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DEPARTMENT OF DOCKS.

At a meeting of the Board of Docks, held June 21, 1888.
Present—Commissioners Stark, Matthews and Post.
The minutes of the meetings held June 14 and 15, 1888, were read and approved.
The following communications were received, read, and,
On motion, ordered to be placed on file, action being taken where necessary, as stated, to wit:
From Hon. Abram S. Hewitt, Mayor:
1st. Transmitting communication from B. C. Gerken, withdrawing protest against the erection of a dump between Seventy-first and Seventy-second streets, East river.
2d. In relation to establishing a dump at the foot of Lincoln avenue, Harlem river, for the use of the Department of Street Cleaning. Referred to the President.
From Department of Public Works—Stating that manhole cover near Pier, new 37, North river, will be replaced at once.
From H. E. Nesmith, Jr.—Requesting permission to repair Piers 9 and 10, East river, where the sheathing joins the street. The action of the President in issuing a permit under the usual conditions was approved.
From Theodore K. Hazard—Requesting permission to run a sewer-pipe through the bulkhead on the lower side of Pier 39, East river. Referred to the Engineer-in-Chief to examine and report.
From C. Gallagher—Requesting permit to use Department land on the East river, between Thirty-seventh and Thirty-eighth streets. The action of the President in directing the Engineer-in-Chief to examine and report was approved.
From New York, New Haven and Hartford Railroad Company—Requesting permission to fill in between Brook avenue and Mill Brook on the Harlem river. The action of the President in directing the Engineer-in-Chief to examine and report, was approved.
From International Navigation Company—Accepting lease of Pier, new 43, North river, on the terms proposed.
On motion, the officers of the Board were authorized to execute said lease when prepared and ready for execution.
From Consolidated Gas Company:
1st. Requesting permit to dredge, between Forty-first and Forty-second streets, North river. The action of Commissioner Post, in issuing a permit, was approved.
2d. Requesting removal of bank formed between Fortieth and Forty-third streets, North river. The action of the President, in directing the Engineer-in-Chief to examine and report, was approved.
From John D. Smith and David Milliken, Committee of Citizens of the Nineteenth Ward—Withdrawing objections to erection of a dumping-board near Seventy-first street, East river.
From Benjamin & West—Requesting permission to erect an awning at the east end of Fulton Fish Market, over a portion of Pier 23, East river. The action of the President in issuing a permit under the usual conditions, was approved.
From Receiver Fort Lee Ferry Company—For permission to repair ferry racks at foot of One Hundred and Thirtieth street, North river. The action of the President, in issuing a permit, was approved.
From O'Connell & Coffey—Requesting extension of time to complete bulkhead and pier at Forty-sixth street, East river, under Contract No. 271.
On motion, the time was extended ten days, from June 25, 1888.
From Peter Donnelly—Requesting berth for loading manure at Pier foot of Thirty-seventh street, North river. Application denied.
From James O'Brien—Requesting permission to erect a mast on wheels on Pier foot of One Hundred and Seventeenth street, Harlem river, or on any of the Department piers. Application denied.
From Kane & Wright—Requesting berth at Pier foot of Forty-sixth street, East river, to load manure.
From William Slack—Requesting permit to run a 3-inch cast-iron pipe through the bulkhead south of Thirty-eighth street, North river. The action of the President in issuing a permit under the usual conditions was approved.
From Western Union Telegraph Company—Agreeing to terms of permit for placing cables, etc., under Pier at Fifty-fifth street, North river.
The following reports were received from the Dock Masters:
From Charles B. Husted—Reporting repairs required to Piers at West Thirteenth, Fifteenth and Eighteenth streets, North river.
From Patrick J. Brady—Reporting repairs required to Pier, new 59, North river.
From Charles H. Thompson—Reporting iron strap broken on the corner of Pier 7, East river.
From Charles Hutchinson—Repairs required to sheathing on deck of Pier at Twenty-eighth street, East river.
From George A. Dearborn—Reporting repairs required to Pier south of Eighty-sixth street, East river. The action of the President, in directing the Engineer-in-Chief to examine said Piers and repair where necessary, was approved.
From John Callan—Stating that the Pontoon Bridge erected over Bronx river had been removed.
From Charles B. Husted—Reporting that Piers at Bogart and Bloomfield streets, North river, require cleaning. The action of the President in requesting the Department of Street Cleaning to clean was approved.
From Joseph B. Erwin—Reporting that the scow "Sea Beach" discharged a cargo of sand on Pier foot of Forty-sixth street, North river, on June 10, 1888, in violation of Rule No. 3.
On motion, the Secretary was directed to notify Peter Ciancimino, owner of said scow, to show cause on Thursday, June 28, 1888, at 12 o'clock M., why penalty should not be imposed for violation of said rule.
From Engineer-in-Chief:
1st. Reporting assignment of employees to special duty.
2d. Reporting amount of work during the weeks ended June 9 and 16, 1888.
3d. Recommending that the permit issued to C. H. Mallory & Co. on the 4th of August, 1887, to build a shed on Pier 21, East river, be revoked or suspended until they are ready to go to work.
On motion, permit was revoked.
4th. Submitting agreement of Neuchatel Asphalt Company (Limited) to keep the asphalt paving on the sidewalk at the boat landing at Pier A, North river, in repair for five years, at their own expense.
5th. Reporting the wearing away of manhole-head of the new main sewer leading to Pier, new 37, North river. The action of the President in requesting the Department of Public Works to repair was approved.
6th. Reporting damage to bulkhead wall between Pier A and Pier, new 1, North river.
On motion, the Engineer-in-Chief was directed to repair.
7th. Reporting that Bernheimer & Schmid have completed the erection of a platform on piles at the foot of One Hundred and Eighth street, North river, and that the land under water covered by said platform occupies an area of 2,406 square feet.
On motion, the Secretary was directed to notify the Chief Clerk to charge rent for said premises, commencing July 1, 1888.
8th. Report on Secretary's Order No. 7975, in reference to the application of the New York, New Haven and Hartford Railroad Company for permission to fill in the land under water on the

Bronx Kills, lying adjacent to and southerly of the Harlem River and Portchester Railroad, and extending from Brook avenue easterly to Mill Brook.
On motion, permit was granted provided the said filling is done as recommended by the Engineer-in-Chief of this Department, and under his direction and supervision.
9th. Report on Secretary's Order No. 7365, that the occupants of the north half of bulkhead foot of Seventy-fourth street, East river, had filled in and rendered premises safe for use.
10th. Report on Secretary's Order No. 7838, condition of and repairs required to bulkhead foot of Eighteenth street, East river. The action of the President in directing the Engineer-in-Chief to repair as recommended in his report was approved.
11th. Report on Secretary's Order No. 7944, in reference to the application of M. C. Dexter, for permission to locate baths at Piers foot of Twenty-first and Thirty-fifth street, North river. The action of the President in granting said permits, provided the consent of the lessees is first obtained, was approved.
12th. Report on Secretary's Order No. 7909, respecting the application of the Old Dominion Steamship Company, for permission to stretch an awning on the front of the shed on the north and south sides of the roadway entrance to Pier, new 26, North river, during the summer months. The action of the President in issuing a permit under the usual conditions was approved.
13th. Report on Secretary's Order No. 7952, repairs required to the sheathing on deck of approach to Pier, new 47, North river. The Engineer-in-Chief directed to repair as recommended in his report.
14th. Report on Secretary's Order No. 7931, in reference to the application of the Twenty-third Street Railway Company, to run a four-inch pipe through the bulkhead between Piers 22 and 23, East river. The action of the President in issuing a permit under the usual conditions was approved.
15th. Report on Secretary's Order No. 6916, respecting the dumping of brick-bats over Battery Park sea-wall.
16th. Report on Secretary's Order No. 7640, reference to Pier 2, East river.
17th. Report on Secretary's Order No. 7684, that he had directed and superintended repairing Piers, new 20 and 21, North river.
18th. Report on Secretary's Order No. 7859, that he had directed and superintended repairing pavement in front of bulkhead between Jackson and Gouverneur streets, East river.
19th. Report on Secretary's Order No. 7883, repairs required to the bulkhead foot of Eighteenth street, East river.
20th. Report on Secretary's Order No. 7725, that he had directed and superintended repairing westerly end of Pier 8, North river.
21st. Report on Secretary's Order No. 7739, that he had refastened fender-piles on outer westerly corner of Pier 12, East river.

27th. Report on Secretary's Order No. 7792, that he had directed and superintended the repairing and replacing of backing log, etc., at Pier, old 23, North river.
28th. Report on Secretary's Order No. 7918, that he had rechecked and refastened mooring post at easterly outer end of Pier 18, East river.
29th. Report on Secretary's Order No. 7934, that he had repaired the deck of east half of Pier 18, East river.
30th. Report on Secretary's Order No. 7935, that he had patched sheathing on deck of west half of Pier 19, East river.
31st. Report on Secretary's Order No. 7937, that he had repaired bulkhead between Piers, new 42 and 43, North river.
32d. Report on Secretary's Orders Nos. 7953 and 7954, that he had directed and superintended the driving of white oak spring piles in front of the bulkhead between Bank and West Eleventh streets, and at the Pier and bulkhead foot of West Twentieth street, North river.
33d. Report on Secretary's Order No. 7960, that he had directed and superintended the removal of about fourteen feet of the backing log from Pier at Thirty-fourth street, North river, at temporary berth of Scott & Co.
The report of the Engineer-in-Chief on Secretary's Order No. 7959, was
On motion, ordered to be placed on file and the following preamble and resolutions were adopted:
Whereas, It appears that E. M. Van Tassel or others maintain and occupy a certain platform on land under water belonging to the City of New York on the southerly side of Pier, old 39, North river, and in front of the bulkhead between Laight street and Vestry street on the North river;
Resolved, That any and all permits or license, if any such there be, authorizing the said E. M. Van Tassel or any other person or persons to maintain or occupy such platform or wharf structure and the superstructures thereon upon land under water belonging to the City of New York at or near the southerly side of Pier, old 39, North river, or in front of the bulkhead between Laight and Vestry streets on the North river, be and hereby are revoked from and after the 21st day of June, 1888.
Resolved, That E. M. Van Tassel be and hereby is directed and required to remove the platform on the southerly side of Pier, old 39, North river, and in front of the bulkhead between Laight and Vestry streets, North river, and all superstructures thereon, within thirty days from date of service of a copy of this resolution.
The report of the Engineer-in-Chief on Secretary's Order No. 7977, respecting the application of C. Gallagher for use of land between Thirty-seventh and Thirty-eighth streets, East river, was,
On motion, ordered to be placed on file and the following resolution adopted:
Resolved, That permission be and hereby is granted to C. Gallagher to use and occupy during the will of the Board the property belonging to the City, between original high-water mark and the water's edge, south of East Thirty-eighth street, with permission to fence it off, provided he pay as compensation for the use of the said premises the sum of \$5 per month, payable monthly when due, to the Dock Master of the district.
The following preamble and resolution was,
On motion, adopted:
Whereas, Lincoln avenue, in the Twenty-third Ward of the city, has been duly acquired by the City and legally opened south of One Hundred and Thirty-fourth street and is the only piece of water-front on the easterly side of the Harlem river, between the Third Avenue Bridge and the Bronx Kills, that it is not private property; therefore
Resolved, That the Engineer-in-Chief be and hereby is directed to prepare and submit plans, specifications and form of contract for building a bulkhead across the foot of Lincoln avenue in the Twenty-third Ward of the city.
The communication from Hon. Abram S. Hewitt, Mayor, respecting the improvement of the ferry premises occupied by the Staten Island Rapid Transit Railroad Company, at the foot of Whitehall street, East river, was, on motion, ordered to be placed on file, and the following resolution adopted:
Resolved, That permission be and is hereby granted to the Staten Island Rapid Transit Railroad Company, to alter, repair and extend the Ferry wharf structures at the foot of Whitehall street, East river. The said work to be done in accordance with the plans submitted, which are hereby approved, and under the direction and supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief of this Department. Provided, that the said company shall first agree to and assent in writing within ten days from the date of this resolution, to pay as compensation for the use of the land under water covered by said Ferry structures, over and above and in addition to the land under water now covered by existing structures, the sum of twenty-five cents per square foot per annum, payable quarterly at the end of each quarter to the Treasurer of this Department during the continuance of the present lease of said Ferry franchise or for such time as the said Staten Island Rapid Transit Railroad Company may occupy the premises referred to under the existing lease, and also that all structures erected on said land under water shall revert to and become the property of the City on the revocation or sooner termination of this permit or of the expiration or sooner termination of the lease of said premises held by said Company.
The application of the Fort Lee Park and Steamboat Company for permission to place an awning-frame and tally-house on outer end of Pier at Thirty-fourth street, with permission to land thereat, was,
On motion, taken from the table, ordered to be placed on file, and the following resolution adopted.

Resolved, That permission be and hereby is granted to the Fort Lee Park and Steamboat Company to make landings at the outer end of the Pier at Thirty-fourth street, North river, and place an awning-frame and tally-house thereat, which are to be and remain during the will of the Board, provided they pay as compensation for said landings at the rate of \$3 per day for week days and \$5 per day for Sundays, the said amount to be payable at the end of each week to the Dock Master of the district.

 From Counsel to the Corporation—In reference to renewal of lease of Pier, new 42, North river, to the Compagnie Generale Transatlantique. Referred to Commissioners Post and Matthews.

From Comptroller of the City:
 1st. Approving sureties of John W. Flaherty to his estimates for building bulkhead from Seventy-fifth to Seventy-seventh streets, North river, and foot of East One Hundred and Nineteenth street, Harlem river.

2d. Requesting information respecting the application of George Bradish for a release of the City's interest in a parcel of land between One Hundred and Eighth and One Hundred and Tenth streets, Harlem river. The President authorized to transmit to the Comptroller a copy of the Engineer-in-Chief's report in relation thereto.

Gouverneur "all that certain water lot, vacant ground and soil under water, to be made land and gained out of the East river, etc.;"

And whereas, Said indenture contained certain terms, obligations and conditions, in relation to said property granted, binding upon the grantees, their heirs and assigns, and imposing penalties for their failure to perform said covenants; now, therefore, be it

Resolved, That H. D. & J. U. Brookman, in who it appears the title of part of said above-mentioned property is now vested, be and are hereby notified, requested and required to repair (within three months from receiving a copy of this resolution), the bulkhead commencing at the middle of Eighteenth street on the easterly line of Avenue C; and thence extending northerly thirty feet to the northerly line of said street. REGULATIONS ESTABLISHING A SCALE OF WATER RENTS AND RULES GOVERNING THE USE OF WATER, FOR THE CITY OF NEW YORK, BY ORDER OF JOHN NEWTON, COMMISSIONER OF PUBLIC WORKS.

UNDER CHAPTER 410, LAWS 1882, SECTIONS 159, LAWS 1887, AS FOLLOWS:

The commissioner of public works shall, from time to time, establish scales of rents for the supplying of water, which rents shall be collected in the manner now provided by law, and which shall be proportioned to different classes of buildings in said city in reference to their dimensions, values, exposure to fires, ordinary uses for dwellings, stores, shops, private stables and other common purposes, number of families or occupants, or consumption of water, as near as may be practicable, and modify, alter, amend and increase such scale from time to time, and extend it to other descriptions of buildings and establishments. All extra charges for water shall be levied and collected from the owners or occupants of all such buildings respectively, which shall be situated upon lots adjoining any street or avenue in said city in which the distributing water-pipes are or may be laid, and from which they can be supplied with water. Said rents, including the extra charges aforesaid, shall become a charge and lien upon the buildings upon which they are respectively imposed, and, if not paid, shall be returned as arrears to the clerk of arrears. Such regular rates, including the extra charges above mentioned, shall be collected from the owners or occupants of all such buildings respectively, which shall be situated upon lots adjoining any street or avenue in said city in which the distributing water-pipes are or may be laid, and from which they can be supplied with water. Said rents, including the extra charges aforesaid, shall become a charge and lien upon the premises upon which they are respectively imposed, and, if not paid, shall be returned as arrears to the clerk of arrears. Such regular rates, including the extra charges above mentioned, shall be collected from the owners or occupants of all such buildings respectively, which shall be situated upon lots adjoining any street or avenue in said city in which the distributing water-pipes are or may be laid, and from which they can be supplied with water. Said rents, including the extra charges aforesaid, shall become a charge and lien upon the premises upon which they are respectively imposed, and, if not paid, shall be returned as arrears to the clerk of arrears.

The regular annual rents to be collected by the Department of Public Works shall be as follows, to wit: Croton Water Rates for Buildings From 16 to 50 feet, all others not specified subject to Special Rates.

The rent of all tenements which shall exceed in width fifty feet shall be the subject of special contract with the Commissioner of Public Works. The apportionment of the regular rents upon dwellings, houses or tenements, in which one family is to occupy the same, and for each additional family, one dollar per year shall be charged. METERS will be placed on all houses where waste of water is found, and they will be charged at rates fixed by the Department for all the water passing through them. The extra and miscellaneous rates shall be as follows to wit: BAKENIES.—For the average daily use of flour, for each barrel, three dollars per annum. BARBER SHOPS shall be charged from five to twenty dollars per annum each in the discretion of the Commissioner of Public Works; an additional charge of five dollars per annum shall be made for each bath tub therein.

BATHING TUBS in private houses, beyond one, shall be charged at three dollars per annum each, and five dollars per annum each in public houses, boarding-houses, and bathing establishments. Combination stationary wash-tubs, having a movable division in the centre and capable of use for bathing, shall be charged the same as bathing tubs.

BUILDING PURPOSES.—For each one thousand bricks laid, or for stone-work—to be measured as brick—ten cents per thousand. For plastering, forty cents per hundred yards.

COWS.—For each and every cow, one dollar per annum. DINING SALOONS shall be charged an annual rate of from fifty to twenty dollars, in the discretion of the Commissioner of Public Works.

FISH STANDS (retail) shall be charged five dollars per annum each. For all stables not metered, the rates shall be as follows:

HORSES, PRIVATE.—For two horses there shall be charged six dollars per annum; and for each additional horse, two dollars.

HORSES, LIVERY.—For each horse up to and not exceeding thirty in number, one dollar and fifty cents per annum; and for each additional horse, one dollar.

HORSES, OMNIBUS AND CART.—For each horse, one dollar per annum.

HORSE TROUGHS.—For each trough, and for each half barrel or tub on sidewalk or street, twenty dollars per annum; each trough is to be fitted with a proper ball-cock to prevent overflow.

HOTELS AND BOARDING HOUSES shall, in addition to the regular rate for private families, be charged for each lodging room, at the discretion of the Commissioner of Public Works.

LAUNDRIES shall be charged from eight to twenty dollars per annum, in the discretion of the Commissioner of Public Works.

LIQUOR AND LAGER BEER SALOONS shall be charged an annual rate of ten dollars each. An additional charge of five dollars per annum shall be made for each wash-basin.

PHOTOGRAPH GALLERIES shall be charged an annual rate of from five to twenty dollars, in the discretion of the Commissioner of Public Works.

PRINTING, when metered, shall be charged at such rates as may be determined by the Commissioner of Public Works.

SODA, MINERAL WATER AND ROOT BEER FOUNTAINS shall be charged five dollars per annum each. STEAM ENGINES, where not metered, shall be charged by the horse-power, as follows: For each horse-power up to and not exceeding ten, the sum of ten dollars per annum; for each exceeding ten, and not over fifty, the sum of seven dollars and fifty cents each; and for each horse-power over fifty, the sum of five dollars.

WATER-CLOSETS AND URINALS.—To each building on a lot, a water-closet having sewer connection is allowed without charge; each additional water-closet or urinal will be charged as hereinafter stated. All closets connected in any manner with sewer shall be charged two dollars for each seat per annum, whether in a building or on an other portion of the premises. Urinals shall be charged two dollars per annum each.

WATER-CLOSET RATES.—For hoppers of any form, when water is supplied direct from the Croton supply, through any form of the so-called single or double valve, stop-cocks, stop-cocks, self-closing cocks, or any valve or cock of any description attached to the closet, each, per year, twenty dollars.

For any pipe close, or any of the forms of valve, plunger, or other water-closet, not before mentioned, supplied with water as above described, per year, ten dollars.

For any form of hopper or water-closet, supplied from the Croton supply, with overflow pipe, with ball-cock, and overflow pipe, so that overflow will run into the hopper or water-closet, when ball-cock is defective, or from which an unlimited amount of water can be drawn, by holding up the handle, per year, each, five dollars.

For any form of hopper or water-closet, supplied from any of the forms of waste-preventing systems, that are approved by the Engineer of the Croton Aqueduct, which are so constructed that not more than three gallons of water can be drawn at each lift of the handle, or depression of the seat, if such systems are provided with an overflow pipe, such overflow pipe must not connect with the water-closet, but be carried like a safe-waste, as provided by the Board of Health regulations, per year, two dollars. Cistern answering this description can be seen at this Department.

METERS.

Under the provisions of section 352, Consolidated Act 1882, water-meters, of approved pattern, shall be hereafter placed on the pipes supplying all stores, workshops, hotels, manufactories, public offices, at wharves, ferry-houses, stables, and in all places where water is furnished for business consumption, except private dwellings.

It is provided by section 352, Laws of 1882, that "all expenses, meters, their connections and setting, water rates, and other lawful charges for the supply of Croton water, shall be a lien upon the premises where such water is supplied, as now provided by law."

All manufacturing and other business requiring a large supply of water will be fitted with a meter. Water measured by meter, ten cents per one hundred cubic feet.

The rate charged for steam-vessels taking water daily or belonging to daily lines, is one-half cent per ton (Custom House measurement) for each time they take water. Steamers taking water other than daily, one cent per ton (Custom House measurement).

Water supplied to sailing vessels and put on board, twenty-five cents per hundred gallons. All matters not hereinbefore embraced are reserved for special contract by and with the Commissioner of Public Works.

HYDRANTS, HOSE, TROUGHS, FOUNTAINS, ETC., ETC.

No owner or tenant will be allowed to supply water to another person or persons.

All persons taking water from the City must keep their own service-pipes, street tap, and all fixtures connected therewith, in good repair, protected from frost, at their own risk and expense, and shall prevent all waste of water.

The use of horse or horse coaches, omnibuses, wagons, railway cars or other vehicles or horses, cannot be permitted. No horse-troughs or horse-watering fixtures will be permitted in the street or on the sidewalk, except upon a license or permit taken out for that purpose. All licenses or permits must be annually renewed on the first of May. Such fixtures must be kept in good order and the water not allowed to drip or waste by overrunning the sidewalk or street, or to become dangerous to the water by freezing in and about such troughs or fixtures.

No hydrant will be permitted on the sidewalk or in the front area, any hydrant standing in a yard or alley, attached to any dwelling or building, must be kept in full running when not in actual use, and if the drip or waste from such hydrant freezes and becomes dangerous in winter, the supply will be shut off in addition to the penalty of five dollars imposed upon the owner. All hydrants at wash-basins, water-closets, baths and urinals must not be left running, under the penalty of five dollars for each offense, which will be strictly enforced.

Fountains or jets in hotels, porter-houses, eating-saloons, confectioneries or other buildings are strictly prohibited. The use of hose for washing sidewalks, stoops, areas, house-fronts, yards, court-yards, gardens, and about stables, is prohibited. When hose is provided, it shall be with well, special permit will be issued for the use of hose, in order that the police or inspectors of this department may understand that the permission is not for the use of Croton water.

Opening fire-hydrants to fill hand sprinklers or other vessels will not be allowed. The penalty for a violation of any of the preceding rules and regulations will be five dollars for each offense, and if not paid when imposed, will be returned in arrears in the same manner as all other charges for unpaid water rates.

PUBLIC NOTICE AS TO WATER RATES.

PUBLIC NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN THAT in compliance with the provisions of chapter 559, Laws of 1887, amending sections 350 and 351 of the New York City Constitution Act of 1882, passed June 15, 1887, the following changes are made in charging and collecting water rents:

1st. All extra charges for water incurred from and after June 9, 1887, shall be returned as arrears to the clerk of arrears in the same manner as regular rents have heretofore been treated.

2d. In every building where a water meter or meters are now, or shall hereafter be in use, the charge for water by meter measurement shall be the only charge against such building, or such part thereof as is supplied through meter.

3d. The returns of arrears of water rents, including the year 1887, shall be made as heretofore on the consolidated list of the tax levy by the Board of Aldermen, and shall include all charges and penalties of every nature.

4th. A penalty of five dollars is hereby established, and will be imposed in each and every case where the rules and regulations of the Department prohibiting the use of water through hose, or in any other wasteful manner, are violated, and such penalties will be entered on the books of the Bureau against the respective buildings or premises, and, if not paid when incurred, will be returned in arrears as other charges for water.

5th. Changes for so-called extra water rents of every nature, imposed or incurred prior to June 9, 1887, will be canceled of record on the books of the Department.

NOTICE TO CROTON WATER CONSUMERS.

NUMEROUS APPLICATIONS HAVE BEEN made to this Department by citizens claiming reductions or rebates on bills for water supplied through meters, on the alleged ground of leakage caused by defective plumbing and worn-out service pipes, or by willful waste of water by tenants allowing the faucets to be turned on in full force in water-closets, sinks, etc., without the knowledge or consent of the owners of the premises.

The main object of the use of water-meters is to enable this Department to detect and check the useless and unwarrantable waste of water, and to secure a fair return to the health and comfort of all the citizens, and this object can only be accomplished by enforcing payment for the water wasted. Under the law all charges for water supplied through meters are a lien against the respective premises, and the law therefore holds the owner of the premises responsible for the amount of water used or wasted.

Notice is therefore given to all householders that, in all further applications for reduction in water rents, no allowance will be made on account of waste of water occurring through leaks, from defective service pipes or plumbing, or wasteful use of water by tenants or occupants of buildings, through such leakage or waste may have occurred, without the knowledge or consent of the owners of the buildings.

House-owners are further notified that whenever their premises become vacant, and are likely to remain vacant, they must notify this Department in writing, and that, unless this requirement is complied with no deductions in extra water rents will be allowed for any portion of one year.
