



The 1,006 deaths represent a death-rate of 26.32, against 20.29 for the previous week and 25.16 for the corresponding week of 1894.

Contagious and infectious diseases continue to increase, the number of cases reported of diphtheria, measles, scarlet fever, typhoid fever and small-pox being respectively 200, 78, 118, 12 and 6 against 194, 64, 111, 8 and 5 for the previous week, a total of 414 against 382. The increase of diphtheria was mainly in the Seventh, Seventeenth and Eighteenth Wards, and the decrease in the Fifteenth and Twenty-first Wards. The increase of measles was most marked in the Sixth, Eleventh and Thirteenth Wards, and the decrease in the Seventeenth and Nineteenth Wards. The increase of scarlet fever was chiefly in the Eighth, Eighteenth and Nineteenth Wards, and the decrease in the Seventh and Twenty-first Wards. Four of the 12 cases of typhoid fever were above Fortieth street, and 4 of the remaining 8 were below Fourteenth street. Three of the 6 cases of small-pox were between Twenty-sixth and Fortieth streets, West, and 2 were in the annexed district.
