The communication from the Pennsylvania Railroad Company, requesting a modification of the resolution adopted June 6, 1889, authorizing them to build a bulkhead-wall and fill-in between Thirty-seventh and Thirty-eighth streets, North river, and also requesting permission to place a float-bridge and rack thereat, was,

On motion, laid on the table.

The communication from the Engineer-in-Chief reporting non-commencement of dredging on the North, East and Harlem rivers, and his report on Secretary's Order No. 9276, in relation to dredging between Piers 4 and 5, East river, was,

On motion, laid on the table until the next regular meeting.

The following communications were received, read, and,

On motion, ordered to be placed on file, action being taken where necessary, as stated, to wit: From Counsel to the Corporation—Approving form of Contract No. 359, for repairing bulkhead between Piers, old 36 and new 29, East river, and No. 312, for building a new pier foot of Twenty-eighth street, East river.

From Hon. J. S. Coleman, Commissioner of Street Cleaning—In relation to the payment of the proportionate cost of building a new dumping-board on the Piers foot of East Thirty-eighth street and West Forty-seventh street, and stating that he will make the proper application to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for such transfer at the earliest opportunity.

From Department of Public Charities and Correction—Requesting repairs to deck of Pier foot Twenty-sixth street, East river. The action of the President in directing the Engineer-in-Chief to examine and report was approved.

From A. T. Decker & Company—Stating that the repairs ordered will be made to the Pier foot of Bethune street, North river.

From New York Central and Hudson River Railroad Company—Stating that repairs ordered will be made to the bulkhead south of Pier, old 34, North river and between One Hundred and Thirtieth and One Hundred and Thirty-first streets, North river.

From E. M. Van Tassel & Company—Requesting permission to pave a small piece of the bulkhead foot of West Eleventh street. The action of the President in issuing a permit, the work to be done under the direction and supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief, was approved.

From Baltimore and Ohio Railroad Company—Requesting permission to place a bonnet over door on bulkhead nearest Pier, old 21, North river. The action of the President in issuing a permit, the work to be done under the direction and supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief and remain during the pleasure of the Board, was approved.

From J. J. Dietsch—Desiring lease of a pier on the Westchester shore, about 300 feet south of City Island Bridge, formerly known as Duryee's Dock. Referred to the Engineer-in-Chief to examine and report.

From W. T. Coggeshall—Tendering his resignation as Assistant Dock Master, to take effect September 15, instant.

On motion, his resignation was accepted, to take effect on said date.

From Alexander M. Goge, Draughtsman—Requesting an increase in compensation. Application denied.

From Albany Day Line—Requesting berth at Pier foot of Twenty-ninth street, North river, for steamboat "C. Vibbard." Referred to the Dock Master to examine and report.

From Nicholas F. Kinnally, Watchman—Requesting position as Messenger. Application denied.

From D. W. Bogert, Dock Master—Reporting hole in the bulkhead north and south of Pier, old 34, North river, and in front of and adjoining Piers, old 8 and 12, North river. The action of the President in notifying the lessees and occupants of said premises to repair, under the direction and supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief, was approved.

From P. J. Brady, Dock Master—Reporting repairs required to Pier, new 59, and Pier at Thirty-fourth street, North river. The action of the President in directing the Engineer-in-Chief to examine and report was approved.

From Charles Hutchinson, Dock Master:

1st. Reporting repairs required at bulkheads foot of Sixteenth, Twenty-sixth and Twenty-ninth streets, East river. The action of the President in directing the Engineer-in-Chief to examine and report was approved.

2d. Reporting that the tug "James Stevens" left a water-logged scow in front of the bulkhead at Seventeenth street, East river. The action of the Secretary in directing the Dock Master to have said scow removed at once was approved.

From W. T. Coggeshall, Dock Master—Reporting repairs required to the bulkhead between One Hundred and Twenty-ninth and One Hundred and Thirtieth streets, One Hundred and Thirty-first and One Hundred and Thirty-second streets, and at One Hundred and Fifty-eighth street, North river. The action of the President in directing the Engineer-in-Chief to examine and report was approved.

From Engineer-in-Chief:

Resolved, That the plans, specifications and form of contract as prepared and submitted by the Engineer-in-Chief of this Department for repairing Pier 55, East river, south of Grand street, and for repairing the crib-bulkhead under said pier, and extending westerly along East street to the westerly line, extended, of Cherry street be and they hereby are approved, subject to the approval of the Council to the Corporation as to form, and the Secretary be and hereby is directed to have a sufficient number of blank forms of contract printed and proper advertisements inviting estimates for doing said work inserted in the papers designated by law.

The Secretary reported that the pay-rolls for the General Repairs and Construction Force for the half month ending September 15, 1889, amounting to \$10,732, had been approved and audited and forwarded to the Finance Department for payment.

On motion, his action was approved. The communications from the Hon. Theodore W. Myers, Comptroller, transmitting copies of resolutions adopted by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, on September 9, 1889, approving of the change in the width of the Pier at West Fifty-sixth street, and the location of the new Pier at the foot of Vestry street, North river, were received, and, together with the plans, ordered to be placed on file, and the Secretary directed to enter the resolutions in full on the minutes, as follows:

Resolved, That the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund do hereby consent to and approve of the change in the width of the Pier at the foot of West Fifty-sixth street, North river, to be known as Pier, new 89, from the width thereof as laid down on the plans determined by the Commissioners of Docks, April 13, 1871, and adopted by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, April 27, 1871, as follows, to wit: The width of the pier to be sixty feet instead of eighty feet, as shown on the plans aforesaid, the centre line of the pier remaining as shown on said plans; and all as shown upon a plan submitted in duplicate, which is hereby approved by this Board.

Resolved, That the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund do hereby consent to and approve of the change in the location of the new Pier at the foot of Vesey street, North river, from the location as laid down on the plans determined by the Department of Docks, April 13, 1871, and adopted and certified by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, April 27, 1871, as follows:

The southerly line of Pier, new 29, to be one hundred and forty-two feet distant from the northerly side-line of Pier, new 28, as now built, instead of about one hundred feet distant therefrom, as shown on the plans aforesaid, and the side-lines of Pier, new 29, to be parallel to the side-lines of Pier, new 28, as now built; all as shown on a plan submitted in duplicate and approved by the Board of Commissioners of Docks, adopted August 8, 1889.

The communication from the Engineer-in-Chief, and the report of Dock Master Edward Abeel, reporting the upsetting of a float laden with cars loaded with ashes in the slip between Piers, old 41 and 42, North river; were,

On motion, ordered to be placed on file, and the Secretary directed to notify the party or parties owning said float to have the platform cars raised, and the material contained in said cars dredged, from said slip, under the direction and supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief of this Department.

The communication from the Engineer-in-Chief, recommending the sale of certain old material was,

On motion, ordered to be placed on file and the following resolution adopted:

Resolved, That Van Tassel & Kearney, auctioneers, on behalf of this Board, be and hereby are authorized and directed to offer for sale at public auction at West Fifty-seventh Street Yard, and on the site of old West Washington Market, between Vesey and Dey streets, North river, on the seventh day of October, 1889, at ten o'clock in the forenoon of that day, certain old material as recommended by the Engineer-in-Chief.

The Treasurer, Commissioner Matthews, to whom was referred the subject-matter as to the amount of wharfage to be paid by the Ocean Steamship Company of Savannah, for seventy-two feet of bulkhead southerly from Pier, new 35, North river, reported that he had agreed with said company at the rate of \$75 per month, payable monthly, when due, to the Dock Master of the District, commencing Tuesday, October 1, 1889, and to continue during the will of the Board.

On motion his action was approved. The Treasurer, Commissioner Matthews, reported that he had received the following estimates for furnishing the Department with 500 barrels of quick or slow setting Portland cement.

Resolved, That the Engineer-in-Chief be and hereby is directed to proceed with the construction of sufficient concrete base-blocks for the bulkhead or river wall, between the south side of Pier, old 39, North river, and the north end of Beach Street Section, and also that he be and hereby is directed to proceed with the construction of about six hundred feet of said bulkhead wall, extending from the north end of the wall of the Beach Street Section now building, between Beach and Hubert streets, to the northerly side of Vestry street, North river, upon the same plan as that of the Chambers Street Section of the bulkhead or river-wall, and of two piers to be known as Piers, new 27 and new 28, North river, and that all of the work hereby ordered be performed otherwise than by contract, as required by subdivision 5, of section 6 of chapter 574, Laws of 1871, and that it be done by the force of the Department by day's work, except so much of the labor as is now or may hereafter be contracted for, and that all the material and dredging necessary therefor not heretofore contracted for or which may not hereafter be contracted for, be purchased by the Treasurer otherwise than by contract.

Resolved, That the contract opened this day for repairing the bulkhead between Piers, old 36 and new 29, East river, near Market Slip, be and hereby is awarded to John W. Flaherty, he being the lowest bidder, upon the approval of the sureties by the Comptroller of the City.

The records of the Department show that since the reorganization of this Bureau, fourteen years ago, when the appropriation for it was fixed at \$12,200, its business has increased forty per centum, while the appropriation has been increased to \$13,200, or only a little over eight per centum. During this year, at the instance of his Honor the Mayor, to more effectually prevent accidents resulting from the use of explosives in blasting, etc., stringent regulations governing the transportation, sale, storage and use of explosives, were adopted by the Fire Commissioners which, to make them effective, require an addition to the force of the Bureau. This branch of its duties involves the serving of a large number of notices, for which the two new messengers are mainly needed, and the two additional surveyors and two additional clerks are principally required for the same general purposes. The increase of salary of the Inspector of Combustibles, who has acceptably filled this position since 1877, is well deserved, and the increase of salary of one clerk should also be allowed.

The Department is required to care for and keep in repair more than eighty buildings, and it has been found impossible, with the appropriation allowed for the purpose, to keep them in proper condition.

The remainder of the increase asked for is \$3,000 on the item "Telegraph Supplies and Repairs," which is required for the improvement of the fire-alarm system in the way of providing new outer boxes with keyless doors for the street alarm boxes, etc.

For Placing and Connecting Fire-alarm Electrical Conductors Underground (chap. 499, 1885) 100,000 00

All the appropriations hitherto made for this purpose have been exhausted, the contract for \$50,000 for 1888 having been completed and the contract for the same amount for the current year being under way.

For New Houses for Engine and Hook and Ladder Companies, etc. 100,000 00

For quarters for the following: Engine Company No. 7 and Hook and Ladder Company No. 1 and Water Tower No. 1, now located at the corner of Chambers and Centre streets (or in lieu thereof, Engine 29 and Hook and Ladder Company No. 10, corner of Fulton and Church streets), Engine Company No. 35, at No. 233 East One Hundred and Nineteenth street, Engine Company No. 41, at No. 501 North Third avenue, and for Engine Company No. 42, on Fulton avenue, between One Hundred and Sixty-seventh and One Hundred and Sixty-eighth streets.

The Department has been notified that the Commissioners designated by chapter 81 of 1889 have taken steps to erect a municipal building on that portion of the City Hall park partly occupied by the present quarters of Engine Company No. 7 and Hook and Ladder Company No. 1.

The house of Engine Company No. 35 was referred to in the estimate for the current year in these terms: "The condition is such that it must be rebuilt. To repair and alter it would be throwing money away."

The houses for Engine Companies Nos. 41 and 42 were built for the volunteer service of the towns of Mt. Haven and Morrisania respectively, before their annexation to this city, and both are in a very bad and unsuitable condition for the service.

"It is only two stories high and the walls of the second story, being only eight inches thick, will not bear the weight of an additional story. The building is very narrow, twenty feet, too small in every way for its present purposes."

To Complete the New Floating Engine 43,000 00

For this purpose \$75,000 were asked in the Departmental Estimate for this year and \$65,000 were allowed. This amount has been found to be entirely inadequate. Upon advertising for proposals the lowest bid that was obtained for building the boat entire, exclusive of the fire pumps (for which the lowest bid was \$22,000) was \$72,000, in all \$94,000, thus exceeding the appropriation by \$29,000, without allowing for the naval architect's commissions, which are chargeable to this appropriation.

On the basis of the estimates received, it is safe to say, that the boat cannot be completed for less than the amount above called for.

The foregoing estimate, amounting to two millions three hundred and sixty thousand four hundred and ninety-two 2/10 (\$2,360,492.50) dollars, is adopted as the sum of money which will be required for the expenses necessary to the administration and conduct of the Fire Department of the City of New York for the year 1890.
