Ordinances and Resolutions passed by the Common Council during the week ending April 24, 1886.

Resolved, That permission be and the same is hereby given to H. Schneider to place and keep a watering-trough on the sidewalk near the curb-stone in front of No. 18 Coenties Slip, the work to be done and water supplied at his own expense, under the direction of the Commissioner of Public Works; such permission to continue only during the pleasure of the Common Council.

SIR—There were 698 deaths reported to have occurred in this city during the week ending Saturday, April 17, 1886, which is a decrease of 3, as compared with the number reported the preceding week, and 2 more than were reported during the corresponding week of the year 1885. The actual mortality for the week ending April 10, 1886, was 683, which is 45.4 below the average for the corresponding week for the past five years, and represents an annual death-rate of 24.84 per 1,000 persons living, the population estimated at 1,429,697.

AQUEDUCT COMMISSION.

Minutes of Stated Meeting of the Aqueduct Commissioners, held at their office, No. 209 Stewart Building, on Wednesday, April 7, 1886, at 3 o'clock P. M.

Present—The Comptroller, Commissioner of Public Works, Commissioners Spencer and Baldwin.

Also, Chief Engineer Church, and Chief Engineer Birdsall and Consulting Engineer Adams, of the Department of Public Works.

In the absence of the President and Vice-President, Commissioner Spencer was selected to preside.

The minutes of the stated meeting of March 24 were read and approved. The Committee of Finance and Audit reported their examination and audit of bills included in Vouchers Nos. 1613 and 1614, also of monthly estimates for work done during the month of March, included in Vouchers Nos. 1615 to 1632, and amounting to \$336,485.89.

On motion of Commissioner Baldwin, all of said Vouchers were approved by the Commissioners, and ordered certified to the Comptroller for payment.

The Committee on Construction made three reports, as follows: 1st. Dated March 30, 1886, submitting a report from the Chief Engineer in relation to the construction of a temporary sewer around Shaft No. 29, in Tenth avenue, near One Hundred and Fifty-seventh street, and recommending that the work be done by John Brunton & Co., at a cost of not to exceed \$600.

Commissioner Baldwin offered the following resolution :
 Resolved, That the Committee on Construction be and they hereby are authorized and empowered to employ John Brunton & Co. to construct a temporary sewer around the excavation of Shaft No. 29, on Tenth avenue, near One Hundred and Fifty-seventh street, and to maintain the same until a permanent sewer can be built in the masonry side-walls of said shaft ; the said work to be done at an expense of not exceeding six hundred dollars (\$600), and pursuant to the provisions of section 33, chapter 490 of the Laws of 1883.

This motion was seconded by the Commissioner of Public Works, and adopted unanimously.
 2d. Dated April 7, 1886, submitting and approving a request of the Chief Engineer for an appropriation of \$1,500 for instruments and office furniture for the engineers of Division No. 7, in this city.
 On motion of Commissioner Baldwin, the sum of \$1,250 was appropriated for the purchase of transits, levels and other instruments enumerated in the report of the Chief Engineer of April 5th, and the sum of \$250 for additional office furniture, all of the same being for the use of the engineers of Division No. 7.

3d. Dated April 7, 1886. Report in relation to the construction of a dock, and filling in the dumping-ground beyond the water-line at the Harlem river crossing of the New Croton Aqueduct ; the same to be done in the manner required by the Commissioners of the Department of Docks, and under permits to be obtained from them.

The report gave the details of the work, and the reasons for doing it, and was accompanied by a diagram showing the location of the proposed dock and the lands to be filled in.

Commissioner Spencer offered the following resolution :
 Resolved, That the Committee on Construction are hereby authorized to obtain from the Department of Docks permission to construct a dock at the westerly side of the Harlem river crossing of the New Croton Aqueduct, said dock to be of the width of one hundred feet, and to extend out to the bulkhead line established at that place by the United States surveys ; also to obtain and report to this Commission all necessary information as to the manner and cost of building said dock.

The resolution was adopted by the affirmative vote of all the Commissioners present.

Commissioner Spencer next offered the following resolution :
 Resolved, That the matter of filling in upon the lands upon the westerly bank of the Harlem river, north of High Bridge Park, lately acquired by the City for the construction of the New Croton Aqueduct and its appurtenances, and described upon the property maps filed in the office of the Register of the City and County of New York, on the 28th day of August, 1885, as Parcels Nos. 1 to 6 inclusive, be and the same is hereby referred to the Committee on Construction, with power to obtain from the Commissioners of the Department of Docks the necessary permits for dredging, rip-rapping and filling beyond the shore line upon said parcels of land, and subject to the approval of this Commission, and pursuant to the provisions of section 33, chapter 490 of the Laws of 1883, to contract with suitable persons for the necessary dredging upon said parcels of land.

This resolution was adopted unanimously.
 The Chief Engineer submitted a communication, dated 7th inst., in relation to the investigation of charges against him, and asking for the fullest investigation of all charges that have been or may be presented.

A communication was also received, dated the 1st inst., from Henry Macdonia, Esq., counsel of Mr. H. S. Craven, asking further investigation of charges made, or to be made, by the latter against the Chief Engineer, and the character of the work upon the New Aqueduct.

Both communications were read, and Mr. Macdonia was heard in relation thereto, and on motion of Commissioner Baldwin, the following resolution was unanimously adopted, and directed to be transmitted to the Examining Engineers now investigating the charges referred to :

Resolved, That the written request of the Chief Engineer and the counsel of Mr. Craven be referred to the Committee of Engineers, with the request of the Commissioners to examine fully in regard to any charges that have been or shall be made against the Chief Engineer in regard to any engineering work upon the aqueduct.

Notice was received from the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of the revocation, on the 5th instant, of their approval of the agreement between the Aqueduct Commissioners and the New York Life Insurance Company for lands in the town of Greenburgh, Westchester County, taken for the New Croton Aqueduct, and their subsequent disapproval of said agreement.

On motion of Commissioner Spencer, the matter was referred to the Committee of Finance and Audit.

Notice was presented of a lien of James Lunny, amounting to the sum of \$112, with interest from January 1, 1886, for materials alleged to have been furnished for the construction of that part of the New Croton Aqueduct under contract with O'Brien & Clark, said notice being dated April 3, 1886.

On motion of the Comptroller, the matter was referred to the Committee of Finance and Audit. A communication was received dated April 2, 1886, and addressed to his Honor, Mayor Grace, from Duncan Smith, Esq., President of the Board of Education of the City of Yonkers, in relation to the exposure to injury from explosives in use upon the New Aqueduct work, of a certain school-house and its inmates in the said city ; and requesting that immediate measures be taken to have said explosives removed, and safely stored.

On motion of the Comptroller, the matter was referred to the Chief Engineer for conference with Contractors O'Brien & Clark, and necessary action in the premises.

A letter was presented, dated March 25, from the Counsel to the Corporation, in relation to evidence to be given on behalf of the City, in cases now pending before the Commissioners of Appraisal for Westchester County.

The letter was read and the Secretary directed to confer with the said counsel upon the subject, and report to the Commissioners at their next meeting.

A remonstrance was received from August Belmont, Esq., President of the American Jockey Club, against the taking of lands in Jerome Park for the construction of a New Reservoir north of the Harlem river. It was read and ordered placed upon file for future consideration.

Communications were received from Messrs. O. B. Potter, William H. Webb and others, in opposition to the construction of the proposed Quaker Bridge Dam, and placed upon file, and upon request of Mr. Potter, the time for receiving communications was extended to the 30th instant.
