



Resolved, That Gerard avenue, from One Hundred and Thirty-eighth to One Hundred and Fiftieth street, be regulated and graded, the curb-stones set and sidewalks flagged a space four feet wide through the centre thereof, under the direction of the Commissioners of the Department of Public Parks; and that the accompanying ordinance therefor be adopted.

AN ORDINANCE to amend an ordinance entitled "An ordinance to amend article XXXV. of chapter 8 of the Revised Ordinances of 1880, relating to the removal of snow and ice," approved May 16, 1882.

The Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of the City of New York do ordain as follows: Section 1. Section 1 of the above-entitled ordinance, amending section 317 of article XXXV. of chapter 8 of the Revised Ordinances of 1880, is hereby amended by adding at the end of said section 317, as then amended, the following: "The provisions of this section shall not apply to streets or avenues in the 12th, 23d and 24th Wards which have not been curbed, guttered or flagged, nor to streets and avenues not opened according to law, and the title thereto vested in the Corporation of the City of New York," so that said section, when so amended, shall read as follows: "Section 317. Every owner, lessee, tenant, occupant or person having charge of any building or lot of ground in the City of New York shall, within eight hours after the fall of any snow, and within eight hours after the forming of any ice on the sidewalk, or in the gutter in front of any such building or lot, remove, or cause the same to be removed from such sidewalk or gutter, under the penalty of three dollars for every such neglect, to be paid by the said owner, lessee, tenant, occupant or person having charge, severally and respectively; but where said snow falls or ice forms between the hours of eight o'clock in the evening and five o'clock in the morning, this ordinance will be complied with by removing, or causing the same to be removed, before nine o'clock of the morning succeeding its fall or formation. The provisions of this section shall not apply to streets or avenues in the 12th, 23d and 24th Wards which have not been curbed, guttered and flagged, nor to streets and avenues not opened according to law, and the title thereto vested in the Corporation of the City of New York."

Sec. 2. All ordinances or parts of ordinances inconsistent or conflicting with the provisions of this ordinance are hereby repealed.

Sec. 3. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

DEPARTMENT OF DOCKS.

At a meeting of the Board of Docks, held June 28, 1888. Present—Commissioners Stark, Matthews and Post.

The minutes of the meetings held June 21, 22 and 26, 1888, were read and approved. The communication from Hon. Theo. W. Myers, Comptroller, enclosing copy of resolution adopted by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund on the 25th of June, 1888, respecting the permit granted to the Staten Island Rapid Transit Railroad Company to make certain alterations to the ferry wharf structures at the foot of Whitehall street, East river, was,

On motion, laid on the table. The communications from the Engineer-in-Chief reporting that he had directed that Laborers and Acting Watchmen Thomas Kelly and Patrick Cash be not again assigned to duty as Acting Watchmen, and recommending that his action be approved, were,

On motion, referred to Executive Session. The following communications were received, read and, On motion, ordered to be placed on file, action being taken where necessary, as stated, to wit: From Hon. Abram S. Hewitt, Mayor—Transmitting complaint respecting obstructions on the bulkhead between Leroy and Clarkson streets, North river. Referred to the Dock Master to examine and report.

From Counsel to the Corporation: 1st. Transmitting copies of a lease to C. P. Huntington of the bulkhead extending from a point midway between Piers, new 36 and 37, to a point midway between Piers, new 37 and 38, North river. 2d. Approving form of contract for dredging at Pier 61 and at the bulkhead adjoining the north side of Pier 61, East river.

From Department of Street Cleaning: 1st. Requesting repairs to string piece outside of dump at the foot of Jackson street, East river, The action of the President in directing the Engineer-in-Chief to examine and repair, if necessary, was approved. 2d. Requesting removal of old dock plank lying on West street, about one hundred feet north of Franklin street, North river. Referred to the Engineer-in-Chief to examine and report.

From Department of Public Works: 1st. Respecting obstructions at the foot of Fiftieth street, North river. Referred to the Engineer-in-Chief to examine and report. 2d. In reference to building an outlet sewer in Ninety-fifth street, from First avenue to the bulkhead-line on the East river. The Engineer-in-Chief authorized to confer with the Engineer in Charge of Sewers, as requested.

From Joseph Gordon—Enclosing petition of the business men of the Twenty-first Ward for increased wharfage facilities at Thirty-seventh or Thirty-eighth streets, East river. The Secretary directed to advise that the Engineer-in-Chief has been directed to build a new Pier foot of Thirty-eighth street, East river, and a platform one hundred feet south of said street.

From Morris & Cumings Dredging Company—Notice of lien against Duncan A. Gillies, contractor for building bulkhead at One Hundred and Fifty-eighth street, North river, amounting to \$5,835 for dredging thereat. The Secretary directed to file the same with the contract and notify Duncan A. Gillies, contractor, and John Gillies and Joseph Cumings, sureties.

From James D. Leary—Requesting permission to drive piles for Young Men's Christian Association at boat-houses on the easterly side of the Harlem river, about one hundred and forty feet north of One Hundred and Fiftieth street. The action of Commissioner Matthews in issuing a permit under the usual conditions was approved.

From James E. Ward & Co.—Requesting permission to build a platform on piles, between Piers 16 and 17, East river. Referred to the Engineer-in-Chief to examine and report.

From Old Colony Steamboat Company—Requesting permission to repair Pier 39, East river. The action of the President in granting a permit under the usual conditions was approved.

From Michael J. Flynn—Requesting permission to locate a float foot of Eighty-third street North river. The action of the President in directing the Engineer-in-Chief to examine and report was approved.

From Jordan L. Mott—Requesting permit to repair pile platform between One Hundred and Thirty-fourth and One Hundred and Thirty-fifth streets, Mott Haven canal. The action of the President in issuing a permit under the usual conditions was approved.

From James Reilly—Requesting permission to make an opening in front of Nos. 229 and 230 West street, for the purpose of cleaning sewer pipe discharging between Piers, new 25 and 26, North river. The action of the President in issuing a permit under the usual conditions was approved.

From John A. Bouker—Agreeing to the terms and conditions of resolution adopted June 14, 1888, for the erection of a crib-work dump between Seventy-first and Seventy-second streets, East river.

From Joseph B. Erwin, Dock Master—Reporting holes in Piers at Forty-sixth and Fifty-fifth streets, North river. The action of the President in directing the Engineer-in-Chief to repair, where necessary, was approved.

From Edward Abeel, Dock Master: 1st. Reporting that the upper side of Pier 18 and Pier, new 32, East river, require cleaning. The action of the President in requesting the Department of Street Cleaning to clean, was approved. 2d. Reporting repairs required to Pier, new 32, East river. The action of the President in directing the Engineer-in-Chief to examine and repair, if necessary, was approved.

From Charles Hutchinson, Dock Master: 1st. Reporting repairs required to deck of Pier foot of Twenty-eighth street, East river. The action of the President in directing the Engineer-in-Chief to examine and repair, if necessary, was approved. 2d. Reporting that the bulkhead foot of East Forty-fourth street is affected by condition of the sewer discharged thereat.

The action of the President in directing the Engineer-in-Chief to examine and report, was approved. From Engineer-in-Chief: 1st. Reporting assignment of employees to special duty. 2d. Reporting the amount of work done during the week ending June 23, 1888. 3d. Respecting the electric light street-lighting pole in front of the entrance to approach to Pier, new 29, East river, and recommending that the U. S. Illuminating Company be requested to remove the pole about twelve feet westerly.

On motion, his recommendation was adopted. 4th. Reporting repairs required to bulkhead south of Pier, old 23, North river, and recommending that the premises be fenced off from public use if not repaired at once. The Secretary directed to notify the New York Steam Company, lessees, to show cause on Thursday, July 5, 1888, at 12 o'clock noon, why said repairs have not been made.

5th. Report on Secretary's Order No. 7963, in reference to the application of the Central Railroad Company of New Jersey, for permission to alter shed on Pier 8, North river. On motion, permit was granted, the said work to be done under the direction and supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief of this Department, and in accordance with the plans submitted.

6th. Report on Secretary's Order No. 7950, respecting the claim of Joseph V. Brown, in relation to the repairs ordered to Pier at Twenty-fifth street, East river. The action of the President in notifying Mr. Brown that the repairs heretofore ordered consist of the sheathing on inner end of deck of pier, and should be repaired by him as lessee, was approved.

10th. Report on Secretary's Order No. 7989, in reference to the application of Ranald Gillies, for an extension of time to June 16, 1888, to complete the work of building Pier, new 62, North river, under Contract No. 256. Referred to Commissioners Post and Matthews.

11th. Report on Secretary's Order No. 7941, repairs required to Pier 55, East river, and recommending that the lessee, Thomas O'Brien, be notified to repair in accordance with the terms of his lease. On motion, recommendation was adopted.

12th. Report on Secretary's Order No. 7783, that he had directed and superintended repairing brick stable at One Hundred and Twenty-second street, Harlem river. 13th. Report on Secretary's Order No. 7862, that he had repaired damage done to side-cap and deck-plank, Pier, old 42, North river.

14th. Report on Secretary's Order No. 7885, that he had refastened chocks between fenders on the lower outer corner of Pier, new 32, East river. 15th. Report on Secretary's Order No. 7920, that he had removed fence erected foot of Thirty-eighth street, East river.

16th. Report on Secretary's Order No. 7945, that he had removed platform derrick located on bulkhead between Piers 47 and 48, East river. 17th. Report on Secretary's Order No. 7970, that he had repaired bulkhead foot of Eighteenth street, East river.

18th. Report on Secretary's Order No. 7740, that he had repaired Pier 44, East river. 19th. Report on Secretary's Order No. 7972, that he had repaired Pier, new 59, North river.

20th. Report on Secretary's Order No. 7973, that he had refastened bearing pile on south side of Pier south of Eighty-sixth street, East river. The report of Joseph B. Erwin, Dock Master, that the scow "Sea Beach," owned by P. Ciancimino, had discharged cargo of sand at Pier foot of Forty-sixth street, North river, was,

On motion, referred to Commissioner Matthews. On motion, the subject matter respecting the payment of the amount due by the Fort Lee Ferry Company, lessee, was postponed to July 14, 1888.

Commissioner Matthews, to whom was referred the application of Daniel Delaney for permission to locate a small structure between Ninetieth and Ninety-fifth streets, North river, offered the following resolution, which was adopted:

Resolved, That permission be and hereby is granted to Daniel Delaney to place a bath-house (about twenty-five by fifty feet) between Ninety-second and Ninety-third streets, on the North river, provided he pay as compensation the sum of \$10 per month, payable at the end of each month to the Dock Master of the District, commencing July 1, 1888, the said bath-house to be and remain during the will of the Board, and to be placed thereat under the direction of the Engineer-in-Chief of this Department.

The following resolution was, On motion, adopted: Resolved, That the Engineer-in-Chief be and hereby is directed to prepare plans, specifications and form of contract for building bulkhead and Pier foot of East Thirty-eighth street, East river, and for building a bulkhead-platform about one hundred feet south of said street.

The Treasurer, Commissioner Matthews, reported that he had received the following estimates for furnishing the Department with 1,000 barrels of Portland cement:

Resolved, That section 13 of the Sanitary Code be and is hereby amended so as to read as follows: "That if any part thereof shall be used as a place in which, or for any one, to dwell or lodge, except when said building or such parts thereof are sufficiently lighted, ventilated, provided and accommodated, and are in all respects in that condition of cleanliness and wholesomeness, for which this Code or any law of this State provides, or in which they or either of them require any such premises to be kept. Nor shall any such person rent, hire out, or allow, having power to prevent the same to be used as or for a place of sleeping or residence, any portion or apartment of any building, which apartment or such part thereof shall be less than one foot of its width and space above the level of every part of the sidewalk

and curbstone of any adjacent street, nor of which the floor is damp by reason of water from the ground, or which is impregnated or penetrated by any offensive gas, smell, or exhalation prejudicial to health. But this section shall not prevent the leasing, renting, or occupancy of cellars or rooms less elevated than aforesaid, and as a part of any building rented or let, when they are not let or intended to be occupied or used by any person as a sleeping apartment, or as a principal or sole dwelling apartment."

FOR SETTING CURB-STONES AND FLAGGING SIDEWALKS ON EAST SIDE OF SYLVAN PLACE, between One Hundred and Twentieth and One Hundred and Twenty-first streets, and NORTH SIDE OF ONE HUNDRED AND TWENTIETH STREET AND SOUTH SIDE OF ONE HUNDRED AND TWENTY-FIRST STREET, between Third avenue and Sylvan place.

- No. 4. FOR REGULATING AND GRADING ONE HUNDRED AND FORTY-FIRST STREET, from Hamilton place to the Boulevard, and SETTING CURB-STONES AND FLAGGING SIDEWALKS THEREIN.

Each estimate must contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, the names of all persons interested with him therein, and if no other person be interested, it shall be so stated. That it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same work, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud. That no member of the Common Council, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of the Corporation, is directly or indirectly interested in the estimate or in the work to which it relates or in the profits thereon.

Each estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party making the same, that the several matters therein stated are true, and must be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in the City of New York, to the effect that if the contract is awarded to the person making the estimate, they will, upon its being so awarded, become bound as his sureties for its faithful performance; and that if he shall refuse or neglect to execute the same, they will pay to the Corporation any difference between the sum to which he would be entitled upon its completion, and that which the Corporation may be obliged to pay to the person to whom the contract shall be awarded at any subsequent letting; the amount to be calculated upon the estimated amount of the work by which the bids are tested.

The consent last above mentioned must be accompanied by the oath or affirmation, in writing, of each of the persons signing the same, that he is a householder or freeholder in the City of New York, and is worth the amount of the security required for the completion of the contract, over and above all his debts of every nature, and over and above his liabilities as bail, surety, or otherwise, and that he has offered himself as surety in good faith, with the intention to execute the bond required by law.

No estimate will be considered unless accompanied by either a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of the City of New York, or drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money to the amount of five per centum of the amount of the security required for the faithful performance of the contract. Such check or money must not be inclosed in the sealed envelope containing the estimate, but must be handed to the officer or clerk of the Department who has charge of the Estimate-box, and no estimate can be deposited in said box until such check or money has been examined by said officer or clerk and found to be correct. All such deposits, except that of the successful bidder, will be returned to the persons making the same, within three days after the contract is awarded. If the successful bidder shall refuse or neglect, within five days after notice that the contract has been awarded to him, to execute the same, the amount of the deposit made by him shall be forfeited to and retained by the City of New York as liquidated damages for such neglect or refusal; but if he shall execute the contract within the time aforesaid, the amount of his deposit will be returned to him.

THE COMMISSIONER OF PUBLIC WORKS RESERVES THE RIGHT TO REJECT ALL BIDS RECEIVED FOR ANY PARTICULAR WORK IF HE DEEMS IT FOR THE BEST INTERESTS OF THE CITY.

JOHN NEWTON, Commissioner of Public Works. REGULATIONS ESTABLISHING A SCALE OF WATER RENTS AND RULES GOVERNING THE USE OF WATER, FOR THE CITY OF NEW YORK, BY ORDER OF JOHN NEWTON, COMMISSIONER OF PUBLIC WORKS.

UNDER CHAPTER 410, LAWS 1882, SECTIONS 359, 351, 352 and 353, and as amended by chapter 559, Laws of 1887, as follows:

The Commissioner of public works shall, from time to time, establish scales of rents for the supplying of water, which rents shall be collected in the manner now provided by law, and which shall be apportioned to different classes of buildings, in reference to their dimensions, values, exposure to fires, ordinary uses for dwellings, stores, shops, private stables and other common purposes, number of families or occupants, or consumption of water, as near as may be practicable, and modify, alter, amend and increase such scale from time to time, and extend it to other descriptions of buildings and establishments. All extra charges for water shall be deemed to be included in the regular rents, and shall become a charge and lien upon the buildings, in which they are respectively imposed, and, if not paid, shall be returned as arrears to the clerk of arrears. Such regular rents, including the extra charges above mentioned, shall be collected from the owners or occupants of all such buildings respectively, which shall be situated upon lots adjoining any street or avenue in said city in which the distributing water-pipes are or may be laid, and from which they can be supplied with water. Said rents, including the extra charges above mentioned, shall become a charge and lien upon such houses and lots, respectively, as herein provided, but no charge whatever shall be made against any building in which a water-meter has been, or shall be placed or provided in its act. In all such cases the charge for water shall be determined only by the quantity of water actually used as shown by said meters. * * * * *

The said commissioner of public works is hereby authorized to prescribe a penalty, exceeding the sum of five dollars for each offense, for permitting water to be wasted, and for any violation of such reasonable rules as he may, from time to time, prescribe for the prevention of the waste of water; such fines shall be added to the regular water rents.

The regular annual rents to be collected by the Department of Public Works shall be as follows, to wit:

Croton Water Rates for Buildings from 10 to 50 feet, all others not specified subject to Special Rates.

Table with columns: FRONT WIDTH, 1 Story, 2 Stories, 3 Stories, 4 Stories, 5 Stories. Rows: 16 feet and under, 16 to 18 feet, 18 to 20 feet, 20 to 22 feet, 22 to 24 feet, 24 to 26 feet, 26 to 28 feet, 28 to 30 feet, 30 to 32 feet, 32 to 34 feet, 34 to 36 feet, 36 to 38 feet, 38 to 40 feet, 40 to 42 feet, 42 to 44 feet, 44 to 46 feet, 46 to 48 feet, 48 to 50 feet.

The rent of all tenements which shall exceed in width fifty feet shall be the subject of special contract with the Commissioner of Public Works.

The apportionment of the regular rents upon dwellings, houses are on the basis that but one family is to occupy the same, and for each additional family, one dollar per year shall be charged.

METERS will be placed on all houses where waste of water is found, and they will be charged at rates fixed by the Department for all the water passing through them.

The extra and miscellaneous rates shall be as follows to wit:

BAKERIES.—For the average daily use of flour, for each barrel, three dollars per annum.

BARBER SHOPS shall be charged from five to twenty dollars per annum each in the discretion of the Commissioner of Public Works; an additional charge of five cents per annum shall be made for each bath tub therein.

BATHING TUBS in private houses, beyond one, shall be charged at three dollars per annum each, and five dollars per annum each in public houses, boarding-houses, and bathing establishments. Combination stationary wash-tubs, having a movable division in the centre and capable of use for bathing, shall be charged the same as bathing tubs.

BUILDING PURPOSES.—For each one thousand bricks laid, for stone-work, or for masonry, a cent; for brick-work, one cent; for plastering, forty cents per hundred yards.

COWS.—For each and every cow, one dollar per annum. DINING SALOONS shall be charged an annual rate of from five to twenty dollars, in the discretion of the Commissioner of Public Works.

FISH STANDS (retail) shall be charged five dollars per annum each. For all stands not metered, the rates shall be as follows:

HORSES, PRIVATE.—For two horses there shall be charged six dollars per annum; and for each additional horse, two dollars.

HORSES, LIVERY.—For each horse up to and not exceeding thirty in number, one dollar and fifty cents each per annum; and for each additional horse, one dollar and fifty cents each per annum.

HORSES, OMNIBUS AND CART.—For each horse, one dollar per annum.

HORSE TROUGHS.—For each trough, and for each half barrel or tub on sidewalk or street, twenty dollars per annum; each trough is to be fitted with a proper ball-cock to prevent waste.

HOTELS AND BOARDING HOUSES shall, in addition to the regular rates for private families, be charged for each lodging room, at the discretion of the Commissioner of Public Works.

LAUNDRIES shall be charged from eight to twenty dollars per annum, in the discretion of the Commissioner of Public Works.

LIQUOR AND LAGER BEER SALOONS shall be charged an annual rate of ten dollars each. An additional charge of five dollars per annum shall be made for each tap or wash-bowl.

PHOTOGRAPH GALLERIES shall be charged an annual rate of from five to twenty dollars, in the discretion of the Commissioner of Public Works.

PRINTING OFFICES, when not metered, shall be charged at such rates as may be determined by the Commissioner of Public Works.

SODA, MINERAL WATER and ROOT BEER FOUNTAINS shall be charged five dollars per annum each.

STEAM ENGINES, where not metered, shall be charged by the horse-power, as follows: For each horse-power up to and not exceeding ten, the sum of ten dollars per annum; for each exceeding ten, and not over fifteen, the sum of seven dollars and fifty cents each; and for each horse-power over fifteen, the sum of five dollars.

WATER-CLOSETS AND URINALS.—To each building on a lot one water-closet having sewer connection is allowed without charge; each additional water-closet or urinal will be charged as hereinafter stated. All closets connected in any manner with sewer shall be charged two dollars for each seat per annum, whether in a building or on any other portion of the premises.

WATER-CLOSET RATES.—For hoppers of any form, when water is supplied direct from the Croton supply, through any form of the so-called single or double valves, hopper-cocks, stop-cocks, self-closing cocks, or ball or cock of any description attached to the closet, each, per year, twenty dollars.

For any pan closet, or any of the forms of valve, plunger, or other water-closet not before mentioned, supplied with water as above described, per year, ten dollars.

For any form of hopper or water-closet, supplied from the ordinary style of cistern filled with ball-cock, and overflow pipe, that communicates with the pipe to the water-closet, so that overflow will run into the hopper or water-closet, when ball-cock is defective, or from which an unlimited amount of water can be drawn by holding up the handle, per year, each, five dollars.

For any form of hopper or water-closet, supplied from any of the forms of waste-preventing cisterns, that are approved by the Engineer of the Croton Aqueduct, which are so constructed that not more than three gallons of water can be drawn at each lift of the handle, or depression of the seat, if such cisterns are provided with an overflow pipe, such overflow pipe must not connect with the water-closet, but be carried like a safe-water, as provided by the Board of Health regulations, per year, two dollars.

Cistern answering this description can be seen at this Department.

METERS. Under the provisions of section 352, Consolidated Act 1882, water-meters, of approved pattern, shall be hereafter placed on the pipes supplying all stores, workshops, hotels, manufactories, public edifices, at warehouses, ferry-houses, stables, and in all places where water is furnished for business consumption, except private dwellings.

It is provided by section 352, Laws of 1882, that "all expenses of meters, their connections and setting, water rates, and other lawful charges for the supply of Croton water, shall be a lien upon the premises where such water is supplied, as now provided by law." * * *

All manufacturing and other business requiring a large supply of water will be fitted with a meter.

Water meter, by meter, ten cents per one hundred cubic feet.

Rate Without Meters. Table with columns: PER DAY, GALLONS, PER 100 GALLONS, RATE, PER ANNUM, AMOUNT.

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HYDRANTS, HOSE, TROUGHS, FOUNTAINS, ETC., ETC. No owner or tenant will be allowed to supply water to another person or persons. All persons taking water from the City must keep their own service-pipes, street tap, and all fixtures connected therewith, in good repair, protected from frost, at their own risk and expense, and shall prevent all waste of water.

The use of hose to wash coaches, omnibuses, wagons, railway cars or other vehicles or horses, cannot be permitted.

No horse-troughs or horse-watering fixtures will be permitted in the street or on the sidewalk, except upon a license or permit taken out for that purpose. All licenses or permits must be annually renewed on the first of May. Such fixtures must be kept in good order and the water not allowed to drip or waste by overrunning the sidewalk or street, or to become dangerous in winter by freezing in and about such troughs or fixtures.

No hydrant will be permitted on the sidewalk or in the front area, and any hydrant standing in a yard or alley, attached to any dwelling or building, must not be left running when not in actual use, and if the drip or waste from such hydrant freezes and becomes dangerous in winter, the supply will be shut off in addition to the penalty of five dollars imposed.

Taps at wash-basins, water-closets, baths and urinals must not be left running under the penalty of five dollars for each offense, which will be strictly enforced.

Fountains or jets in hotels, porter-houses, eating-saloons, confectioneries or other buildings are strictly prohibited.

The use of hose for washing sidewalks, stoops, areas, house-fronts, yards, court-yards, gardens, and about stables, is prohibited. Where premises are provided with wells, special permits will be issued for the use of hose in order that the police or inspectors of this department may understand that the permission is not for the use of Croton water.

Opening fire-hydrants to fill hand sprinklers or other vessels will not be allowed under the penalty of five dollars.

The penalty for a violation of any of the preceding rules and regulations will be five dollars for each offense, and if not paid when imposed will become a lien on the premises in like manner as all other charges for unpaid water rates.

PUBLIC NOTICE AS TO WATER RATES.

PUBLIC NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN THAT in compliance with the provisions of chapter 559, Laws of 1887, amending sections 350 and 321 of the New York City Consolidation Act of 1882, passed June 9, 1887 the following changes are made in charging and collecting water rents:

1st. All extra charges for water incurred from and after June 9, 1887, shall be treated, collected and returned in arrears in the same manner as regular rents have heretofore been treated.

2d. In every building where a water meter or meters are now, or shall hereafter be in use, the charge for water by meter measurement shall be the only charge against such building, or such part thereof as is supplied through meter.

3d. The returns of arrears of water rents, including the year 1887, shall be made as heretofore on the confirmation of the tax levy by the Board of Aldermen, and shall include all charges and penalties of every nature.

4th. A penalty of five dollars (\$5) is hereby established, and will be imposed in each and every case where the rules and regulations of the Department prohibiting the use of water through hose, or in any other wasteful manner, are violated, and such penalties will be entered on the books of the Bureau against the respective buildings or property, and, if not collected, be returned in arrears in like manner as other charges for water.

5th. Charges for so-called extra water rents of every nature, imposed or incurred prior to June 9, 1887, will be canceled of record on the books of the Department.

NOTICE TO CROTON WATER CONSUMERS.

NUMEROUS APPLICATIONS HAVE BEEN made to this Department by citizens claiming reductions or rebates on bills for water supplied through meters, on the alleged ground that the same were caused by defective plumbing and worn-out service pipes, or by willful waste of water by tenants allowing the faucets to be turned on in full force in water-closets, sinks, etc., without the knowledge or consent of the owners of the premises.

The main object of the use of water-meters is to enable this Department to detect and check the useless and unwarrantable waste of an element so valuable and essential to the health and comfort of all the citizens, and the object can only be accomplished by enforcing payment for the water wasted.

Under the law all charges for water supplied through meters are a lien against the respective premises, and the law therefore holds the owner of the premises responsible for the amount of water used or wasted.

Notice is therefore given to all householders that, in all their applications for reduction of water rents, an allowance will be made on account of water consumed through leaks, from defective service pipes or plumbing, or wasteful use of water by tenants or occupants of buildings, though such leakage or waste may have occurred without the knowledge or consent of the owners of the buildings.

House-owners are further notified that whenever their premises become vacant, and are likely to remain vacant, they must notify this Department in writing, and that unless this requirement is complied with no reductions in extra water rents will be allowed for any portion of one year.
