

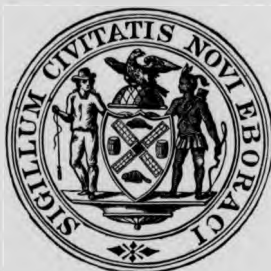

That a separate vessel shall be provided for ashes and rubbish, and another for garbage and liquid substances; and ashes and rubbish shall not be placed or kept in the same vessel with garbage and liquid substances; and all ashes, rubbish, garbage and liquid substances that should be removed from such buildings and place of business, or from that part for which said receptacles were provided, and none other (without the proper consent), shall be placed therein, and no such box, barrel or tub, before or after it is emptied, shall be placed or permitted to remain upon the sidewalk or in any other public place, but shall be kept within or upon the premises of the person or persons to whom it belongs, until removed therefrom for emptying by the authorized employees of the Department of Street Cleaning, and by them returned to the place whence it was taken.

Section 96. Sanitary Bureau.

The following is a record of the work performed in the Sanitary Bureau for the week ending March 26, 1887:

The total number of inspections made by the Sanitary Inspectors was 5,865.
 The number of complaints returned by the Sanitary Inspectors was 1,143.
 During the past week 249 complaints were received from citizens, and referred to the Sanitary Inspectors for investigation and report.
 There were issued to the consignees of vessels, to discharge cargoes on vouchers from the Health Officer of the Port, 39 permits.
 There were issued to consignees, to discharge rags (in bulk, under bonds), 5 permits.
 There were issued, under the Sanitary Code, 8 miscellaneous permits.
 There were issued to scavengers to empty, clean and disinfect privy sinks, 86 permits.
 At premises where contagious diseases were reported, 440 visits were made, and 323 disinfections and 43 fumigations were performed.
 The number of cases of contagious disease removed to Riverside Hospital was 7.
 The number of vaccinations performed was 2,900, of which 252 were primary, and 2,648 revaccinations.
 There were seized and condemned, 18,112 pounds of meat, and 11,455 pounds of fish.
 The number of specimens of milk examined was 15, the number of analyses of same made was 2, the number of quarts of adulterated milk destroyed was 20, and the number of arrests made was 1.

The certificates of 655 births, 64 still-births, 214 marriages and 697 deaths, reported to have taken place in this city, were received by this Bureau during the week ending Saturday, March 26, 1887. This shows an increase of 53 births, and 3 still-births, and a decrease of 92 marriages and 37 deaths, when compared with the number received during the preceding week; but when compared with the corresponding week of the year 1886 there was an increase of 77 births, 11 still-births, and 7 marriages, and a decrease of 66 deaths. Compared with the mortality reported during the preceding week, the deaths from measles decreased 11; scarlatina, 3; croup, 6; whooping cough, 3; malarial fevers, 7; puerperal diseases, 2; diarrhoeal diseases, 6; alcoholism, 4; phthisis pulmonalis, 24; pneumonia, 7; heart diseases, 4; hydrocephalus and tubercular meningitis, 10; meningitis and encephalitis, 4; apoplexy, 1; all diseases of the brain and nervous system, 3; premature and pretermaturnal births, 2; surgical operations, 3; suicide, 4; while the deaths from small-pox increased 3; erysipelas, 1; typhoid fever, 2; cerebro-spinal fever, 7; inanition, 1; cancer, 3; bronchitis, 14; convulsions, 3; cirrhosis and hepatitis, 1; gastritis, enteritis, and peritonitis, 5; Bright's disease and nephritis, 7; cyanosis and atelectasis, 7. The number of deaths from diphtheria, rheumatism and gout, aneurism, marasmus, tabes mesenterica and scrofula, and drowning, was the same in the two successive weeks.

Deaths from the principal Zymotic Diseases, Phthisis Pulmonalis, Pneumonia, Bronchitis, and Children under five years of age, reported during the week and compared with the three preceding weeks.

Of the total number of deaths reported for the week, 143 were in institutions, 391 in tenement-houses, 143 in houses containing three families or less, 10 in hotels and boarding-houses, 10 in rivers, streets, boats, etc.; 7 were on the basement floor, 119 on the first, 180 on the second, 129 on the third, 83 on the fourth, 26 on the fifth, 0 on the sixth; 684 were stated to be residents of New York City, and 13 non-residents; 101 were stated to be single, 13 married, 97 widowed, and the condition of 309 was not stated; these were children who had not attained a marriageable age.

The total number of burial permits issued during the week are as follows, viz.: City deaths, 697; still-births, 64; bodies in transit, 12; of the total burial permits issued for city and still-births, 77 were upon certificates received from the Coroner; 655 births; 214 marriages; 64 still-births; 697 deaths; 12 applications for transit permits were recorded, indexed, and tabulated, 179 searches of the registers of births, marriages, and deaths were made, and 12 transcripts of the birth record, 9 of marriage, and 88 of death were issued during the week.

The mean temperature for the week ending March 26, 1887, was 35.8 degrees Fahr., the mean reading of the barometer was 29.681, the mean humidity was 57, saturation being 100, the number of miles traveled by the wind was 1,656, and the total amount of rain-fall was 0.98 inch depth of water, as reported by D. Draper, Ph.D., Director of the New York Meteorological Observatory, Central Park.

The disposition of 664 deaths and still-births, or 87.25 per cent. of the total number reported, was in the following 14 cemeteries: Bayside (Jewish), 27; Calvary (Roman Catholic), 275; City pauper burial ground (undenominational), 99; Greenwood (undenominational), 41; Lutheran, (undenominational), 84; Cypress Hills (undenominational), 20; Evergreen (undenominational), 45; Woodlawn (undenominational), 23; St. Michael's (Protestant Episcopal), 16; Union (Methodist Protestant), 5; Holy Cross (Roman Catholic), 7; Machpelah, L. I. (Jewish), 1; St. Raymond's (Roman Catholic), 11; Washington (undenominational), 10.

The actual mortality for the week ending March 19, 1887, was 706; this is less than the number that occurred during the corresponding week of the year 1886, and is 33.6 less than the average of the corresponding weeks of the past five years, and represents an annual death-rate of 24.98 per 1,000 persons living, the population estimated at 1,469,686.

NOTICE TO CROTON WATER CONSUMERS.

NUMEROUS APPLICATIONS HAVING BEEN made to this Department by citizens claiming reductions or rebates on bills for water supplied through meters, on the alleged ground of leakage caused by defective plumbing and other causes, or by willful waste of water by tenants allowing the faucets to be turned on in full force in water-closets, sinks, etc., without the knowledge or consent of the owners of the premises.

Under the main object of the use of water-meters is to enable this Department to detect and check the useless and unwarrantable waste of an element so valuable and essential to the health and comfort of all the citizens, and this object can only be accomplished by enforcing payment for the water actually consumed.

Under the law all charges for water supplied through meters are a lien against the respective premises, and the law therefore holds the owner of the premises responsible for the amount of water used or wasted. Notice is therefore given to the owners of premises, in all further applications for reduction of water rents, no allowance will be made on account of waste of water occurring through leaks, from defective service pipes or plumbing, or wasteful use of water by tenants or occupants of buildings, though such leakage or waste may have occurred without the knowledge or consent of the owners of the buildings.

House-owners are further notified that whenever their premises become vacant, and are likely to remain vacant, they must notify this Department of the fact, and unless this requirement is complied with no deductions in extra water rents will be allowed for any portion of one year.
