DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC PARKS.

Abstract of Proceedings for the Week ending July 7, 1888.

FRIDAY, JULY 6, 1888—ADJOURNED MEETING—II A. M.

Present—Commissioners Robb (President), Borden and Hutchins.  
 The following communications were received:  
 From the Council to the Corporation—Advised the Department relative to the preparation of Assessment Lists for public improvements. Filed.  
 From O'Brien & Clark, contractors, asking permission to lay a track along the Park sidewalk of Eighth avenue, between One Hundred and Sixth and One Hundred and Ninth streets, and across the avenue, for the purpose of removing material excavated by them in laying Aqueduct pipes. Referred to the Superintendent of Parks for report.  
 From J. J. Agnew, recommending that Park Policemen be allowed to wear their badges at all hours. Filed.  
 From Stephen O. Jennings, asking permission to lay a sample of artificial stone pavement in one of the parks. Referred to the Superintendent of Parks for report.  
 From the Engineer of Construction, submitting specifications and form of contract for the renewal of the flooring of the Third Avenue Bridge. Approved.

From the Landscape Architect and Superintendent of Parks, submitting a plan for an entrance for pedestrians to Central Park, between Sixty-third and Sixty-fourth streets. On motion, said plan was approved.

From the Secretary of the Civil Service Examining Board, submitting a list of persons eligible for appointment as Rodmen. Filed.

From the Engineer of Construction in charge of Streets and Sewers in the Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards:

1st. Recommending the appointment of two Rodmen. On motion, E. H. Cooper and E. F. Austin were employed as Rodmen at \$900 per annum each. 2d. Recommending that the usual summer vacation of two weeks be granted to the employees under him. Granted.

3d. Forwarding applications of C. H. Graham, Assistant, and L. W. Spencer, Rodman, for advance in grade and pay, and of E. Bleyer, Assistant, for an increase of pay.

On motion, said applications were referred to the President, with power. From the Engineer of Construction, recommending an increase of pay for employees under him. On motion, the matter was referred to the President, with power.

From the Topographical Engineer recommending the employment of Henry C. Litchfield, for duty under him.

On motion, Henry C. Litchfield was appointed a Skilled Laborer, for duty under the Topographical Engineer, at \$90 per month.

From Frederick Greiffenberg, Assistant Engineer, applying for leave of absence for two months.

On motion, said application was denied. From the Superintendent of Parks, recommending the employment of a person to act as Watchman in the vicinity of the green-houses.

On motion, George J. Rogers was appointed a Laborer for duty under the Superintendent of Parks, at \$60 per month.

The Board then proceeded to consider the evidence taken in the trials of Park Policemen. John V. Taylor—Charged with conduct unbecoming an officer and violation of rules, was found guilty of the charge of conduct unbecoming an officer, and fined five days' pay.

James Livingston—Charged with violation of rules and conduct unbecoming an officer. On motion, charged dismissed.

The President reported that he had made the following appointments: H. H. Derr, Chairman, for thirty days.

John Igglesden, Laborer, in the Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards, for thirty days. Charles Wheyman, Laborer, in the Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards, for thirty days.

Edward Lynch, Gardener. William Boettger, Gardener.

On motion, the action of the President was approved. The employment of Watchmen on the Police Force was discontinued and the grade abolished.

The matter of a proposed Police sub-station at Washington square was referred to the President, with power.

Stephen Frahm was employed as a Park Policeman on probation. On motion, the Secretary was directed to request the opinion of the Counsel to the Corporation as to the duties of property owners in the Annexed District to cut and remove weeds from streets and roads in front of their respective properties, and as to the powers and duties of the Department in such matters.

Contracts for which proposals were opened on 2d instant was awarded as follows:

For the erection of blue stone steps and foundation walls for same in Morningside Park, to Michael McGrath, at \$14,000.

For constructing Park vertical wall on southerly side of One Hundred and Tenth street, to Michael McGrath, at \$31,232.

For erection of retaining walls in Transverse road No. 2, to Thomas Hayden, at \$3,465.75.

For furnishing and laying floor tiling required in the enlargement of the Metropolitan Museum of Art, to Herter Brothers, at \$10,450.

For furnishing, etc., all carpenter, joiner, cabinet and furniture work, etc., in the enlargement of the Metropolitan Museum of Art, to Maguire & Sloan, at \$18,921.

For setting curb stones, repairing and resurfacing the roadway, etc., of Seventy-second street, from Eighth to Tenth avenues, to Terence A. Smith, at \$9,036.50.

All the proposals received on the 2d instant for constructing receiving-basins and inlets for drainage in Morningside Park and for furnishing and erecting elevator required for the enlargement of the Metropolitan Museum of Art, were rejected.

The Secretary was directed to advertise for proposals for constructing receiving-basins and inlets in Morningside Park, and for furnishing and erecting an elevator for the enlargement of the Metropolitan Museum of Art.

Abstract of Proceedings for the Week ending July 14, 1888.

WEDNESDAY, JULY 11, 1888—STATED MEETING—II A. M.

Present—Commissioner Robb (President), Borden, Hutchins and Towle.

The subject of the proposed change of classification of Decatur avenue, from Brookline street to Middlebrook Parkway, was then taken up for consideration.

An affidavit of the Clerk of the CITY RECORD, stating that the proposed changes had been duly advertised as required by law, was received and placed on file.

There being no objection, a map showing the change of classification was adopted and ordered filed.

The subject of the proposed change of street system in that part of the Kingsbridge district in the Twenty-fourth Ward, bounded on the north by Van Courtland Park, on the east by Sedgwick avenue, on the south by Emmerich place and Heath avenue, and on the west by the Harlem River and Broadway, was then taken up for consideration.

An affidavit of the Clerk of the CITY RECORD, stating that notices of the proposed change had been duly published as required by law, was received and placed on file.

Messrs. John Parsons, Walter W. Wallace, George H. Stephens and William H. Mead, appeared, and were heard in opposition to the proposed change.

Messrs. Fordham Morris, Edward Lucas and M. Butzel, were heard in favor thereof. The President then declared the hearing closed.

The subject of proposed changes in the street system in that part of the Central District bounded on the north by the Southern Boulevard, on the east by Webster avenue, on the south by Travers street, and on the west by Jerome avenue, was taken up for consideration.

An affidavit of the Clerk of the CITY RECORD, stating that the proposed changes had been duly advertised, as required by law, was received and placed on file.

Mr. Jackson, representing the Twenty-fourth Ward Real Estate Association, appeared, and was heard in favor of the proposed change.

On motion, the matter was referred to Commissioner Towle for report.

AT A MEETING OF THE BOARD OF HEALTH of the Health Department of the City of New York, held at its office, No. 307 Mott street, January 27, 1888, the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That section 13 of the Sanitary Code be and is hereby amended so as to read as follows:

SEC. 13. That no owner or lessee of any building, or any part thereof, shall lease or let, or hire out the same or any portion thereof, to be occupied by any person, or allow the same to be occupied, as a place in which, or for any one, to dwell or lodge, except when said building or such parts thereof are sufficiently lighted, ventilated, provided and accommodated, and are in all respects in that condition of cleanliness and wholesomeness, for which this Code or any law of this State provides, or in which they or either of them require any such premises to be kept. Nor shall any such person rent, let, hire out, or allow, having power to do so, the same to be used as or for a place of sleeping or residence, any portion or apartment of any building, which apartment or portion has not at least one foot of its height and space above the ceiling, or any window, door, sill and curbstone of any adjacent street, nor of which the floor is damp by reason of water from the ground, or which is impregnated or penetrated by any offensive gas, smell, or exhalation prejudicial to health. But this section shall not apply to leasing, renting, or occupancy of cellars or rooms less elevated than aforesaid, and as a part of any building rented or let, when they are not let or intended to be occupied or used by any person as a sleeping apartment, or as a principal or sole dwelling apartment.

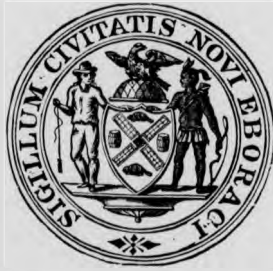
