

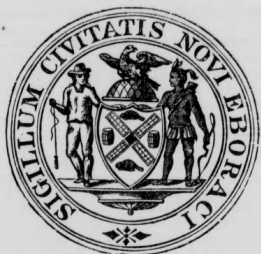

REPORTED MORTALITY* for the week ending October 22, 1887, together with the ACTUAL MORTALITY for the week ending October 15, 1887.

W. DE F. DAY, M. D., Sanitary Superintendent and Register:

SIR—There were 616 deaths reported to have occurred in this city during the week ending Saturday, October 22, 1887, which is a decrease of 24, as compared with the number reported the preceding week, and 60 less than were reported during the corresponding week of the year 1886. The actual mortality for the week ending October 15, 1887, was 631, which is 37.4 above the average for the corresponding week for the past five years, and represents an annual death-rate of 21.95 per 1,000 persons living, the population estimated at 1,494,816.

POLICE DEPARTMENT.

The Board of Police met on the 31st day of October, 1887. Present—Commissioners French, Porter, McClave and Voorhis. Whereas, A communication was received by the Board of Police on the 25th instant from the office of the District Attorney, transmitting a resolution adopted by the Grand Jury, requesting the Board of Commissioners of the Police Department "to instruct all subordinates and officers of the said Department to immediately notify all persons maintaining, or responsible for, any unauthorized obstruction upon the streets or highways of this city to remove the same within forty-eight hours after said notification; and to report to the Grand Jury the name and address of any person who may fail to comply with the requirements of said notification;" and Whereas, Said resolution was referred to the Superintendent of Police, with direction to comply with the request of the Grand Jury; and Whereas, It has been represented to this Board by his Honor the Mayor, that an enforced compliance with such notification would result in great hardship and serious loss and inconvenience to a very large number of residents of this city engaged in the transportation of wares and merchandise, who are duly licensed for such pursuit, and especially so in view of the fact that the temporary occupation of the streets by cars, trucks and other vehicles is, in pursuance of a long-established usage, tolerated and authorized by the municipal government from time immemorial; therefore be it Resolved, That in acknowledging the receipt of the resolution of the Grand Jury, its attention be respectfully called to the facts as above stated, with a request that they give the same most careful consideration before taking immediate or further action thereon; and also be it Resolved, That in view of a misapprehension existing in regard thereto, the attention of the public, and especially the above-named parties in interest, be called to the fact that it is not the duty or intention of the Police to remove unlawful obstruction from the public streets, but simply to take notice of and report all unauthorized obstructions thereon to the proper authorities, as requested by the Grand Jury.
