AQUEDUCT COMMISSION.

Minutes of Stated Meeting of the Aqueduct Commissioners, held at their office, No. 209 Stewar Building, on Wednesday, September 22, 1886, at 2 o'clock P. M.

Present—Commissioners Spencer, Dowd, the Commissioner of Public Works, Commissioners Baldwin, Barnes, Ridgway, and Fish; also Chief Engineer Church, and Chief Engineer Birdsall, of the Department of Public Works.

The minutes of the Stated Meeting of September 15 were read and approved.

The Committee on Construction, by its Chairman, Oliver W. Barnes, submitted the following report:

That at their meeting on the 17th instant the Committee organized by the appointment of the

Resolved, That the Chief Engineer be requested to proceed with all possible dispatch to complete the borings on that ground as soon as possible, and, if necessary, obtain from the Department of Public Works the loan of an additional boring machine to expedite the work, and if any additional force of men or material is required, to report at an early date, with such request as he may deem Adopted.

That the following rule was adopted, and added to the Rules and Regulations of the Com-

That the following rule was adopted, and added to the Rules and Regulations of the Committee, as section 7, viz.:

Section 7. The meetings of the Committee shall be open to the visitation of the Aqueduct Commissioners, their Secretary, the Chief Engineer and his principal assistants; and the Secretary and Clerk are directed to exhibit its minutes and proceedings to any of said persons named, on his or their request. Persons other than those named may attend the meetings, on the request or consent of the Committee. Adopted.

Also recommend the adoption of the following resolution:

Resolved, That this Committee recommend to the Aqueduct Commissioners that their Secretary be directed to suppress all letter-heads in use that are incorrect, according to the present organization, and have new ones prepared and printed. Recommendation adopted.

Also, that they have had under consideration a communication from the Commissioner of Public Works, dated September 10, in relation to laying, as soon as possible, the necessary mains between the gate-house at One Hundred and Thirty-fifth street and Convent avenue and the Central Park Reservoir, and in connection therewith recommend the adoption of the following resolution:

Resolved, That the Chief Engineer be instructed to proceed immediately with the work of laying the necessary mains between One Hundred and Thirty-fifth street gate-house and the Central Park Reservoir, and for the distributing mains between these points, and to prepare the contracts for public letting of said work at the earliest practical date. Adopted.

Also that on the 10th instant, the question of the necessity of additional shafts on the line of the Aqueduct being before the Committee, the Chief Engineer was requested to report to them what additional shafts, if any, would be needed in the progress of the work, and the reasons therefor.

That on the 17th instant, the Chief Engineer, in a report, stated that an additional shaft was required between Shafts Nos. 15 and 16, at Station 927, which could be designated as "Shaft No. 15½," and one between existing Shafts Nos. 13 and 14, at or near Station 792+50, which could be designated as "Shaft No. 13½," and a third shaft between existing shafts Nos. 16 and 17, at or near Station 1018, provided the contractors would provide the ground necessary for the same and the dumping-ground, and construct the shaft at a cost not to exceed \$5,000.

Commissioner Ridgway moved that the report of the Committee be laid upon the table for one week, and that copies of the same be furnished to each Commissioner. Carried.

Commissioner Fish moved that the last vote taken be reconsidered, and the same was carried.

Commissioner Fish then moved that the report be referred back to the Committee on By-Laws for action and report, and the same was carried.

The Special Committee on Real Estate, by its Chairman, James C. Spencer, made the following report:

To the Aqueduct Commissioners:

NEW YORK, September 22, 1886.

GENTLEMEN—The Special Committee created by your resolutions of July 14 and 21, "to take into consideration the question of the taking the fee, in lieu of an easement, of lands upon the line of the New Aqueduct, with power to negotiate with owners thereof, either for an enlargement of the existing easement, or for a conditional fee, where said owners so desire," make the following report:

existing easement, or for a conditional fee, where said owners so desire," make the following report:

First, on Parcels in Westchester County:

On the 4th of August a conference was held by the Committee on Construction with the Chief Engineer and Mr. Dykman, of the Counsel for the City, in the taking of property rights in Westchester County, and the latter was requested to examine the parcels proposed to be taken in fee, in that county, and to report the probable cost of the proposed change; and this Committee awaited the result of that examination before taking action in relation to these parcels.

Mr. Dykman completed his examination and made full report thereof to Corporation Counsel Lacombe, on the 13th instant. That report was transmitted to the Committee on Construction by Mr. Lacombe on the 16th instant, accompanied by his own views and opinion upon the subject. The Committee on Construction referred those a cers to this Committee, and we now submit them to you.

From these documents it appears that the probable cost of bringing the 1 gal proceedings (required to obtain the fee) up to the point which the former proceedings to acquire the easement have already reached, would entail a very heavy expense; and that the difference between the amount of awards for the fee, or for the easement, would tell very heavily against the City.

Under these circumstances the opinion of the Counsel is adverse to the taking of the fee, except in certain cases referred to by them; and in that opinion this Committee concurs. The taking of the fee in the exceptional cases, and of certain rights in other cases, as named by said Counsel, seem to us well advised, and for the best interest of the city.

We, therefore, recommend the adoption of the following resolution:

We, therefore, recommend the adoption of the following resolution:

Resolved—That this Commission approves of the recommendations of the Counsel for the City, contained in their communications of the 13th and 16th instants, in relation to proposed changes in the estate to be acquired in lands upon the line of the New Aqueduct, and the taking of the tee only in certain exceptional cases; also, as the steps to be taken to mitigate the damages in cases

where an easement is acquired.

Resolved, That the above-named communications from Counsel be referred to the standing Committee on Real Estate, with request that under advice of said counsel they take the necessary steps to effect the objects set forth in said communications.

Second—On Lands in the Twenty-fourth Ward:

Under instructions from this Committee most of the owners (or their representatives) of the parcels between the Harlem river and the lands now owned by the City north of Mosholu avenue, have been seen, and without exception they are opposed to the taking of the fee in said parcels. In some cases the owners have verbally agreed to convey to the City, for a nominal consideration, the required easement for the construction of the Aqueduct and the right to locate monuments, provided the fee be not taken, and no other use than monumenting be made of the surface.

A form of conveyance has been prepared, in conference with the Counsel to the Corporation, and approved by this Committee, to be executed by such owners, and directions given to proceed at once to obtain the execution of such conveyances.

In nearly all the other cases it is believed that the owners will grant the right to locate monuments on similar conditions, leaving the consideration for the easement to be determined by the Commissioners of Appraisal, and as the nature of the easement to be made of the ground and surface above the Aqueduct are clearly defined in the above-named form of conveyance, many doubtful questions heretotore raised to increase the measure of damage will be settled, and the amount of the awards correspondingly reduced.

This Committee have therefore given directions to ascertain and report to the Standing Committee on Real Estate, which of the owners of said parcels will enter into such an agreement.

Third—On Lands upon Manhattan Island:
