Whereas, The owners and consignees of steamers and other vessels arriving at the port of New York, with whole or partial cargoes of rags, are often delayed in discharging such cargo, when stored beneath the rags, by the failure of the consignees of the rags to take out a discharging permit or to give the bonds required of importers of rags by the Board of Health; therefore,

Resolved, That the Sanitary Superintendent be and hereby is instructed to allow the owners and consignees of steamers or other vessels to give the bond usually required of consignees of rags and subject to the same conditions, and thereupon issue a permit for the discharge of the rags from the vessel, subject, as heretofore, to the restrictions of the Health Officer of the Port.
