The minutes of the last meeting were read and approved.

REPORTS.

The Committee on Law Department, to whom was referred the annexed communication from V. L. Cottman, Lieutenant United States Navy, under date of June 4, 1886, relating to the establishment of a "time-ball" in the City of New York, do respectfully

REPORT:

That, from the information they have been able to obtain, they consider that the establishment and regular operation of a "time-ball," or even of two or more "time-balls," in this city, under the direction and control of the United States Hydrographic Office or Naval Observatory, would be of great importance to the interests of commerce and navigation at this harbor.

The necessary regulation and comparison of ship's chronometers can be most easily accomplished by the aid of a "time-ball" dropped with the utmost scientific precision; and the United States Government offices can secure and be held responsible for such precision.

In this almost indispensable aid to navigation and navigators, our city, considering its prominence as the chief sea-port of the United States, is not adequately equipped.

We are indebted to the Western Union Telegraph Company for the only "time-ball" service we have, the ball on the Western Union building being dropped at a signal from the United States Naval Observatory, but operated by the employees of the telegraph company. The same scientific accuracy and responsibility for errors can therefore not be expected or required as if the apparatus were exclusively controlled by one of the scientific departments of the government.

Your Committee are informed that all the principal sea-ports of Europe are furnished with this branch of government service—two and even three "time-balls" being used where one cannot be placed so as to be visible from all points of the water-front.

In our own country, as your Committee are informed by the "Notice to Mariners [No. 171 of 1885]," issued by the United States Hydrographic office, "A time-ball has been erected by the Hydrographic office at Philadelphia, on the Maritime Exchange building, also at Baltimore, on the tower of the Baltimore and Ohio Railroad building. The Naval Observatory has also erected a time-ball at Hampton Roads, on the east tower of the Hygeia Hotel."

We learn also that a "time-ball" is now operated by the United States Government in San Francisco, Cal.

In addition to its great importance to navigators, your Committee are further of opinion that the establishment and maintenance of a scientific "time-ball" service in our city would be a notable convenience to our citizens in general; and as the matter as now presented does not involve any outlay in money by the City of New York, your Committee emphatically recommend the adoption of the following resolutions:

Resolved, That, in the opinion of this Common Council, the establishment and operation by the Government of the United States, through one of its scientific departments, of a thorough and complete "time-ball" service in the port of New York would be of the highest importance to the interests of commerce and navigation, and a great convenience to our citizens in general.

Resolved, That a copy of these resolutions, together with a copy of the report of the Committee on Law Department of this Board embodying the same, be transmitted to Lieutenant V. L. Cottman, United States Navy, as an answer to his valued communication upon the subject, dated June 4, 1886.

Section 1. The sidewalks or footwalks of that part of East One Hundred and Fifty-first street between Mott and Walton avenues, in the Twenty-third Ward of the City of New York, shall be twelve feet in width on each side.

Sec. 2. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

To the Honorable the Board of Aldermen:

I, Edward V. Loew, Comptroller of the City of New York, do hereby certify that, in pursuance of the provisions of chapter 597 of the Laws of 1886, the sum of one hundred and ten thousand dollars (\$110,000) is to be raised by taxation in the year 1886, for the payment of the services of additional Patrolmen, appointed by the Board of Police; and, also, that the sum of two million forty-four thousand dollars (\$2,044,000) is to be deducted from the Final Estimate of 1886, for the amounts of certain appropriations included therein and revised pursuant to the authority of chapter 660, Laws of 1886, as stated in a resolution of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, adopted July 12, 1886, as follows, to wit:

Whereas, Chapter 660 of the Laws of 1886 authorizes and empowers the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of the City of New York "to revise, by the concurrent vote of all the members thereof, the Final Estimate of the amounts required to pay the expenses of conducting the public business of the City and County of New York in each department and branch thereof, and of the Board of Education, for the year 1886, by striking therefrom such amounts as have been appropriated therein for the purposes for which there is authority under existing provisions of law to issue bonds of the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of the City of New York"; and

Whereas, The Constitutional Amendment restricting municipal indebtedness, adopted by a vote of the people of the State of New York, November 4, 1884, to take effect January 1, 1885, provides that—

"No county containing a city of over one hundred thousand inhabitants, or any such city shall be allowed to become indebted for any purpose or in any manner to an amount which, including existing indebtedness, shall exceed ten per centum of the assessed valuation of the real estate of such county or city subject to taxation, as it appeared by the assessment-rolls of said county or city on the last assessment for state or county taxes prior to the incurring of such indebtedness; and all indebtedness in excess of such limitation, except such as may now exist, shall be absolutely void, except as herein otherwise provided"; and

Whereas, Under this provision of the State Constitution it was held by the authorities of the city that bonds of the City of New York could not be lawfully issued after January 1, 1885, excepting for certain objects and purposes specially therein excepted, and bonds were not issued after that date for several objects and purposes which could otherwise have been issued under the authority of existing laws; and

Whereas, It became necessary on account of this restriction upon the issue of bonds for such objects and purposes, to include in the Final Estimate for the year 1886, appropriations therefor, as follows, viz.:

"The Fund for Local Improvements"	\$500,000 00
"Purchasing and Procuring School Sites for and Erecting New School Buildings and for Additions to School Buildings"	894,000 00
"Construction of a Bridge over the Harlem River"	750,000 00
Total.....	\$2,144,000 00

And Whereas, The Court of Appeals of the State of New York has decided in the case of The Bank for Savings in the City of New York against the Mayor, etc., April 30, 1886, that the constitutional prohibition upon the issue of bonds and the increase of municipal indebtedness is not now applicable to the City and County of New York, and, therefore, bonds may now be issued for such objects and purposes; and

Whereas, The Counsel to the Corporation, in an opinion given to the Comptroller upon the powers conferred upon this Board by chapter 660 of the Laws of 1886, states that—

"If the Fund for Local Improvements should, for any reason, be insufficient to meet all probable claims upon it without using some part of the \$500,000 appropriation, then I advise you that it is competent for the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to revise the Final Estimate for this year by striking therefrom so much of the \$500,000 appropriation as will not be needed for the purpose to which it was appropriated"; and

Whereas, As appears by the report presented by the Comptroller, that he considers it advisable, for the reasons stated, and recommends that the sum of one hundred thousand dollars (\$100,000) be retained out of the appropriation of five hundred thousand (\$500,000) to the Fund for Local Improvements and that the sum of four hundred thousand dollars (\$400,000) be stricken therefrom; and

Whereas, In the opinion of the Counsel to the Corporation the Board of Estimate and Apportionment may also strike out the entire appropriation for the purchase of school sites and the erection of new school buildings, etc., and for the construction of a bridge over the Harlem river; therefore

Resolved, That in pursuance of the provisions of chapter 660 of the Laws of 1886, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment hereby revises, by the concurrent vote of all the members thereof, the Final Estimate of the amounts required to pay the expense of conducting the public business of the City and County of New York, in each department and branch thereof, and of the Board of Education, for the year 1886, by striking therefrom the amounts set against each of the following appropriations, aggregating the sum of two million forty-four thousand dollars (\$2,044,000), viz.:

From the appropriation for "The Fund for Local Improvements," strike out.....	\$400,000 00
From the appropriation for "Purchasing and Procuring School Sites for and Erecting New School Buildings and for Additions to School Buildings," strike out.....	894,000 00
From the appropriation for "Construction of a Bridge over the Harlem River," strike out.....	750,000 00

Resolved, That the above sum of two million forty-four thousand dollars (\$2,044,000) be deducted from the Final Estimate of 1886; and

Whereas, On June 9, 1886, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment adopted the following resolution, to wit:

"Resolved, That pursuant to the authority conferred upon the Board of Estimate and Apportionment by chapter 597 of the Laws of 1886, an appropriation be and is hereby made of the sum of one hundred and ten thousand dollars (\$110,000), to be entitled 'Additional Police Fund,' chapter 597, Laws of 1886, said amount to be included in the Final Estimate for the year 1886, for the redemption of the Revenue Bonds to be issued for the payment of the services of three hundred additional Patrolmen, appointed by the Board of Police of the City of New York, under the provisions of said act, and in compliance with a resolution adopted by the Police Board on June 7, 1886, requesting such an appropriation"; therefore

Resolved, That the sum of one hundred and ten thousand dollars (\$110,000) be added to the Final Estimate of 1886.

Affirmative—The President, Aldermen Cavanagh, Cleary, Divver, Earle, Farrell, Ferrigan, Fitzgerald, Hunsicker, Lang, Masterson, Menninger, Mooney, Morgan, Murray, O'Neil, Quinn, and Van Rensselaer—18.

On motion of Alderman Morgan the above vote was reconsidered and the resolution again laid over.

Alderman Van Rensselaer, by unanimous consent, called up G. O. 195, being a resolution, as follows:

Resolved, That Manhattan street, from St. Nicholas avenue to Ninth avenue, shall be known and designated as "Hancock place," and that the plot of ground lying between St. Nicholas avenue, Manhattan avenue and One Hundred and Twenty-third street, shall be known and designated as "Hancock Park"; this resolution to take effect December 1, 1886.

The President put the question whether the Board would agree with said resolution.

Which was decided in the affirmative.

On motion of Alderman Van Rensselaer, the communication from the Counsel to the Corporation, presented at the last meeting, relating to the proposed change of name, was taken from on file and directed to be attached to the resolution.

Alderman Cleary, by unanimous consent, called up veto message of his Honor the Mayor (No. 91), of resolution, as follows:

Resolved, That permission be and the same is hereby given to the Hazelwood Ice Company to place and keep a platform-scale not more than fourteen feet long and eight feet wide, flush with the surface of the street, along the southerly side of Rivington street, about two feet west from the bulkhead at the foot of said street; also a weigh office, not to exceed twelve feet long, six feet wide and eight feet high, provided that such scale and weigh house shall be no impediment to the free use of said street by the public, such scale to be used only for weighing ice, the work done at the expense of the company, under the direction of the Commissioner of Public Works; such permission to continue only during the pleasure of the Common Council.

The veto message having been endorsed as received by the Board June 30, 1886, although not presented until the meeting held on the 9th instant, Alderman Van Rensselaer raised the point of order that inasmuch as the Board failed to meet on the 30th of June, for want of a quorum, the veto could not legally be considered as having been received on that day.

The President ruled the point of order as not well taken. The point of order gave rise to a lengthy discussion,

When Alderman Cleary, by consent of the Board, withdrew his call for the consideration of the veto message.

MOTIONS AND RESOLUTIONS RESUMED.

By Alderman Divver—

Resolved, That, in accordance with the request of the Trustees of the New York and Brooklyn Bridge, the sidewalks on Vandewater street, east of Frankfort street, and the sidewalks on Cherry street, at the northeast corner of Dover street, opposite Franklin Square, be established at the widths and on the lines designated in the annexed map, dated July 10, 1886, and signed by C. C. Martin, Chief Engineer and Superintendent of the New York and Brooklyn Bridge, and that the said Trustees be required to do all necessary work in paving and repaving carriageways, resetting curb, and reflagging sidewalks in connection with such change, at their own expense.

Which was referred to the Committee on Lands and Places, and Park Department.

Alderman Cleary moved that the Board do now adjourn.

The President put the question whether the Board would agree with said motion.

Which was decided in the affirmative.

And the President announced that the Board stood adjourned until Wednesday next, the 21st day of July, at 1 o'clock P. M.

Compared with the mortality reported during the preceding week, the deaths from scarlatina decreased 2; erysipelas, 4; inanition, 3; alcoholism, 1; bronchitis, 4; pneumonia, 23; heart diseases, 10; aneurism, 1; convulsions, 5; apoplexy, 5; all diseases of the brain and nervous system, 6; cirrhosis and hepatitis, 1; while the deaths from small-pox increased 1; diphtheria, 1; croup, 1; whooping-cough, 3; typhus fever, 1; typhoid fever, 3; cerebro-spinal fever, 1; malarial fevers, 1; puerperal diseases, 1; diarrhoeal diseases, 100; rheumatism and gout, 1; cancer, 1; phthisis pulmonalis, 12; marasmus, 1; tabes mesenterica and scrofula, 13; hydrocephalus and tubercular meningitis, 5; meningitis and encephalitis, 8; direct effect of solar heat, 1; gastritis, enteritis and peritonitis, 8; Bright's disease and nephritis, 8; cyanosis and atelectasis, 1; premature and pretermatal birth, 1; suicide, 2; drowning, 3. The number of deaths from measles and surgical operations was the same in the two successive weeks.

Deaths from the principal Zymotic Diseases, Phthisis Pulmonalis, Pneumonia, Bronchitis, and Children under five years of age, reported during the week and compared with the three preceding weeks.

Of the total number of deaths reported for the week, 146 were in institutions, 444 in tenement-houses, 151 in houses containing three families or less, 5 in hotels and boarding-houses, 6 in rivers, streets, boats, etc.; 12 were on the basement floor, 130 on the first, 187 on the second, 131 on the third, 97 on the fourth, 41 on the fifth, 2 on the sixth; 740 were stated to be residents of New York City and 12 non-residents; 85 were stated to be single, 156 married, 63 widowed, and the condition of 448 was not stated; these were children who had not attained a marriageable age.

The total number of burial permits issued during the week are as follows, viz.: City deaths, 752; still-births, 65; bodies in transitu, 17; of the total burial permits issued for city and still-births, 74 were upon certificates received from the Coroners; 617 births, 252 marriages, 65 still-births, 752 deaths; 17 applications for transit permits were recorded, indexed and tabulated; 128 searches of the registers of births, marriages and deaths were made, and 6 transcripts of the birth record, 8 of marriage and 75 of death were issued during the week.

The mean temperature for the week ending July 3, 1886, was 71.2 degrees Fahrenheit, the mean reading of the barometer was 29.974; the mean humidity was 80, saturation being 100; the number of miles traveled by the wind was 828, and the total amount of rain-fall was 0 inch depth of water, as reported by D.
