The reading of the minutes of the meetings held January 27, 28 and 31, 1898, was dispensed with.

On motion, the Board proceeded to the consideration of the Budget for the year 1898.

The Comptroller presented the following:

CITY OF NEW YORK—FINANCE DEPARTMENT,  
COMPTROLLER'S OFFICE,

To the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

GENTLEMEN—The Comptroller, to whom were referred the Departmental Estimates of Boards of Education, of the former Cities of New York and Brooklyn, respectfully submits the following report:

Section 1061 of the Charter provides that the Boards of Education of the former Cities of New York and Brooklyn shall continue to perform the functions with which they were originally charged, until February 1, 1898, when their powers and duties as boards of education shall cease and determine, and their powers and duties as school boards shall commence.

Section 1089 provides that the school boards in each of the boroughs, shall organize, on the second Wednesday of February. At this meeting nineteen members of a board of education, for the whole city, are to be elected, which board of education is required to organize on the third Monday of February.

Section 1064 provides that the Board of Education shall represent the schools and school system of The City of New York before the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, and shall, in general, be the representative of the school system of the City in its entirety.

There are many new provisions of law affecting the school system of the new City of New York, provided for in the Charter, which will not go into effect until after the organization of the new Board of Education. Apart from the fact that under section 1064, the new Board of Education (not yet elected), is the only body authorized to present a Departmental Estimate of the Board of Education for the year 1898, to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, it is a fact that the titles of appropriations to be made to the new Department of Education, and the apportionment of moneys to its several accounts, will differ materially from the titles of such appropriations and apportionments as have been heretofore in force. Any appropriation which might be made, therefore, on the basis of the systems heretofore prevailing, would have to be entirely remodeled to meet the new conditions of the new department.

The Comptroller, therefore, recommends that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment appropriate, under the titles of appropriations heretofore in vogue, only such amounts as may be found by the boards of education, in existence during the month of January, to be necessary for the expenses of that month, and that the appropriation for the remaining eleven months of the year be postponed until a departmental estimate can be presented by the new Board of Education, which, as already stated, is the only body authorized to speak for the whole school system of the new city.

This plan will also harmonize with the action already taken by the Comptroller, under advice of the Corporation Counsel, in regard to the payment of expenses of the several school districts of Queens and Richmond Counties, by the several boards of trustees of common schools, for the school districts, included in The City of New York.

The Comptroller made an oral report upon the estimate of the District Attorney of New York County, and presented the following:

DISTRICT ATTORNEY'S OFFICE,  
CITY AND COUNTY OF NEW YORK,

To the Honorable Board of Estimate and Apportionment of The City and County of New York:

GENTLEMEN—In compliance with the statute in such case made and provided, I have the honor to submit for your consideration an estimate of expenditures of this office for salaries of officers, clerks, employees and subordinates, and contingencies necessary to be incurred in the conduct of the business of the office during the current year 1898.

Last month the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for this City and County, fixed the total at \$205,580 including \$2,500 statutory fees and compensation of Stenographer to the Grand Jury, under chapter 348, Law of 1895. I have the honor to request that the apportionment be confirmed.

Since entering upon the duties of this office on January 1st instant, I have found that there are over three thousand two hundred persons under indictment; and many important cases in which the entire commercial community are especially concerned are under preparation for trial. I find that two more stenographers are imperatively needed for the assistance of the members of the staff actually trying cases—there being now in session four parts of the Court of General Sessions, and next month, in addition thereto will be a criminal term of the Supreme Court. The compensation of these two stenographers would be \$1,000 apiece.

I find also that for many years, and within the last few months, the salary of the Fardon Clerk, a most important official of this office, upon whom the District Attorney has to greatly rely in the digest of records of convictions, was \$3,800 per annum, temporarily reduced to \$3,000 per annum. The services rendered by this official should be properly compensated, and I therefore ask the additional sum of \$800 for his salary, as his services would command more under equal responsibilities in private life.

The Indictment Clerk has charge of the preliminary preparation of indictments, and is another among the more valued employees of this office. He receives now but \$4,500. As seven thousand complaints come to him every year upon which to formulate indictments in proper cases, his salary is entirely incommensurate with the importance and responsibility of his duties, which require special skill and long training as well as perfect integrity. I ask that his salary may be increased \$500 per annum.

In all, I respectfully request that the estimate for the current year, for reasons stated and to enable a readjustment of small salaries, be increased by \$4,500, making a total of \$209,080.

The Comptroller made an oral report upon the estimate of the Coroners of the Boroughs of Manhattan, The Bronx, Brooklyn, Queens and Richmond, and presented the following:

CORONERS' OFFICE—BOROUGH OF MANHATTAN,  
NEW YORK, January 17, 1898.

To the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, New York City:

GENTLEMEN—The Board of Coroners of the Borough of Manhattan submit for your consideration the annexed statement of salaries and expenses required for the Coroners' office for the year 1898.

The amount asked for the salaries of the Coroners is an increase over the salaries of last year. The salaries of last year and of years previous were fixed by the Legislature in 1878, and have, up to the present time, remained the same, although the work of the Coroners has more than doubled.

The population of the Borough of Manhattan in 1878 was about one million; at the present time it is (resident and transit included) over two millions. In proportion to the population there are more Coroners' cases at the present time than there were in 1878. There are more homicides, suicides and suspicious cases; there are more deaths on the streets and in the rivers; there are more deaths by gas, electricity, and by the use of explosives; there are more deaths by the negligent use of machinery, and by the criminal negligence of physicians, of midwives and of druggists; there are more night calls; there are more ante-mortem examinations taken, and there are more replevins and matters against the Sheriff.

This increase in the number of Coroners' cases, and in the detail work incident to each case, demanded of the Coroners last year alone more labor, both mental and physical, than was demanded of the Coroners for the three years from 1878 to 1880 combined.

The office of Coroner is different to what it was in 1878. It is more comprehensive than it was then; its duties are more onerous; its responsibilities are greater, and it is more important to the public.

In 1878 the duty of the Coroner was to find the cause of death solely; to-day the Coroner is directed by law to examine into deaths caused by criminal means, to issue warrants and to commit persons accused.

This law changed the character of the work of the coroner and imposed upon him extra duties and extra responsibilities for which he has received no extra compensation.

In view of this the Coroners believe that the amount asked for is reasonable and just.



The amount asked for Coroners' Physicians is the same as it was last year and previous years. According to the Greater New York Charter (Ash's edition, appendix, page 1014) the laws fixing the salary of the Coroners' Physicians has not been repealed.

The amount asked for the Clerk of the Board of Coroners is the same as it was last year and previous years.

The amount asked for contingent expenses is the same as it was last year and previous years. It is included the salaries of the Special Clerks for each Coroner, whose duty it is to attend court, summon jurors, subpoena witnesses, take testimony in simple cases, accompany the Coroner day and night on investigations and on autopsies, and to perform all the work required of him by the Coroner. It includes, also, the expenses incurred by the Coroner in investigating homicides, suicides and suspicious deaths. It includes the necessary expenses for the jury, telephone service, interpreters, car-fare, postage and each Coroner's share of the incidental expenses of the general office.

The amount asked for post-mortem examinations is the same as it was last year and previous years.

The amounts asked for the Stenographer, the Replevin Clerk and the two Assistant Clerks are the same as they were last year and previous years. The duty of the Assistant Clerks is to be in attendance at the Coroners' office from 4 o'clock in the afternoon until 9 o'clock the following morning.

The salary of the three Record Clerks was last year and previous years paid out of the amount appropriated for contingent expenses. The amount appropriated for contingent expenses is not sufficient to pay the contingent expenses of the office and the salaries of the Record Clerks. For this reason a separate appropriation to pay the salaries of the Record Clerks is asked.

CHIEF CLERK.

Table with 2 columns: Description and Amount. Includes Coroner's Salary: \$25,000 00.

This item is based upon the fee system. The Coroners of the County of Kings who held office during the year 1897 and who exercised jurisdiction in the territory now known as the Borough of Brooklyn, included in their estimate \$33,300 for holding inquests during the fiscal year 1897-8. Out of this sum they paid their clerical help (not including the Chief Clerk) say, \$3,000, as each Coroner had a personal clerk, leaving a balance for fees of \$30,300.

\$8.30 was the fee fixed for each inquest. By the Consolidation Act under which, as we understand it, all the borough Coroners are acting, and with the limited number of Coroners in this borough (two), together with our ever increasing population, the Coroners here must necessarily be very busy men in order to give that careful attention to their duties which the office demands. Inquests are held night and day. At no time in this borough will it be possible for the Coroners to be off duty.

CORONERS' PHYSICIANS.

Each Coroner is empowered to appoint a Physician whose salary shall not exceed \$3,000. As the Coroners' Physician is by law obliged to view every body upon which an inquest is to be held, and as our inquests will be between 3,500 and 4,000 a year, the maximum amount of salary to be fixed might not be called excessive.

CLERK.

Table with 2 columns: Description and Amount. Includes Clerk: \$3,300 00.

The Clerk under the former Coroners received \$2,500 per annum and exercised a general supervision over the clerical affairs of the office.

The Coroners of this borough possess all the powers and perform all the duties vested in Coroners of The City of New York, as heretofore known and bounded.

This means a great amount of attention and supervision in a large borough like ours, where we are obliged to keep our records and perform the clerical work on the lines of the old New York office.

The Chief Clerk examines carefully every inquisition paper and record in the office, calls attention to any possible omission of testimony before the inquest is closed, directs the Assistant Clerks in the preparation of statements, examines witnesses before formal inquest commences, takes care of all moneys and property found on persons upon whom inquests have been held, and when he is a faithful and competent man and has the confidence of the Coroners is considered a valuable and trusted public employee.

ASSISTANT CLERKS.

We have two Coroners. Each Coroner should have a clerk in constant attendance on him in his journeys throughout the borough when on official business. The Clerk takes testimony when directed by the Coroner, subpoenas witnesses, summons jurors and attends inquests night and day.

As the duties of the Coroners are somewhat peculiar in their nature, their Clerks should be very close to them, as they are often charged with duties and missions where great confidence in their judgment is necessary.

The other clerk asked for is to assist in the office so that there will always be some one to look out for its affairs in the absence of the Chief Clerk, and also to attend the Coroners whenever required.

STENOGRAPHER.

This is the same amount as was received and expended during the year 1897, and in addition to the reasons which prevailed upon the Board of Estimate and Apportionment at that time to determine upon the said amount as a proper one for this purpose for 1897, may be added the still further increase in the number of small parks which have been and are still being acquired from year to year. Seven new parks have been added, with an area of 78½ acres. The number of park visitors increases each year and certain parks, until recently little used, now demand constant care. Thousands use them daily for both business travel and recreation. With judicious expenditure, however, it is calculated that the parks can be maintained with the amount asked for in a manner creditable to the Borough.

The labor item will admit of the employment of a force averaging a weekly pay-roll of \$5,500 and a fortnightly pay-roll of \$8,500, which, when well organized, can accomplish the routine of cleaning the walks, lawns, drives, buildings, etc.; repairing with gravel the worn portions of the drives and bridle-paths; repairing and rebuilding basins, drains, etc.; mowing lawns, pruning and cutting out dead, diseased or overcrowded portions of the plantations and replacing the same; attending the skate ponds in winter and the lawns during the summer games and picnics. The work changes and develops as the season advances and the various parks should be manned with sufficient force to properly meet and carry on the work.

The above are the larger and more important of the supplies required during the year. The wear and tear on the drives of Central Park and Riverside require the use of 10,000 yards of gravel each season. In order to roll in this material with as little delay and inconvenience to the public as possible, an item of \$5,000 has been included for the purchase of two 5-ton steam rollers.

At present there is but one steam roller in the Department, and experience has shown that much quicker and better results are obtained with this machine than by using the ordinary horse rollers.

The sod is required for the repair of the borders of the lawns throughout the park system. The constant wear on the edges of the lawns require replacing with sod each season.

The mould and manure are required for the lawns and for the tree and shrub plantations; the forage, for the Eighty-fifth Street Stable.

The iron, lumber, paint, brick, cement, etc., are required for the repair of the various buildings, bridges and other structures throughout the parks.

New horses are need to replace old and worn-out animals now in the service of the Department.

The increasing use of the parks, as well as the wear and tear, requires new settees each year. The broken stone is required for the repair of macadamized roads and for concreting.

A number of the buildings and other structures throughout the parks, such as the stables near Eighty-ninth Street Transverse Road, and the Sheepfold, near Sixty-sixth street and Eighth avenue, and several of the cottages, require extensive repairs, which work it is intended to do by contract.

In addition to the above, there are a number of small articles which it is necessary to purchase from time to time, such as harness, harness, oil, gas fixtures, pipe, fence materials, tools, pieces of rolling stock, etc., which have been grouped under the heading "Miscellaneous."

The amount asked for is \$2,500 more than last year. The fitting up of the monkey-house is absolutely necessary if the Department hopes to successfully keep the monkeys in exhibition. Placing the monkeys in the basement of the Arsenal has been found to be a mistake. The change from the old monkey-house has proved disastrous to the monkeys, the mortality having increased more than 100 per cent, since occupying their present quarters, due to dampness and lack of proper ventilation. Besides, they are a nuisance in the building, causing much and annoying flies and other insects.

The popularity of these concerts with the public is so well known that argument is not necessary to show the wisdom of this expenditure, which probably gives more real enjoyment to the public than any other item of its size in the City's budget.

For telephonic service.....	\$4,500 00
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The sum of \$4,000, which was allowed for the purpose in the year 1897 was barely sufficient for the service as then established. It will be necessary to provide for the additional service necessitated by connecting the systems of the several boroughs.

Surveys, maps and plans.....	\$2,000 00
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This is an increase of \$500 over the amount allowed for 1897, which was found to be totally inadequate for the purpose, namely, making surveys and preparing maps for the Board of Street Opening and Improvement for laying out proposed parks, and also for the Commissioners of Esti-

mate and Assessment, in proceedings to acquire title to park lands. Considering the work of this character already in view for the current year, it is estimated that a smaller amount than the sum asked for would not be sufficient.

For the Aquarium.....	\$45,000 00
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This amount, though small for what it is expected to accomplish, if all the Department feels warranted in asking for, but with careful expenditure it is thought to be sufficient to maintain and operate the Aquarium during the year. It is \$5,000 more than was received for 1897.

The permanent plant has been so much increased and the attendance so large at this new and popular institution that more money is absolutely necessary to maintain it. The attendance will doubtless exceed one and one-half millions during its first year of exhibition. A park features, affording recreation and enjoyment to so many people, considered with the instructive character of the Aquarium, would seem to fully warrant the appropriation asked for. The present Croton water supply is very unsatisfactory in many ways and needs to be changed. The underground pipes have been in use several years and are much worn, as well as the valves, requiring renewal and repair.

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This item is inserted in the Estimate to meet the requirements of chapter 678 of the Laws of 1897. This law authorizes the Department to enter into a contract with the Grant Monument Association for the care and preservation of the tomb of General Grant, on Riverside, for a period of not less than twenty-one years, said Association to secure without compensation, but the City to pay the necessary expenses of maintaining the tomb, not exceeding \$5,000 in any one year. Such a contract was entered into by the late Board of Parks, who certified that the sum of \$5,000 was necessary to meet arrearages for the year 1897, and a similar amount will be required for the year 1898.

Harlem River Driveway.....	\$18,000 00
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The second section of this Driveway, the portion lying north of Washington Bridge, is now open to the public, and upon the completion of the first section, which will probably be in the early spring, the care and maintenance of the same, as a whole, will become an item of considerable expense.

It is estimated that with a sufficient force to properly maintain and care for the same an annual expenditure of at least \$25,000 will be necessary.

The above estimate is arrived at by providing for 15 men and 4 teams, with a foreman; and calculated as the expense for a period equal to about three-quarters of the current year, the sum of \$18,000 is asked for.

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Topographical surveys have been made of Cronus and Claremont Parks. The remaining parks of this Borough should be surveyed during the current year. Such surveys are absolutely necessary in the working out of a study of roads and improvements to meet the present and future needs of this part of the city. These existing parks are increasing in use and popularity, rapidly, requiring more and more attention and care each year.

It is estimated that \$120,350 will be required for requisite labor, and \$20,050 for supplies, contingent expenses, etc., including surveys and road building by contract and otherwise; also a sum of \$25,000 for the erection and establishment of work-shops and office accommodations.

DEAR SIR:—In response to your request with regard to the expenses of the support and maintenance of the Museum of the Brooklyn Institute of Arts and Sciences for the year 1898, I beg leave to submit the following: In pursuance of the provisions contained in the Charter of New York City, sections 913 and 924, which state that "It shall be the duty of the commissioner for the boroughs of Brooklyn and Queens to maintain the Brooklyn Institute of Arts and Sciences and such other buildings as now are or may hereafter be erected in any park, square or public place under his jurisdiction, by authority of the municipal assembly."

In fulfillment of the provisions of the Charter of New York City, the following detail statement of expenses is made:

The above expenditures are absolutely necessary for the maintenance of the Museum building for use by the public and for preserving and keeping on exhibition the collections contained therein. The above does not include an appropriation for the completion of the walls of the present section of the building according to the designs approved during the administration of Mayor Hoody and yourself as Park Commissioner. An appropriation of thirty thousand dollars is needed to provide for the sculptures that are to stand on the pedestals above the columns on the facades of the Museum building.

The above estimate does not include the improvement of the grounds to the south of the Museum building, on which several hundred dollars should be expended in clearing and seeding. You will, as Park Commissioner, be a better judge of the cost of improving of the grounds than the officers or trustees of the institute.

Bedford Park Building has not been open to the public. We desire to open the building to the public as soon as the 1st of April, and the cost of the care and maintenance of the same for 1898, is estimated as follows:
