BOARD OF ALDERMEN.

TUESDAY, October 11, 1887,
1 o'clock P. M.

The President here addressed the Board as follows:

ALDERMEN—It is my painful duty to announce to you the decease of our fellow-member, James J. Corcoran, the Alderman from the Fifteenth District.

The moment is a solemn one; the more so, as this is the second time within a year that death has visited this Board.

A few months ago it came with all the shock of sudden and violent accompaniment; in almost an instant removing one whom, in a few days, we all expected to meet as one of our colleagues.

In the case of Alderman Corcoran it has been marked by slow but evident approaches. It was not my pleasure to know him as well as most of you, but I was able to see enough of him to mark and appreciate the kindness of his nature, the quietness and composure of his demeanor, and the attention to his duties which he displayed while the condition of his health would admit of it.

In the somewhat difficult position which I have been called upon to occupy, and in which both the efficiency and comfort of the incumbent depends so much upon the kindness of feeling and cooperative disposition of the members of the Board, I have always found Alderman Corcoran courteous, kind and helpful. For this my memory of him will always be a pleasant and a grateful one.

It is met that this Board should, in appropriate form, show its sense of the bereavement which it has suffered, and do honor to the memory of our departed colleague.

On motion of Alderman Dowling, the reading of the minutes of the meeting of October 4 was dispensed with.

Alderman Quinn offered the following preamble and resolutions, prefacing their introduction by an eulogy of Alderman Corcoran:

This Board has learned with sorrow of the decease of Alderman James J. Corcoran, the representative in this Board of the people of the Fifteenth Assembly District.

Our deceased associate was for the second time the representative of the Fifteenth Assembly District in this Common Council. He was deservedly very popular with his constituents, as he possessed, in a marked degree, those many traits of character that invariably attract and attach all who came within the influence of his personality. He was kind and courteous in his demeanor, genial and confiding in his disposition, firm and unyielding in his convictions, and disinterested in his friendships. His death is a loss to the public; a cause of sorrow to his friends; a calamity to his family and relatives. He was a conscientious and painstaking representative, and an honest legislator, and it becomes the sad duty of the members of this Board, in view of these facts, to take such action as will testify our sorrow for his death and place on record our estimate of the loss this Board and the public have sustained by his death; be it therefore

Resolved, That the members of this Common Council deplore the death of Alderman James J. Corcoran, who represented the Fifteenth Assembly District in this Board, and hereby place on record this evidence of the esteem in which he was held by us, and our sense of his worth, both in his private and public relations.

Resolved, That, out of respect for the memory of Alderman James J. Corcoran, the Chamber of this Board, and the chair lately occupied by him, be draped in mourning for a period of thirty days; that the offices of the Corporation, except those specially by law required to be kept open, be closed on the day of the funeral ceremonies (Thursday, October 13, 1887); that the flags on the City Hall and the other public buildings be displayed at half-staff from sunrise until sunset on that day; that the members of the Board will attend his funeral in a body, and that a committee of six members of this Board, of whom the President shall be one, be appointed to perfect the above and make such other arrangements as may to them appear to be necessary.

Resolved, That, as an additional mark of respect for the memory of our lamented associate, this Board do now adjourn.

Alderman Van Rensselaer and Conkling, on seconding the motion for the adoption of the preamble and resolutions, alluded to the loss sustained by the death of Alderman Corcoran, and paid tributes of respect to the life, character and public and private virtues of the deceased.

The President then put the question whether the Board would agree to adopt the preamble and the first and second resolutions.

Which was decided in the affirmative, unanimously, by a rising vote.

And the President appointed as such Committee, Vice-President Divver and Aldermen Fitzgerald, Quinn, Dowling, Cowie, and Van Rensselaer.

The President then put the question whether the Board would agree with the last resolution. Which was decided in the affirmative.

And the President announced that the Board stood adjourned until Tuesday, October 18, 1887, at 1 o'clock P. M.
