IN BOARD OF EXAMINERS, MARCH 29, 1898.

The Board of Examiners met this day, 3:50 P. M.

The roll was called, with the following result:

Present—Thomas J. Brady, Commissioner of Buildings for the Boroughs of Manhattan and The Bronx, in the chair, and Messrs. Bonner, Moore, Fryer, Dobbs, Conover, Post, O'Reilly, McMillan.

The minutes of March 22, 1898, were read and approved.

Petitions were then submitted for approval, as follows:

Slip Application 298, 1898—Petition to allow shed roof, four sides open, to be constructed as per plan, shed to be 65 feet by 80 feet and 25 feet to the highest point, wood trusses to be bolted to posts of yellow pine, set on piers built of Portland cement, concrete and stone to solid rock bottom, all exposed woodwork to be covered with sheet metal, as stated in petition; north side One Hundred and Tenth street, 75 feet from northeast corner of Western Boulevard. Petitioner, Philipp Dietrich. Laid over.

Slip Application 330, 1898—Petition to allow the erection of a viaduct, as per plans and specifications and as stated in petition; Nos. 523, to 525 West One Hundred and Tenth street. Petitioner, Richard R. Davis. Laid over.

Plan 9, New Buildings, 1898—Petition to allow the Bailey system of fireproof floor filling to be used between the steel beams on first stories of buildings, in place of brick arches, as stated in petition; north side of One Hundred and Twenty-fifth street, 175 feet west of Amsterdam avenue. Petitioners, Pollard & Steinam. Approved. Mr. Fryer voting No.

Plan 133, New Buildings, 1898—Petition to allow entrance hall walls to be constructed in the following manner, instead of 8-inch brick walls: Uprights, T's and angles and channels to be not less than 4 inches, properly braced, set not more than 30 inches on centres and filled in between solid with burnt clay blocks or porous terra-cotta or hard burnt brick of not less than 4-inch thickness, and plastered on both sides; ceilings to be not less than 2-inch T's, angles or channels, set not more than 2 feet apart, well braced and filled in between solid with burnt clay blocks, as stated in petition; No. 54 Avenue D. Petitioner, Frederick T. Camp. Approved.

Plan 142, New Buildings, 1898—Petition to allow the first-story main hall partitions to be built of 4-inch T and L irons, set 30 inches from centres and well braced and secured with cross bars, filled in between with burnt clay blocks 3 inches thick and plastered both sides; ceiling overhead to be built of 2-inch T and L irons, set 2 feet apart, well braced and filled in solid with burnt clay blocks and plastered, all as stated in petition. No. 80 Catherine street. Petitioner, Charles Rentz. Approved on condition that the blocks are 4 inches thick instead of 3 inches.

Plan 159A, New Buildings, 1898—Petition to allow the J. W. Kapp system of fireproof floor construction to be used for the first floor of building, as stated in petition; north side of One Hundred and Fifty-fifth street, 140 feet east of Melrose avenue. Petitioner, Gustav Schwarz. Approved on condition that the soffits of iron beams are protected by wire lath and plaster. Mr. Fryer voting no.

Plan 175A, New Buildings, 1898—Petition to allow building to extend to a height of 37 feet 6 inches, instead of 35 feet as required by law, and as stated in petition; north side of One Hundred and Sixty-fourth street, 245 feet 3 inches east of Morris avenue. Petitioner, W. C. Dickerson. Approved.

Plan 179A, New Buildings, 1898—Petition to allow building to be erected 37 feet in height, instead of 35 feet as required by law, and as stated in petition; west side of Washington avenue, 300 feet south of One Hundred and Eighty-second street. Petitioner, W. C. Dickerson. Approved.

Plan 191, New Buildings, 1898—Petition to allow walls to be erected to height and thickness shown on plans, as stated in petition; southwest corner of Amsterdam avenue and One Hundred and Twenty-third street. Petitioner, John Brandt. Denied.

Plan 194, New Buildings, 1898—Petition to allow the entrance hall walls to be constructed as follows: The uprights, T's, channels and angles to be 4 inches, properly braced and set not more than 30 inches on centres, and filled in between solid with burnt clay blocks, porous terra-cotta or hard burnt brick, of not less than 4 inches thickness and plastered on both sides; ceilings to be constructed of not less than 2-inch T's, angles or channels, set not more than 2 feet apart, well braced and filled in between solid with burnt clay blocks, all as stated in petition; No. 234 West Sixty-fifth street. Petitioner, F. T. Camp. Approved.

Plan 200A, New Buildings, 1898—Petition to allow building to be erected 35 feet in height, instead of 35 feet as required by law, and as stated in petition; east side of Union avenue, 106 feet 6 inches north of One Hundred and Sixty-fifth street. Petitioner, W. C. Dickerson. Approved.

Plan 205, New Buildings, 1898—Petition to allow main entrance hall partitions to be built of 4-inch T's, channels and angle irons, properly braced and set 30 inches from centres and filled in solid with 4-inch thick burnt clay blocks, porous terra-cotta, or hard burnt brick; also ceilings to be built of 4-inch T's or angles, set 2 feet apart, well braced and filled in solid with burnt clay blocks, all as stated in petition; No. 28 Scammel street. Petitioners, Schneider & Herter. Approved.

Plan 206, New Buildings, 1898—Petition to allow main entrance hall partitions to be built of 4-inch T's, channels and angle irons, properly braced and placed 30 inches on centres, and filled in between solid with burnt clay blocks, porous terra-cotta, or hard burnt brick 4 inches thick; also ceiling to be built of 2-inch T's or angles, set 2 feet apart, well braced and filled in solid with burnt clay blocks, all as stated in petition; No. 59 East Third street. Petitioners, Schneider & Herter. Approved.

Plan 207, New Buildings, 1898—Petition to allow main entrance hall partitions to be built of 4-inch T's, channels and angle irons, properly braced and placed 30 inches from centres and filled in solid with 4-inch thick burnt clay blocks, porous terra-cotta or hard burnt brick; also ceilings to be built of 2-inch T's or angles, set 2 feet apart, well braced and filled in solid with burnt clay blocks, all as stated in petition; Nos. 118-120 Cannon street. Petitioners, Schneider & Herter. Approved.

Plan 217, New Buildings, 1898—Petition to allow partitions forming hallway on first story, from street to stair hall, to be constructed of 4-inch I beams, 2 feet 6 inches apart, filled in with 4-inch thick hollow fireproof burnt clay blocks; ceiling of hallway to be of 2-inch by 2-inch tees, 24-inch centres, filled in between with 2-inch thick terra-cotta blocks, all to be wire-lathed and plastered, as stated in petition; No. 55, 57 and 59 Willett street. Petitioner, M. Bernstein. Approved.

Plan 210, Alterations to Buildings, 1898—Petition to allow the inclosure of roof-house on ninth story to be built of 4-inch porous terra-cotta blocks, laid in cement, with angle and tee iron uprights, spaced 4 feet apart, the outside to be covered with corrugated galvanized sheet iron, except southerly, rear and westerly gable walls, as stated in petition; Nos. 51 to 57 Franklin street. Petitioners, De Lemos & Cordes. Laid over, for drawings of roof, old and new, showing old and proposed pent house.

Plan 211, Alterations to Buildings, 1898—Petition to allow the upper portion of side walls on roof to be constructed of iron angles and tees, filled in with 4-inch fireproof blocks, covered on the outside with clapboard iron and plastered inside, as stated in petition; Nos. 3, 5 and 7 West Twenty-ninth street. Petitioner, Charles I. Berg. Approved.

Plan 404A, Alterations to Buildings, 1897—Petition to allow highest tier of beams to be 42 feet 4 inches, as stated in petition; No. 2994 and 2996 Third avenue. Petitioner, Henry Ehrhardt. Approved.
