliant public man of the age in which he lived. His death is an irreparable loss to his country, and particularly so to the great Democratic party, that in the gravest emergencies was guided and controlled by his counsel and advice, and of which he was an acknowledged leader.

Resolved, That in the general gloom and poignant grief for the death of Horatio Seymour, his surviving family should not be overlooked, and we hereby tender to them in their sore bereavement our most sincere commiseration.

Resolved, That the foregoing preamble and resolutions be entered at length in the minutes, and that a copy thereof be suitably engrossed, be verified by the corporate seal of the city, attested by the Clerk of the Common Council, and transmitted to the family of the illustrious deceased, as a slight testimony of the love and affection of the people and government of this city for his memory.

Resolved, That, as an additional mark of our respect for the memory of Horatio Seymour, this Board do now adjourn.

AOUEDUCT COMMISSION.

Minutes of Stated Meeting of the Aqueduct Commissioners, held at their office, No. 209 Stewart Building, on Wednesday, February 10, 1886, at 3 o'clock, P. M.

Commissioners present—Commissioner of Public Works; Commissioners Spencer, Dowd and Baldwin.

Also Chief Engineer Church; and Chief Engmeer Birdsall and Consulting Engineer Adams, of the Department of Public Works.

Vice-President Dowd presided.

The minutes of stated meeting of February 3, were read and approved.

The Committee of Finance and Audit reported their examination and audit of the monthly estimate for work done by the contractor upon the New Aqueduct during the month of January, and included in vouchers Nos. 1452 to 1462, as follows:

By Smith & Brown, Section 1
By Brown, Howard & Co., Sections 2 to 5
By O'Brien & Clark, Sections 6 to 9.
By Heman Clark, Sections A and B. \$11,629 53 134,742 68 130,672 26 64,452 60

Also of bills included in Vouchers Nos. 1463 to 1476.
On motion of Commissioner Baldwin, all of the above vouchers were approved by the Commissioners and ordered certified to the Comptroller for payment.
A communication was received from the Mayor, addressed to him by Lewis G. Morris, Esq., in relation to powder magazines upon the line of the New Aqueduct, which was read and ordered placed upon file.

The Segretary received.

The Secretary presented a copy of the resolution of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, approving an agreement of the Aqueduct Commissioners with Jeremiah Mahoney, for the taking in fee of lands and premises belonging to him; whereupon Commissioner Spencer offered the following

resolutions:

Resolved, That the President and Vice-President are hereby authorized and requested, either one or the other of them, on behalf of the Aqueduct Commissioners, to execute the agreement between the said Commissioners and Jeremah Mahoney, for the taking in fee of the land and premiess belonging to him at the Pocantico river blow-off in the town of Mount Pleasant, Westchester County, containing about one and three-quarters (1¾) acres, for which the consideration money is the sum of two thousand dollars (\$2,000), the making of the said agreement having been duly approved by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on the 1st day of February, 1886, as required by section 23, chapter 490 of the Laws of 1883.

In compliance with the request of the Commissioners at their last meeting, the Counsel to the Corporation submitted his opinion adverse to the jurisdiction asserted by the Commissioners of Accounts, in relation to accidents occurring upon the work on the New Aqueduct now being done by contractors under authority of this Commission. The opinion was read and ordered placed on file, and the Secretary directed to transmit a copy thereof to the Commissioners of Accounts.

The Chief Engineer presented an opinion received by him from the Counsel to the Corporation upon the subject of change in the method of timbering in the aqueduct tunnels, and certain allowances for exavation asked for by the contractors. The opinion was read and the matter discussed, and on motion of Commissioner Baldwin, was laid over for further consideration.

The Chief Engineer next presented a request from the Division Engineers for an increase of their compensation, and recommended that such increase be made. On motion of Commissioner Baldwin, the matter was laid over for future consideration.

The Chief Engineer reported that he had succeeded in obtaining the services of Mr. William R. Hutton, C. E., to assist him during the temporary absence of Consulting Engineer Davis and the sickness of Deputy Chief Engineer Fleley, and at the same rate of compensation as that pad Mr. Davis, and that Mr. Hutton had entered upon the discharge of his dutes on the 8th instant. On motion of Commissioner Spencer, this action of the Chief Engineer was approved by the Commissioners, and the temporary employment of Mr. Hutton authorized, with compensation at the rate of \$6,000 per annum, dating from the 8th instant.

The Commissioners then adjourned.
