Sanitary Bureau.

The following is a record of the work performed in the Sanitary Bureau for the week ending October 29, 1887:
There were 5,915 inspections made by the Sanitary Inspectors and the Sanitary Police.
There were 405 complaints returned by the Sanitary Inspectors and the Sanitary Police.
There were 197 complaints received from citizens and referred to the Sanitary Inspectors and Sanitary Police for investigation and report.
There were issued to the consignees of vessels to discharge cargoes, on vouchers from the Health Officer of the Port, 80 permits.
There were issued to consignees, to discharge rags (in bulk, under bonds), 5 permits.
There were issued, under the Sanitary Code, 13 miscellaneous permits.
There were issued to scavengers to empty, clean and disinfect privy sinks, 43 permits.

The certificates of 670 births, 49 still-births, 274 marriages and 673 deaths, reported to have taken place in this city, were received by this Bureau during the week ending Saturday, October 29, 1887. This shows a decrease of 95 births and 15 still-births, and an increase of 8 marriages and 57 deaths, when compared with the number received during the preceding week, but when compared with the corresponding week of the year 1886 there was a decrease of 55 births, 5 still-births and 21 marriages, and an increase of 6 deaths. Compared with the mortality reported during the preceding week, the deaths from small-pox decreased 1; measles, 2; whooping cough, 2; erysipelas, 1; malarial fevers, 5; puerperal diseases, 2; diarrhoeal diseases, 7; marasmus, tabes mesenterica and scrofula, 2; hydrocephalus and tubercular meningitis, 1; convulsions, 5; gastritis, gastro-enteritis, enteritis, and peritonitis, 11; Bright's disease and nephritis, 6; premature and pre-natal births, 7; surgical operations, 3; while the deaths from scarlatina increased 3; diphtheria, 18; croup, 2; typhoid fever, 4; cerebro-spinal fever, 2; alcoholism, 7; rheumatism and gout, 1; cancer, 2; phthisis pulmonalis, 16; bronchitis, 21; pneumonia, 17; heart diseases, 4; meningitis and encephalitis, 6; apoplexy, 3; all diseases of the brain and nervous system, 5; cirrhosis and hepatitis, 7; cyanosis and atelectasis, 2; suicide, 2; drowning, 3. The number of deaths from inanition was the same in the two successive weeks.

Deaths from the principal Zymotic Diseases, Phthisis Pulmonalis, Pneumonia, Bronchitis, and Children under five years of age, reported during the week and compared with the three preceding weeks.

The total number of burial permits issued during the week are as follows, viz.: City deaths, 673; still-births, 49; bodies in transit, 12; of the total burial permits issued for city and still-births, 735 were upon certificates received from the Coroners; 670 births, 274 marriages, 49 still-births, 673 deaths; 12 applications for transit permits were recorded, indexed and tabulated; 146 searches of the registers of births, marriages, and deaths were made, and 13 transcripts of the birth record, 7 of marriage, and 90 of death were issued during the week.

The mean temperature for the week ending October 29, 1887, was 46.8 degrees Fahr.; the mean reading of the barometer was 30.118; the mean humidity was 63, saturation being 100; the number of miles traveled by the wind was 1,117, and the total amount of rain-fall was 6.01 inch depth of water, as reported by D. Draper, Ph. D., Director of the New York Meteorological Observatory, Central Park.

The disposition of 633 deaths and still-births, or 87.67 per cent. of the total number reported, was in the following 14 cemeteries: Bayside (Jewish), 20; Calvary (Roman Catholic), 280; City pauper burial-ground (undenominational), 61; Greenwood (undenominational), 37; Lutheran (undenominational), 92; Cypress Hills (undenominational), 22; Evergreen (undenominational), 34; Woodlawn (undenominational), 20; St. Michael's (Protestant Episcopal), 19; Union (Methodist Protestant), 1; Holy Cross (Roman Catholic), 14; Machpelah, L. On motion of Commissioner Barnes, the report was approved, and the Secretary directed to place said stipulations on file.

Also, recommended the adoption of the following resolution: Resolved, That the resignation of J. T. Hyland of the position of Axeman be and the same is hereby accepted, to take effect as of the 18th of October, 1887.

On motion of Commissioner Barnes, the resolution was adopted and the resignation accepted.

Also, recommended the adoption of the following resolution: Resolved, That upon the recommendation of the Chief Engineer, the following persons be and they are hereby appointed to the position of Inspector of Masonry, they having been certified by the Civil Service Commission as being eligible for such appointment: Isaac W. Lewis, James H. McCarty, Thomas F. O'Mara, Ernest R. Spormann, William F. Quinn, and Peter O'Flinn; and that Andrew Nearn be and he is hereby appointed to the position of Axeman, to take the place of J. T. Hyland, resigned.

On motion of Commissioner Barnes, the resolution was adopted and the appointments made.

Also, recommended the adoption of the following resolution: Resolved, That William Gray be and he is hereby promoted from the rank of Laborer to that of Transman, he having been certified by the Civil Service Commission as being eligible for such promotion.

On motion of Commissioner Barnes, the resolution was adopted and the promotion made. The Chief Engineer submitted a report received by him from Principal Assistant Engineer J. Imbrie Miller, stating that the headings between Shafts No. 2 and No. 3 met at four o'clock on the morning of November 1, and that said shafts are 6,200 feet apart and 350 feet deep; that before the last eight feet of rock was blasted the machine drills were set to correct line and grade in both tunnels by Mr. Wheeler and Mr. Page, and these drills met and struck each other; and further stating that Division Engineer Charles S. Gowen and Assistant Engineer Harry R. Wheeler are deserving of credit for such work. The report was read, and on motion of Commissioner Barnes was ordered entered upon the minutes and filed.

NUMEROUS APPLICATIONS HAVE BEEN made to this Department by citizens claiming reductions or rebates on bills for water supplied through meters, on the alleged ground of leakage caused by defective plumbing and worn-out service pipes, or by willful waste of water by tenants allowing the faucets to be turned on in full force in water-closets, sinks, etc., without the knowledge or consent of the owners of the premises.

The main object of the use of water-meters is to enable this Department to detect and check the useless and unwarrantable waste of water, and to secure the most economical and comfortable of all the citizens, and this object can only be accomplished by enforcing payment for the water wasted.

Under the law all charges for water supplied through meters are a lien against the respective premises, and the law therefore holds the owner of the premises responsible for the amount of water used or wasted. Notice is therefore given to all householders that, in all further applications for reduction of water rents, no allowance will be made on account of waste of water occurring through leaks, from defective service pipes or from willful waste of water by tenants or occupants of buildings, though such leakage or waste may have occurred without the knowledge or consent of the owners of the buildings.

House-owners are further notified that whenever their premises become vacant, and are likely to remain vacant, they must notify this Department in writing, and that unless this requirement is complied with, no deduction in extra water rents will be allowed for any portion of one year.
