

The minutes of the meeting held June 4, 1886, were read and approved.

The Comptroller presented the following:

CITY OF NEW YORK-FINANCE DEPARTMENT, COMPTROLLER'S OFFICE, June 8, 1886.

To the Board of Estimate and Apportionment :

Herewith I present a communication from the Police Department, with a preamble and resolutions relative to certain acts of the Legislature authorizing an increase of the Police Force of the City of New York not exceeding five hundred in number, and providing for additional patrol service.

The resolutions request this Board to provide for, set apart and appropriate the sum of \$110,000, for the payment of three hundred additional Patrolmen for the remainder of the present year, and also the sum of \$40,000, for the purchase of horses, wagons, etc.

The act providing for the hundred additional Patrolmen for the remainder of the present year, and also the sum of \$40,000, for the purchase of horses, wagons, etc.

The act authorizing an increase of the Police force provides for the issue of Revenue Bonds and authorizes the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to insert in the Final Estimate for 1886, a sum sufficient to provide for the redemption of said bonds.

A resolution is therefore submitted, appropriating the sum of \$110,000 to the Police Department, for compensation of three hundred additional Patrolmen authorized to be appointed by said act, during the year 1886.

The act providing for the purchase of supplies of horses, wagons, etc., to extend the patrol service, does not, however, authorize any appropriation for the purpose in the present year, and no action can be taken upon it at present by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment.

SIR—At a meeting of the Board of Police, held this day, the following were adopted:

Whereas, Information has been received that His Excellency the Governor has signed the bill authorizing an increase of the Police Force of the City of New York, not exceeding five hundred in number, and also the bill providing for a better Patrol service by the addition of Patrol Wagons,

Whereas, This Board is informed that provision must be made this day in order that such (or any) increase of force and additional service, may be legally accomplished, and the moneys therefor

appropriated, therefore

Resolved, That in accordance with the provisions of said bills (now become laws), the Board of Estimate and Apportionment be and is hereby respectfully requested to provide for, set apart and appropriate the sum of \$110,000 for the payment of the services of three hundred additional Patrolof Estimate and Apportunment of the services of the appropriate the sum of \$110,000 for the payment of the services of the men to the force to and including December 31, 1886, and

Resolved, That the said Board be requested to appropriate and set apart the sum of \$40,000, with which to purchase supplies of horses, wagons, telegraph or telephone, and other facilities necessary for the proper carrying into effect the purposes of said bills.

CHAPTER 597.

An Act to increase the Police Force of the City of New York.

Passed June 7, 1886; three-fifths being present.

The People of the State of New York, represented in the Senate and Assembly, do enact as

The People of the State of New York, represented in the Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

Section I. The board of police force of the city of New York shall have power, and it is hereby authorized to increase the police force of said city, by appointing additional patrolmen, not exceeding five hundred in number, the amount necessary to provide for the compensation during the year eighteen hundred and eighty-six, of the additional patrolmen authorized to be appointed pursuant to the provisions of this act may be raised by the sale of revenue bonds, and the board of estimate and apportionment is authorized and empowered to insert in the final estimate for said year (before the certificate of the comptroller as to the amounts by law authorized to be raised by the tax in that year be submitted to the board of aldermen), a sum sufficient to provide for the redemption of said bonds, which sum, when so inserted shall be by the board of aldermen included in the tax levy for sailyear. Annually hereafter, the amount necessary to pay the compensation of such additional patrolmen, shall be inserted in the final estimate and included in the tax levy.

§ 2. This act shall not be construed as repealing or in any way modifying the provisions of section two hundred and sixty-five of chapter four hundred and ten, laws of eighteen hundred an eighty-two, and the several amendments, except that the same proportion between the number of sergeants and patrolmen prescribed therein for the force shall continue after its increase.

§ 3. This act shall take effect immediately.

CHAPTER 596.

An Act to amend an act entitled "An act to consolidate into one act and to declare the special and local laws affecting public interests in the City of New York."

Passed June 7, 1886; three-fifths being present.

The People of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as

Section 1. Section two hundred and fifty-four of chapter four hundred and ten of the laws of eighteen hundred and eighty-two, entitled "An act to consolidate into one act and to declare the special and local laws affecting public interest in the city of New York," is hereby amended so as to read as follows:

Solution to read as follows:

§ 254. The board of police may with the authority and approval of the mayor and commo council, from time to time, but with special reference to locating the same as centrally in precinct as possible, establish, provide and furnish stations and station-houses, or sub-stations, and sulstation-houses, at least one to each precinct, for the accommodation thereat of members of the police force, and as places of temporary detention for persons arrested and property taken within the precincts; and shall also provide and furnish such business accommodations, apparatus, and articles, and provide for the care threof, as shall be necessary for the department of police and the transaction of the business of the department. The said board of police are hereby authorized and empowered to furnish horses and wagons to be known as patrol wagons not exceeding four to be assigned to each police precinct station-house, and not less than five to be assigned to police head quarters, which said horses and wagons shall be under the custody and care of said police deparament and for the exclusive use thereof; and the board of estimate and apportionment is directed to appropriate a sufficient sum of money in each and every year, for the purpose of furnishing such horses, wagons and apparatus connected therewith and the maintenance thereof.

§ 2. This act shall take effect immediately.

To the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

I submit herewith a copy of a communication addressed by me on the 2d inst. to the Counsel to the Corporation, asking his opinion upon the construction of the law passed by the Legislature, Mc. 19, 1886, and entitled, "An act to provide for the payment of indebtedness arising under certain contracts for local improvements in the City of New York."

The opinion of the Counsel to the Corporation is also submitted, that the issue of assessment bonds is authorized by said act, for the payment of the indebtedness of the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of the City of New York, under contracts for works of local improvement made and entered into in behalf of the Corporation prior to the first day of January, 1885, as authorized by the provision of laws existing and applicable thereto at the time such contracts respectively were made and entered into.

It will be necessary, therefore, to issue assessment bonds to make the payments due and becoming due upon such contracts, and I submit a resolution to authorize the Comptroller to make such issues of assessment bonds, from time to time, as may be required for that purpose.

#### CHAPTER 420.

An ACT to provide for the payment of indebtedness arising under certain contracts for local improvements in the City of New York.

Passed May 19, 1886; three-fifths being present; without the approval of the Governor.

The people of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows

Section 1. The indebtedness of the mayor, aldermen and commonalty of the City of New York, under contracts made and entered into by or on behalf of said corporation prior to the first day of January, eighteen hundred and eighty-five, for works of local improvement in the said city, shall be provided for and paid by and out of moneys to be raised under and pursuant to and as authorized by the provisions of the laws existing and applicable thereto at the time such contracts, respectively, were made and entered into.

§ 2. Nothing in this act contained shall be construed to ratify or validate any contract or claim under any contract which would not have been valid had this act not been passed.

§ 3. This act shall take effect immediately. Section 1. The indebtedness of the mayor, aldermen and commonalty of the City of New York,

SIR—I am in receipt of your communication under date of June 2, 1886, inclosing a copy of chapter 420 of the Laws of 1886. You ask my opinion upon the construction of the law on the

three following points:

First—Whether it authorizes the issue of assessment bonds for the payment of contracts for local improvements made and entered into prior to January 1, 1885?

It does authorize such issue.

Second—If assessment bonds can be issued, whether the money so raised shall be paid into and merged in the fund for local improvements created by chapter 174, Laws 1885, and payments be made on account of such old contracts out of said fund?

The money so raised should not be merged in the fund referred to.

Third—Shall the moneys so raised by the issue of assessment bonds form and constitute a separate and distinct fund which shall be applicable only to the payment on account of such old contracts, made prior to 1885?

contracts, made prior to 1885?

The moneys raised by the issue of such bonds should constitute a distinct fund, applicable only to the payment of the contracts referred to in the third question.

Sanitary Bureau

The following is a record of the work performed in the Sanitary Bureau for the week ending May 29, 1886:

The total number of inspections made by the Sanitary Inspectors was 5,660.

The number of complaints returned by the Sanitary Inspectors was 395.

During the past week 267 complaints were received from citizens, and referred to the Sanitary Inspectors for investigation and report.

There were issued to the consignees of vessels to discharge cargoes on vouchers from the Health Officer of the Port 67 permits.

Officer of the Port, 67 permits.

There were issued to consignees to discharge rags (in bulk, under bonds), 8 permits.

There were issued under the Sanitary Code, 8 miscellaneous permits.

There were issued to scavengers to empty, clean and disinfect privy sinks, 100 permits.

At premises where contagious diseases were reported 111 visits were made, and 41 disinfections and 13 fumigations were peformed.

The number of cases of contagious disease removed to Riverside Hospital was 9.

The number of vaccinations performed was 946, of which 654 were primary, and 292 re-vaccinations.

re-vaccinations.

There were seized and condemned 7,165 pounds of meat.

The number of specimens of milk examined was 16; the number of analyses of same made was 2.

The certificates of 511 births, 49 still-births, 222 marriages and 635 deaths, reported to have taken place in this city, were received by this Bureau during the week ending Saturday, May 29, 1886. This shows an increase of 22 births, and 9 deaths, and a decrease of 20 still-births and 20 marriages, when compared with the number received during the preceding week; but when compared with the corresponding week of the year 1885, there was an increase of 88 births, 2 still-births and 18 marriages, and a decrease of 23 deaths. Of the total number of deaths reported for the week, 168 were in institutions, 331 in tenement houses, 119 in houses containing three families or less, 6 in hotels and boarding-houses, 11 in rivers, streets, boats, etc.; 8 were on the basement floor, 93 on the first, 142 on the second, 117 on the third, 72 on the fourth, 23 on the fifth, 3 on the sixth; 619 were stated to be residents of New York City and 16 non-residents; 101 were stated to be single, 192 married, 70 widowed, and the condition of 272 was not stated; these were children who had not attained a marriageable age.

The total number of burial permits issued during the week are as follows, viz.: City deaths, 635; still-births, 49; bodies in transitu, 13; of the total burial permits issued for city deaths and still-births, 67 were upon certificates received from the Coroners; 511 births, 222 marriages, 49 still-births, 635 deaths; 13 applications for transit permits were recorded, indexed and tabulated; 113 searches of the registers of births, marriages and deaths were made, and 4 transcripts of the birth record, 7 of marriage and 86 of death were issued during the week.

The mean temperature for the week ending May 29, 1886, was 62.1 degrees Fahrenheit, the mean reading of the barometer was 29.689; the mean humidity was 73, saturation being 100; the number of miles traveled by the wind was 1,062, and the total amount of rain-fall was 0.25 inch depth of water, as reported by D. Draper, Ph. D., Director of the New York Meteorological Observatory, Central Park.

Whereas, It is with profound sorrow that this Common Council has learned that John Kelly died at his residence in this city yesterday, Tuesday, the 1st instant; and

Whereas, The death of an ordinary friend or acquaintance occasions gloom and sorrow, but when death strikes down one of the most prominent and influential men of his day and generation—
a man universally known, beloved and admired—one whose name is associated with all that is manly, brave and honorable, whose word was his bond—sadness and gloom give place to the deepest grief, the most profound sorrow. John Kelly has been prominently before the people of this city for more than one-third of a century: He was an Alderman of his ward; twice a member of Congress from his district; twice Sheriff of this county; Comptroller of this city and an Assessment Commissioner, and he performed the duties incident to these various positions and others of minor importance with singular intelligence and fidelity, deservedly earning the commendation and praise of grateful constituencies. Through all this time and amid all these changes he retained the name bestowed upon him, when but ten years old, by his first employer, James Gordon Bennett the elder, that of "Honest John Kelly." He was a self-made man in the highest and broadest acceptation of that honored term. He began his career when but ten years of age as an office boy, and by patient application to business by day, and to study by night, combined with industry, energy and perseverance, he attained, step by step, the exalted position he held at the time of his death—the leader of the oldest political organization in the country—an organization co-eval with the organization of our government—and became also recognized as a counsellor and guide to the great Democratic party as well of this State as of this Republic; and

Whereas, When such a man dies it is incumbent upon this Common Council to take such measures as will best testify the sorrow of the people and government of this, his native city, for his death

Resolved, That out of respect for the memory of John Kelly the public offices of the Corporation be closed and no public business be transacted on the day appointed for solemnizing the funeral rites, Saturday, June 5, 1886 (except in the offices specially required by law to be kept open), that the flags on the City Hall and the other public buildings be displayed at half-staff from surrise until sunset on said day, and the owners or occupants of private buildings and the owners or masters of vessels in our harbor are hereby requested to display their flags at half-mast on that day, and that a committee of five, of whom the President shall be one, be appointed by the Chair to take such other action and make such other and further arrangements as to them may appear more impressively to manifest sorrow for the death and respect for the memory of the illustrious deceased; and be it further
